REFLECTION ON A NEW CHURCH ORGAN

Have you heard that Saint Catherine's is getting a new organ? Our old organ has not worked for several years and is not economically repairable. Without it, something important has been missing in our church. Organs and Catholic churches go together. Why is that? Thinking about it this week, I came up with at least seven different reasons:

#1 Tradition.

As long as I can remember, and long before I was born, our churches have had organs. This tradition goes back to 1430 in Europe. There is more sacred music written for organs than any other instrument. Churches around the world feature organs. The bigger the church, the bigger the organ. In the middle ages, architects had to incorporate multiple small pulpits so the Gospel reading could be relayed to those sitting in the rear of the church. Before microphones, speakers, and electronics, an organ would be the one thing heard throughout the church.

#2 An organ can fill a large space physically, visually, and auditorily.

Organs are physically larger than other instruments. They are grand and awe inspiring. Organs come with two, three, four or more manuals (keyboards). There can have dozens, up to thousands of pipes. There is no other instrument that is larger.

For maximum visual impact, these instruments are installed on a raised platform or in a loft for the whole congregation to admire. Surprisingly, the largest pipe organ ever built is not in a church. It was built by the Midmer-Losh Organ Company between 1929 and 1932 and is housed at the Boardwalk Hall Auditorium in Atlantic City, New Jersey. The Atlantic City organ contains seven manuals, 1,235 stops, 449 ranks, 337 registers, and 33,114 pipes! It weighs 150 tons. The loudest pipe on this organ is equivalent to a military jet aircraft take-off from an aircraft carrier.

Auditorily, an organ is the only instrument that can swell to fit a huge space. Other instruments like piano, guitar, and trumpet can be electrically amplified but that is not the same. When you look at something using a telescope, it appears larger but distorted. Edges are blurry and imperfections are magnified. The background is out of focus. The same thing happens when you hear an instrument with amplification. The amplified sound is distorted.

An organ needs no amplification. The sound is made by wind rushing through acoustic pipes, just like the human voice. To increase the sound of an organ, you increase the amount of wind and the number of pipes. When the organ is played in church, everyone is immersed. The music comes from all directions at once. What other instrument could play in the huge cathedrals of medieval Europe?

Vivian and I were in Milan last year. On the town square stands the Duomo di Milano, one of the most famous buildings in Europe and one of the largest cathedrals in the world. Construction began in 1386 and took five centuries to complete. The ceiling inside is 150 feet high. The church is 520 feet long with capacity inside for more than 40,000 people. Only an organ can fill this space with music.

#3 Organs are rare and expensive.

The organ coming to Saint Catherine's Church cost \$200,000 when new. The church where it comes from is buying a new organ this year for half a million dollars and selling their current organ to us. A large pipe organ takes a community to purchase, house, and maintain. This is not an instrument that an individual would or could own.

#4 Organs are beautiful works of art.

They are often decorated with rare and precious woods, artistic painting, metalwork, and other embellishments. The pipes are made with highly polished metal that is richly decorated. The Catholic Church is a great patron of the arts. For 2,000 years, we have employed the finest painters, architects, sculptors, musicians, and artisans to create beautiful works of art. Everything in our church should reflect the finest and most beautiful things that we can find as a tribute to the glory and majesty of God.

#5 Organs are musically versatile.

They can sound like trumpets, oboes, tubas, violins, or a hundred other instruments. Stops let air into each set of organ pipes for each instrument. Have you ever heard someone say "pull out all the stops?" That means to pressurize all of the pipes on the organ at the same time. What an overpowering din of sound that would make.

To hear a world-famous organ with hundreds of stops, one need travel no farther than the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. The Spreckels Organ was installed in 1924 as the building was constructed. The manufacturer collaborated with the architect to accommodate 4,526 pipes inside the museum walls. Concerts are every Saturday from 4 to 4:45 pm.

#6 An organ can sustain notes indefinitely.

Every other instrument fades away as the string, bell, or reed stops vibrating. An organist, on the other hand, can keep his or her finger on the key forever and the sound will never diminish or waiver. This floating, "infinite" quality of notes is what makes church music unique and inspiring.

#7 Organs are not portable.

It takes many many weeks or months to construct an organ on site. They are individually created for the space where they will be played. It is very difficult to move an organ. What better place to permanently install one than a church that will stand for hundreds or thousands of years?

For these seven reasons, organs and Catholic churches go together. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops said as much in their 2007 publication "Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship."

"Among all other instruments which are suitable for divine worship, the organ is accorded pride of place because of its capacity to sustain the singing of a large gathered assembly, due to both its size and its ability to give resonance to the fullness of human sentiments, from joy to sadness, from praise to lamentation. Likewise, the manifold possibilities of the organ in some way remind us of the immensity and magnificence of God."

Can a Catholic be "de-baptized"?



Baptism has a spiritual potency that can never be wiped away.

In recent years there has been a small movement in Europe and elsewhere where individuals seek to be "de-baptized" and removed from a church's baptismal registry. The act is done to formally "renounce" a person's upbringing, completely severing ties with the Catholic Church. Is it possible to be "de-baptized"?

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* affirms that "Incorporated into Christ by Baptism, the person baptized is configured to Christ. **Baptism seals the Christian with the indelible spiritual mark** (character) of his belonging to Christ. No sin can erase this mark, even if sin prevents Baptism from bearing the fruits of salvation. Given once for all, Baptism cannot be repeated" (CCC 1272).

This means that even if a person sins against God by renouncing him in an official manner, that act can never erase the spiritual mark left by baptism.

The *Catechism* adds that, "The Holy Spirit has marked us with the seal of the Lord ('Dominicus character') 'for the day of redemption.' 'Baptism indeed is the seal of eternal life.' The faithful Christian who has 'kept the seal' until the end, remaining faithful to the demands of his Baptism, will be able to depart this life 'marked with the sign of faith'" (CCC 1274). The seal of baptism does not guarantee a "ticket" to Heaven, but it does forever mark a person's soul and they will be judged by God according to that seal.

With this in mind, a pastor is not able to remove a person from their baptismal registry because of the permanent nature of baptism.

This is also why a person can never be baptized a second time. Provided that the first baptism was valid, a Catholic who officially renounced his/her faith does not need to be baptized a second time to be readmitted into the flock. A faithful reception of the sacrament of confession (along with the full satisfaction of any type of penance connected to those sins) has the power to **wipe away all sins and restore that person's baptismal innocence.**

Atheists and satanists who repent of their sins are gladly welcomed back into the fold of Jesus Christ and do not need to be baptized again.

God is very patient and even when we stray far from our baptismal promises, he never stops pursuing us. He is the "Hound of Heaven" and will seek us out. It is up to us to allow ourselves to be found by God and accept his love into our lives.

The stained glass windows at St. Catherine's Church have always been beautiful but now they are simply gorgeous. The whole place is rising to heaven theologically speaking. Rising with new rugs, new pews, a new marble floor for the Altar area and a spectacular paint job everywhere. It is a must see! Personally as a lifelong parishioner I have never been so proud of St. Catherine's. It has always been a piece of great artwork sitting on the corner of Mellus and Estudillo streets in downtown Martinez but now it is heading into something simply stunning. It is mostly light and the stained glass windows I like best. Especially the stained glass windows from the 1970's which were put in place by the venerable Monsignor Deans. He was the Priest in charge at that time. They tell the story of Christian salvation through holy people who sought the perfection of Christ in their lives. They are the latest of our stained glass. There are two other types of stained glass at St. Catherine's with the oldest ones in the Santuary area near the Altar and the Tabernacle. They are very old school and come to us from the original Church which once stood on the corner of Mellus and Castro Sts.' That Church was torn down in 1940 by Contractor Al Rangel to make room for the present Church which is now being renovated and returned to its original glory some eighty years later.

We are so lucky to have Father Anthony Le, leading us in this venture. He has great instincts when it comes to beauty and Church decor. Plus he is a cool customer under fire. We are so lucky to have him guiding us.

My favorite stained glass window is the one donated by the Perez family who lost their Patriarch (Joaquin) out along waterfront road in 1967. Plus a sibling was lost too! This stained glass window which is the first one on the left side of the Church recalls two famous Saints of the Church Universal. They are St. John the Baptist and St. Thomas More the great Lawyer and Martyr from the English law tradition. Both of them died for their faith in defending traditional marriage. Another favorite of mine is the great Stained Glass window in the back of the Church just above the choir loft. It professes glory and depicts Our Blessed Mother in her glory as Queen of Heaven. Our renovation is bringing us at St. Catherine's to new levels of appreciation for what we have been given. I invite all Martinez people to come and see our Church, our masterpiece of art and spirituality. It belongs to all of us in Martinez. Thomas P Greerty

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The readings today center on mindfulness, awareness of where we stand in God's plan. The mountain of Sinai carries a message of the majesty and distance of God, while Jesus' presence as host of the banquet speaks of intimacy and mystery. September's shadow calls us all to mindfulness as we prepare to return to life outside of summer. The Christian life holds these two places of knowledge of God in careful balance. Even in the accounts of the Passion we see the table of the upper room in balance with the Mount of Olives.

Altar means "high place," yet it is also a table. The former liturgy of the Latin Rite began with the priest bowing at the foot of the altar's three steps, chanting *In*troibo ad altare Dei, or "I will go to the altar of God," followed by the altar servers' response, "The God who gives joy to my youth." Many parishioners can recall and recite this scene by heart. As with so many things in liturgy, there are layers of meaning in our worship. The altar table evokes memories of the high places once reserved for encounter with the holy, and the intimacy of the table where hospitality draws us to share food and drink.

To form a joyful family community that reaches out and receives one another as Christ reaches out and receives us.

"The host family/ministry/club is responsible for serving at all Sunday Masses. This means setting up the tables and chairs in the hall as well as serving food. The requirement for food is that is must be prepared in our kitchen or store-bought (readymade). No homemade items can be served unless prepared in a commercial kitchen like ours. Gloves should be worn when handling the food. There are color coded cutting mats to help us avoid cross contamination. After the last Mass, the host family/ministry/club is responsible for cleaning the tables and chairs and returning them to the appropriate location. kitchen should be cleaned. Cleaning products are stocked under the hand-sink. A special cleaner is used on the stainless-steel counters and tables. If the oven or microwave is used, it also must be cleaned. A kitchen handbook will be available in the next week or two and stored in one of the drawers marked "Handbook". The group can refer to the guidelines on such topics as how to handle food and how to operate the commercial oven. Avoiding throwaway plastic bottles and utensils? Supporting earth-friendly companies and causes? Add a daily prayer for Mother Earth.

Labor deserves dignity

As Americans celebrate Labor Day, we do well to recall that Catholic teaching honors work but reminds us that work is to serve humans, not humans to serve work. The human needs of those who labor must never be shunted aside. Both accounts bookend a life of teaching, preaching, and ealing, where Jesus wins the trust of his beloved by leading them into deeper waters, delivering improbable results that boggle the mind but stir the soul. Trust where Jesus asks you to go, into the depth of your heart and abilities. TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:9-14; Luke 5:1-11 (434). "Put out into the deep water."

Pious Jews in Jesus' time were meticulous about following the rules, and there were a lot of rules. Jesus, however, was a rule-breaker, a boundary-crosser. James Martin, author of *Between Heaven and Mirth*, points out, "We feel drawn to religious leaders with a sense of humor. It shows us that they understand their essential poverty of spirit and their own reliance on God. It shows humility, which is also essential in the spiritual life. You take God seriously, Jesus seriously, and the gospel seriously, but you shouldn't take yourself too seriously."




Sing a New Song Unto the Lord:
