FOUR SUGGESTIONS FOR HELPING MEMBERS GROW

Especially over the summer

Many courts do not meet during the summer, therefore providing more leisure time for court officers to recommit to growing as members of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas. It also provides opportunities for members to grow by adding good programs and workshops into their yearly planner. The following suggestions may help us prepare so all members have the opportunity to continue their growth as Catholic Daughters and local leaders in their community.

1. Rule-making and the heart

Every organization needs rules to keep the group running smoothly. Catholic Daughters have the Bylaws and Tools of the Trade as their guides. The important word in that sentence is guide. Because this organization is made up of human beings, sometimes it is good to remember that the members are volunteers who willingly give of their time. It is unrealistic to expect a member who is experiencing a distressing time in her life to be at an event or help with that event even though she had been assigned to be there. Anytime you must decide between the policy and the heart, go with the heart.

2. Expenses and training

Training for new officers can seem expensive. Yet focusing just on the cost is counterproductive to having officers

who are trained and competent in serving their court. Encourage all members, but especially the officers to attend workshops and conventions presented by the state and national officers. Support court officers financially as well. Put the cost of travel, lodging and registration in your court budget. Your investment will be rewarded with outstanding officers and members more willing to take on a new office because they have had the training and

support of their local court members.

3. Asking all or just a select few

Every court has that one person who can set up the bazaar, do all the advertising, manage the bake sale, and run the lunch stand. She has her clique who work with her and "outsiders" are really not made to feel welcome. Be certain that all members feel they can contribute to a venture. Members who feel insignificant will soon lose interest and could become lost members of the court. New ideas should always be encouraged and welcomed.

4. Controlling or coaching

Asking a member to be a Circle of Love chairman or to be the chairman of an event or project can be rewarding to that member if she is allowed to use her own creative resources. The best leaders will coach the member rather than only pointing out the mistakes that could be or were made. Coaching allows the leader to accentuate strengths and improve weaknesses. Coaching also gives the member courage to tackle another task and grow in their love and understanding for our wonderful organization.

Continue to be positive and helpful to all members. Enjoy your leadership position. -

HISTORY

Do you know how our Catholic Daughters Texas State Court got its start? It actually got started right in our own neck of the woods, Houston, Texas. There were twelve courts included in the Establishment of the Texas State Court. Eight of the first eleven State Regents came from courts that were part of the initial establishment in 1917. (Denoted by matching color of Regent and Court Below.)

Excerpt from CDA Texas State Website:

The National Order selected Houston, Texas as the site to institute the eighth state court in the nation. On **January 25, 1917**, Genevieve Walsh, Supreme National Regent 1915-1923, presided at the establishment of the **Texas State Court** with twelve courts. (A state must have a minimum of five courts before the formation of a state court) **The Original Twelve Courts**





Isaac Tepperman's Essay Entry

"Here I Am Lord, I Come to do Your Will"

As members of the body of Christ, we are called to serve the Lord through our ministry to one another. This mutual service is clearly detailed in Psalm 40: 8-10, as it is written, "See; I come with an inscribed scroll written upon me. I delight to do your will, my God ... When I sing of your righteousness in a great assembly, See I do not restrain my lips "Throughout our lives, God provides bountiful opportunities for us to be the scroll of His inscriptions, made ready to be translated and understood by those in need of His love and mercy. These occasions usually present themselves as consoling a grieving friend, sharing our time and talents for the benefit of our community, or even just continually attending Mass and inspiring those around us to do the same.

In fact, in a broader sense, our whole lives are chances to answer the Lord's call and to see that His will be done. Another book of the Old Testament makes this apparent, as it is written in Jeremiah 1:5 that, "Before I [the Lord] formed you in the womb I knew you. Before you were born I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you." Though the Lord spoke these words to a young Jeremiah, a future prophet himself, His message also applies to our lives today. From the beginning of time, God had planned and dedicated each one of us to a life on earth. This was done by His power and according to His plan. Everyday we spend moving forward in life is another day spent doing God's will, for truly He has placed each of us here for a reason. Through our accordance with His will by continuing to live the life He gave us, we also open ourselves up to do His will through the spiritual gifts He has divided among us. Our discernment and application of these gifts makes us all modem-day prophets and stewards to His will.

One of the most extraordinary Biblical figures to answer God's call in this way, particularly to us as Catholics, was Mary, the mother of our Lord. Upon her visitation by the angel Gabriel with startling news of her future, Mary was initially confused and troubled, as she was a young virgin who had never had relations with any man. However, just four verses later, Mary accepts all that the angel had revealed to her, confidently saying, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word," By agreeing to give birth to Jesus, Mary provides a shining example of perfect service to the Lord for us to emulate.

Though we cannot all stand before Israel and preach as Jeremiah, nor bear the Savior of the world as Mary, we can all seek to live our lives with grace so that we may answer God's call and proclaim, "Here I am Lord, I come to do your will."





Monsignor Leo arrived at St. Michael the Archangel Catholic Church, 35 years ago, in 1984. He had been ordained 19 years earlier attending St. Mary's Seminary in Houston. Lake Jackson wasn't a new area to Father Leo because he grew up in Freeport and graduated from Freeport High School. It wasn't until August 1991 that St. Michael chartered a Catholic Daughters of the Americas court.

Our Lady Queen of the Lake Court 2364 was chartered with 90 members and Msgr. Leo as our Court Chaplain. A stipulation to starting a Catholic Daughter court at the parish was that they had to serve coffee & donuts. Father Leo was open to the idea and in August 1991 Our Lady Queen of the Lake was chartered. Twenty-eight years later and 32 of those members are still active.

While talking with Msgr. Leo he said it was a blessing to have parish members willing to step up and saying yes to contribute and participate as a growing and vibrant parish. He said, "I believe that St. Michael is one of the best parishes in the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston." He also wanted to truly thank all the members of Catholic Daughters, members that have passed away, members that are currently here and those members still to come for wanting to grow in our faith and make this a great
