From the desk of Father Alan:

WOW! June 19 and 20, we can re-open our churches once again, thanks to the lower count of cases of COVID 19 and more vaccines being given out. However, we can open our churches only at 15 %. That means the following: St. Bernard's seating 50 people, St. Cecilia's seating 52 people, St. Mary's seating 67 and Our Lady, Queen of Martyrs seating 75 people.

Just a reminder, all COVID 19 protocols are still in place: wearing a mask, social distancing, answering the usual four questions before you enter the church and responding NO, being escorted to your pew and after Mass escorted to the exit. We are frustrated and tired of these protocols but because of them the virus is loosing the battle and we may attend church.

For the month of June, we will NOT preregister for Mass. No phoning in is necessary but if those attending increase we may have to begin preregistration. So, first come, first served, and can join us for in person Mass. We will continue to livestream to You Tube our Sunday Mass at St. Mary's at 11:00 am (not 10:00 am).

Baptisms will resume in July, please contact Kathryn Heemskerk at the Parish Office. We will NOT resume First Holy Communions at this time.

Let us continue to pray and support each other. We offer our prayers to the families in our parishes who have lost a loved one and found grieving so painful due to COVID 19 restrictions. We also pray for the 215 indigenous children who deserve a proper burial. We pray for their families who suffer once again at their loss and may our Catholic Church through Pope Francis apologize for our part in this tragedy. May God forgive us!

This week we heard that we are going to be gifted with two new priests. How very exciting that is! It got me to thinking about the word "Welcome". We often talk about welcoming new people. Have you given that much thought? It's not just the greeters/hospitality who does this. Each of us has a role in welcoming others. We need to welcome with our words. We need to welcome with our actions. We need to welcome with our faces.

But how do we do that? Look joyful!! Ask ourselves: are we acting like we are glad to see everyone or are we begrudgingly sharing our space? Do we look interested, offering directions and information in an encouraging tone? Do we appear helpful, showing people where to find the mass parts, the special prayer, the direction we go for Eucharist, the doorway to the breakfast or coffee social, the bathroom? Do we welcome everyone to join us after church, because it's not a club where only the regular people can go? Do we include the people who are not part of "the regulars" to come light a candle, come to Sunday school or come to a group study? Sometimes an invitation to come with you makes it less scary. We might offer a ride, or ask if they go to our school or ask how their week went.

And in the end, we invite a return. We express how happy we are that someone came and we wish a good week ahead. When we haven't seen someone, we call and see if everything is all right. None of these are new, but they might be new to you. Pray on this. Ask God **to help you notice** and help you be the welcoming face, drawing others in. It such a seemingly small part to play, but one we all can do!

When we re-open, let us welcome all who enter our doors, known and unknown alike, as new friends in Christ, excited to share with the wonders of this faith that forms us as members of the family of God. Scatter kindness wildly!!

Bishop Fabbro's Statement on the Tragic Discovery at the Former Kamloops Residential School

May 31, 2021

I am shocked and profoundly saddened by the horrifying discovery of the remains of at least 215 children at the former Kamloops Indian Residential School on the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc First Nation.

When the operation of residential schools was delegated by the federal government to several Christian faith-based groups, there were many failures in fulfilling Christ's mission of bringing the good news of the kingdom of God and helping the oppressed, including failures of the Catholic Church.

The presence of the graves of these innocent ones sheds light on a clear failure of those responsible in not embracing the Gospel values of love, mercy, justice and compassion, and for forgetting their commitment to respect the dignity of all people. These lost innocent ones are another reason why we must continue to learn from these failings and work with Indigenous communities towards the healing called for by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

Yesterday, a memorial was placed at St. Peter's Cathedral Basilica in London as part of a nation-wide commemoration of the lost children. I visited the memorial today to pray, asking God to bring comfort to the families of the deceased and all survivors of the residential school system. We will continue to pray for the families of these children and survivors and commit ourselves to playing a constructive role in the journey towards healing and reconciliation.

"I am horrified by the hate-motivated killing of an innocent Muslim family in London. I unconditionally condemn acts of hatred and violence. Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time June 13, 2021

They that are planted in the house of the LORD shall flourish in the courts of our God. —Psalm 92:14

GOD'S TIME

We either pay attention to or ignore "clock time" as we play in the summer sun and note the earth's tilt and the lengthening days. We live by time. We reckon time in seconds and minutes and hours, or we use broader chunks like suppertime and summertime.

God keeps another sort of time. God speaks to us of "saving time," that is, the time of salvation. This sense of time is called kairos, and this time is always now, always present and available, always revealing, often surprising.

This Sunday's readings alert us to the reality and the import of God's time. Ezekiel and the Gospel of Mark remind us that our labor and our plotting and our planning rest in God. For God takes our smallest efforts and makes of them great works. Paul points us to the "harvest" time, urges us to be watchful for its coming, and calls us to recognize that we must spend our time pleasing God.



THE WIND AND THE SEA

Living along the shores of Lake Superior—the "big lake," as the locals call it-you can often hear the advice, "Respect the lake; don't take it for granted." People who know Lake Superior respect its power and watch out for its many moods. Sunken ships and boats crushed into kindling are testimonies to what the lake can do.

The readings of this Sunday evoke our memories of the lake, of the mighty Mississippi River, or of the ocean itself. Who but God can control these mighty waters and set limits to their advance? The lake described in today's Gospel was a body of water subject to sudden storms and churned into dangerous waves by terrible winds.

But these mighty agents are subject to God. The sailor and the fisher all respect the water. Even more, they respect the awesome power of the Maker of wind and sea.
