



On Wednesday, January 27th, Miss Susan Pohly, our school principal told me she plans to retire at the end of



this school year. I tried to talk her out of it but she feels this is the right time for her. Although I understand, I would still like her to stay. She told parents and teachers the next day. The reason for telling them so quickly is that we do not want to search for the new principal until teachers and parents know. We have already been brain storming. It is early enough that we should find a good principal. Your prayers are appreciated.

On February 1, we received a letter from Bishop Malesic which he asked us to share in the bulletin. It is about a Task Force regarding Catholic Schools. A key paragraph for me starts, "The initiative is not about closing schools, merging them or suggesting major reconfiguration throughout the Diocese". The principal's retirement and the letter are unrelated, just bad timing.

On another note, we will be sending you a letter that should arrive before Lent. In the letter will be several things that will be helpful for Lent. There will be a packet of ashes, a schedule and explanation of Lenten activities we will have in church and on-line and two crosses on paper that will allow you to mark your progress with things you choose to do for Lent. The mailing will explain all of this. There will be "Monday Night Live", featuring Sister Denise, Deacon Cameron and I might have at least a bit part. Wednesdays, there will be a Holy Hour and Mass. Fridays will have stations in the afternoon and evening. Children's stations will be in there too but we have not settled on the day and time yet. Everything will be on-line and archived so you can watch when it is convenient for you. Notes from Sister Noel ...

On February 2 we celebrated World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Religious. It was a day to pray for and acknowledge the work done by men and women



belonging to Religious Communities. Ursuline Sisters celebrated on Jan. 27th our Foundress, St. Angela Merici, a 15th century Renaissance woman who brought change to the church and to the lives of women. Here's a bit about her.

Angela lived in a time that women would either be married or live in a cloister. During her time, many wealthy daughters who may not have chosen or been chosen by someone for marriage were sent to a convent by their parents. They often were sent with their servants. As you can imagine, this would not be a good way to create strong cloistered communities!

Angela saw that the monasteries of the day were lax. Her Call was not to reform them. Other reformers, in time, would do just that. Her Call was to follow her heart, discerning the Spirit's direction for her. This would take time. In the meantime, Angela herself grew in her love of God and her love of others through prayer and service. Angela saw the need for women committed to God, connected through a simple vow of virginity, to live within the homes of families with young girls. They would help form these young girls in becoming eventually faith-filled mothers. Was this not an early form of catechesis?

Angela saw the need for women of her time to have a sense of their own worth and to develop a spiritual life that would enhance their ability to assist others in discovering the Spirit's Call for them. Angela did not see her Daughters in any specific occupation. It was their spiritual presence that they were to bring each day to those they served. Her charism still enlivens us in 2021!

Angela's wisdom also drew civic and church leaders to seek her advice. Her ability to bring peace to family and community conflicts made her known in Italy as a spiritual director and reconciler.

This Spirit of Angela certainly belongs in our time. We, too, live in a world that is surrounded by conflict and unrest. Our world calls for the presence of the Spirit. St Angela still speaks to Ursulines today (and to all women) to recognize the importance of weaving prayer and service for a world in need.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This past week in our country we celebrated Catholic Schools Week. I celebrated a Mass at the Cathedral that was virtually watched in all our Catholic Elementary Schools. It was a great joy for me. In that same joy, I wanted to share some exciting news! Since coming to the Diocese of Cleveland this past fall, I have come to see that one of our great treasures is our Catholic School System. We are blessed with 87 Elementary Schools and 20 High Schools as well as a number of preschools, childcare centers, colleges and universities. We educate over 37,000 children in our K through 12 schools. Without a doubt, this is a very important youth ministry of our diocese.

Aware of shifting demographics, enrollment challenges, and a desire for a renewed vision for Catholic education here, a yearlong "Think Tank" was convened under the leadership of my predecessor, now Archbishop Nelson Perez. This Think Tank emphasized the need for a plan for Catholic schools in the Diocese as well as the need to address several areas of concern, ranging from governance and finance to efforts to offer high quality and vibrant Catholic schools accessible to all.

With the transfer of Archbishop Perez and the limitations caused by the pandemic, strategic planning was put on hold. Over the last few months I have met with various stakeholders around the Diocese as well as many priests and other leaders. They have encouraged me to restart this strategic planning process as soon as possible. I am now able to move this forward.

I am very excited to announce the Keeping the Faith: The Future of Catholic Schools Initiative in our Diocese. This initiative is a major undertaking in our Diocese, and I have assembled a task force to lead us through this process and present me with a strategic plan for our Catholic Elementary Schools by May 2022. After reviewing the plan with additional consultation, I hope to begin to implement this plan in the 2022 – 2023 school year.

The Task Force is charged with creating a plan with objectives, strategies, and tactics to keep our schools grounded in the Catholic faith, academically excellent, and as widely available and affordable as possible within our Diocese. The hope is that this plan will serve as a model that can be used to strengthen our Catholic high school system and guide our Parish Schools of Religion, Youth Ministry and Adult Faith Formation programs.

The Task Force includes just over 50 members to assist in this work. These members represent clergy, school staff, diocesan staff, and members of the business community and experts in education.

This initiative is not about closing schools, merging them, or suggesting major reconfiguration throughout the Diocese. While some of this may come naturally as part of the process, I believe that we can create something that allows Catholic schools to be viable, accessible, and vibrant for those who want them to be the best option for their children's education and Christian formation.

The Task Force will use the guiding principles of Strong Mission, Multiple Models, Subsidiarity, Parish and Diocesan Support, Parental Choice, and Innovation in creating this plan. The Task Force will look specifically at and make recommendations to strengthen six areas of Catholic Schools: Quality &

Catholicity, Leadership, Data Systems, Finances, Governance and Marketing and Communications. Finally, we will work to create an atmosphere within the Diocese of Cleveland that emphasizes the relationship of our Catholic schools to each other rather than one that encourages an unhealthy competition among them. The education and Christian formation of our youth is the responsibility of all of us, and this must also include our common support of our Catholic schools.

Considering this treasured heritage and shifting context, I, and leaders of Catholic schools in the Diocese believe it is the right time to reflect deeply and creatively on the vision, strategy, and operational norms of Catholic schools in the Diocese of Cleveland, to deepen and renew the commitment to our mission, and to chart a course for the future of Catholic schools in the Diocese of Cleveland. We look forward to sharing with you in the coming months and years our plans to Keep the Faith with a secure and strong Future for our Catholic Schools.

May God bless the children in our care, their families, all those who serve the educational mission of our Church, you, and those you love.

From the of Sister Denise Marie ...

Happy February! This is always a mid-winter month filled with special days to see us through to Spring. Valentine's Day, President's Day, and Mardi Gras brighten our winter days as we begin the penitential season of Lent on Ash Wednesday, February 17th. Tucked between all of these celebrations is the *Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes*.

I first learned about the story of Lourdes as a very young girl when I watched the old-time movie, "The Song of Bernadette," which once premiered and won 4 Oscars at the Academy Awards in 1943. It certainly was a different world back then.

On a cold February 11th day in 1858, fourteen-year-old Bernadette Soubirous accompanied her sister and a friend to find firewood. The girls ventured to a cave called Massabielle, which means "old rock" in French. While Bernadette's sister and friend went ahead crossing an ice-cold creek, Bernadette felt the rush of a wind and saw in the grotto a "beautiful lady," who "wore a white dress, a blue sash and a yellow rose on each foot, the same color as the chain of her rosary." Bernadette continued to describe her experience with *The Lady*:

When I saw her, I rubbed my eyes; I thought I was mistaken. I put my hand into my pocket and found my rosary. I wanted to make the sign of the cross, but was unable to lift my hand to my forehead, it just fell back. The Lady made the sign of the cross. My hand was trembling; I tried again and succeeded. I said my rosary; she allowed her beads to pass through her fingers but did not move her lips.

With a smile, the beautiful Lady asked Bernadette to return...there were 18 visitations! As these visions continued, on February 25th something remarkable happened. The Lady told Bernadette to "drink of the spring and wash there and to eat of the greens that grew." By the next day this spring which Bernadette had dug with her own hands bubbled up and cleared. To this day the spring runs and many miracles have been attributed to these waters through the intercession of the Virgin Mary and the healing Hand of God. On March 25th, Bernadette asked the Lady her name. She smiled and said, "I am the Immaculate Conception."

Bernadette entered the order of the Sisters of Charity. She died of tuberculosis at the age of 35 on April 16, 1879 while praying the rosary. After her death, for the cause of canonization, Bernadette's body was exumed three times. Each time her body was found free of decay and today she remains as beautiful in death as she was in life. On December 8, 1933, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Bernadette was canonized a saint in Rome by Pope Piux XI.

In the summer of 2005, I traveled to Lourdes, France on behalf of my dying brother Larry, who was not able to make the pilgrimage himself. I asked our Lady of Lourdes, "Please Mother, may the healing waters of Lourdes upon my flesh also flow over the flesh of Larry at home." Throughout my entire pilgrimage, I constantly prayed to Our Lady of Lourdes and to St. Bernadette, seeking their intercession that God may heal my very sick brother of leukemia. To this very day, I attribute their prayers and the prayers of so many for the miraculous healing of Larry.



In 1992, St. John Paul II instituted that every February 11th would be *World Day for the Sick* as a day of prayer for one's own suffering and to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness and for their caregivers. Pope John Paul II had recently been diagnosed with Parkinson's, and it is considered that his own illness was the incentive for his designation of this day. On February 11, 2013 Pope Benedict XVI resigned from his post as the pope, citing his failing health as the reason behind his decision.

Our Blessed Mother understands what pain and suffering is because she herself shared in the passion of her Son Jesus. May Our Lady of Lourdes and St. Bernadette bring your prayers to her Son and intercede most especially for your loved ones who are ill and for all those around the world struggling with the coronavirus.
