It seems lately we have gotten very comfortable even though the pandemic is much more dangerous. I encourage you to evaluate what you are doing and do not take anything for granted. Many of us are at great risk and could die if we get the virus. The Governor cited home gatherings. I notice if I drive somewhere while the Browns are playing, there are many cars in a lot of driveways. It might be that we think these gatherings are safe. But I think the numbers would indicate otherwise.

On another note, Father Spisak had hip surgery on Tuesday November 11. He is recovering at a nursing home in Middleburg Heights. He told me his mother has Covid. So they both could use some prayers.

Thanksgiving is Thursday. Mass will be at 9am and people can attend with masks and social distancing. It is important always to be thankful, even during a pandemic. The pilgrims were not on easy street when they thanked God. Abraham Lincoln was in the middle of The Civil War when he declared the holiday. It is appropriate that we too thank God.

Today we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. Advent begins next Sunday.

Notes from Sister Noel...



Last week I went to a virtual Diocesan Catechetical Leadership Meeting. The meetings occur usually every month. This was my first of the school year though I have been to many over the years.

The Diocesan Office Directors from the Secretariat for Parish Life and Development spoke to us. There has been much change in church offices through decisions made by Bishop Perez. The impact of these decisions are now evident.

One of the interesting outcomes include the separation of the Catechetical Office and the Catholic Education Office with their own Directors. This is the way it had been during Bishop Pilla's time. When Bishop Lennon came, he joined these two offices under one Director. As you can imagine, it was a difficult position to keep up with. Each area has distinctive needs. Greg Coogan, Director of the Catechetical Office, relocated from Buffalo, to take the current position. He convened our gathering.

Greg had speakers present from the following offices: Office of Missionary Discipleship (previously Evangelization Office), Office of Marriage and Family, Office of Young Adult Ministry and the Office of Youth Ministry. All directors are new to the Cleveland Diocesan offices. Bishop Perez had encouraged all the offices to be more collaborative and communicative with one another and those they serve. We are now seeing the impact of that vision.

We welcome Bishop Malesic to enter into the dialogue in an on-going manner setting the direction for the Church of Cleveland along with all the office personnel and committees which see their own responsibility in carrying out the work of the Gospel.

Each speaker was engaging and spoke of their office and the services available to us at the parish level. It became clear that though each office has a certain area or group on which to focus, the thread of Evangelization, spreading the Gospel, is woven in each.

I thought this little snapshot could be helpful in letting you know the impact of having and implementing a vision which is to give life to everyone. I feel really good about that. You, too? I will keep you posted as we move ahead.

Notes from Deacon Cameron ...

Each fall, the Church celebrates “Priesthood Sunday,” a weekend to express our gratitude for the priests that have ministered to us, especially those who are currently serving us. With that in mind, I am personally grateful for Fr. Tom Sweany. Not only has he graciously opened his living space to me, I have learned so much from his wisdom, experience and unique gifts. His faithfulness in serving the community of St Anselm and Chesterland is incredible.

As a seminarian, “Priesthood Sunday” is a weekend that all of the seminarians go out to parishes throughout the Diocese of Cleveland to briefly share their personal story, to encourage young people to consider a religious vocation, and to encourage all people to pray for and to encourage vocations in their parish community.

I grew up in Strongsville with my parents, 7 brothers and 2 sisters. My parents took their vocation of marriage and parenting very seriously; they brought us to Church, we prayed in our home on a daily basis (unless we got overloaded on diapers and dishes. Life happens sometimes). My siblings and I grew up playing outside in our neighborhood, primarily playing whatever sport was ‘in-season.’ By high school, soccer reigned as the most important season. I was involved in youth group, primarily as a social outlet and to meet girls, but my youth minister at the time, Paul Koopman made a lasting impact on me through his witness of faith and vocation of marriage. He invited me to consider visiting the Borromeo Seminary in Wickliffe. I was strangely drawn to the idea but it got lost in the midst of explanations of “what I wanted to do in life” and continuing to play soccer.

I received a scholarship to play College soccer at Ave Maria University. I had a great experience at Ave, meeting and becoming friends with really good people, studying the Liberal Arts as well as Biology. But I also strayed from the path of faith that my parents had formed me with, focusing more and more on myself and less on what God might be calling me to. I had a great 4 years, but something was missing. Near graduation, I joined a handful of classmates on a trip to Haiti with the Missionaries of Charity, Mother Teresa’s order. I had a deep sense that my life had changed then; a desire to serve had been awakened.

As I spent the next year growing closer to God in prayer, going to Adoration and discerning my next step, I noticed many people around me pursuing their vocations; married life, religious life, discerning priesthood in the seminary. “What is God calling me to?” I asked myself. I spent 2014 in Williston, North Dakota working the Oil patch, with a mixture of desires: for money to distract, adventure and solitude. My future path became much clearer during that year; I felt peace and consolation knowing that if God was calling me to this, it would, somehow, satisfy my deepest desires.

Throughout my five years at *St Mary’s Seminary & Graduate School of Theology* in Wickliffe it has had it’s ups and downs, trying to figure out how to integrate the peace I felt moving towards Priesthood, along with the continued desire to be married and have a family. I always felt secure knowing that if God was calling me to be His priest, that He would satisfy the desires of my heart. In the months since I was ordained a Deacon, I have been filled to the brim with gratitude to God, as well as all of the people of St. Anselm Parish as I’m embarking on the adventure of life!

WHERE ARE YOU IN THE BODY OF CHRIST?

A Time To Be Grateful... "There are many **"Parts,"** but we are all **"One Body!"**"



Here we are! We have come to the 8th and the last "Where Are You in the Body of Christ?" article. I have done my best to describe the 6 living generations that make up our country at this time. Each of us and every American we know or do not know is a member of either the GI, Silent, Boomer, X, Millennial(Y), or Z generations, with the exception of those 6 years and younger, who at this time are called the "Alpha" Generation and are the children of the Millennials. "The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I do not need you.' Nor can the head say to the feet, 'I do not need you.' If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it." (*1Cor. 12:21, 26*). "So, in Christ, we who are many are one body, and **each member belongs to one another.**" (*Romans 12:5*)

Ever since I was quite young, I have loved meeting and getting to know others of all ages, races, and cultures. At times, I shared with my closest friends, "I wish to meet every person in the world because then I would have met Christ in every person." Maybe this is why I love to travel, not only to learn and enjoy the beauty of American cities and other countries, but to encounter Christ and that beautiful "part of the body" that belongs to those who call it "their home." Each of us represents a unique part of the "Body of Christ" and even when God calls us home to Himself, "our part of the Body" will never be replaced in the same way because God created us in His image and for a special purpose like no other in all of His creation. This may be the reason for my desire to know those I have never met on my "family ancestral tree." I am here today because of God's designed plan for them and because of the unique "part of the body" they represented while on earth and continue to represent forever in time.

As Thanksgiving Day draws near, let us give thanks to God for those past generations whose footsteps we follow and who are loved ones we miss. May we continue to grow in respect, understanding, and acceptance of one another, to witness by our lives and invite our younger "parts of the body" to join us on our most precious Catholic journey, and to celebrate our diversity and our common longing for God.

Every generation since the time of Christ has been entrusted to carry on the mission of His Church. This is our time. We, all the Catholic generations of faith, are the Church of God united in one Spirit. Let us strive together to reignite within ourselves and one another the fire of Pentecost that rested upon the first disciples of Jesus. We are now called to be those "first" disciples.

This my first Thanksgiving at St. Anselm Parish. Even in the midst of coming on board as your pastoral associate during a pandemic, I have met the heart of Christ through the intergenerational hearts at our St. Anselm School, Church, and Parish. You have made me feel very welcome and loved. God has brought me to your "home," and I thank you for making me feel "at home." As we celebrate Thanksgiving 2020, may all of us know the goodness of a God who loves us individually as **"a 'part' of Him"** and who calls us together as His **"One Body,"** One Family, the Church!
