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
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

# First Sunday of Advent (C) Jeremiah 33:14–16 / 1 Thessalonians 3:12—4:2/Luke 21:25–28, 34–36

Advent is a time of hope but also a time of waiting. Different than wishing, hope is the belief that, one day, all will be well.

Teenagers eagerly wait to be out on their own, believing then all will be well. Students are eager to graduate and get away from papers to write, books to read, and exams to take—then all will be well. Some singles long to find a partner, marry, and settle down, believing—then—all will be well.

Always there is the faith that, although life may not now be what we wish, the future will bring a time when all will be well. We are inveterate people of hope. Yet life is a process that cannot be rushed.

Author Annie Dillard once watched a butterfly hatch from a cocoon. A bit impatient, she decided to gently warm the cocoon and so hasten the process. It worked, except by rushing the process the butterfly's wings were undeveloped, too weak to fly. All that we hope and long for in life must happen at its own pace, faithful to the process.

How, then, do we negotiate the waiting? The Gospel's encouragement is to pray, but not for what we want. Rather, we are to pray for the strength to stand with hope before the Son of Man, trusting that God will bring forth the goodness we need. Though it may be different than what we seek, it will be what we need.

# dear Padre

I've been Catholic all my life, but I don't understand Advent. It's too much like Lent and seems an odd way to prepare for the birth of a baby.

In a society that is primarily secular, one skill of the believing Christian is the ability to balance competing realities. From a secular perspective, Christmas is part of the period identified as the "holidays," beginning with Thanksgiving until New Year's Day, when it abruptly ends and stores begin advertising Valentine's Day.

For Christians, Christmas is the day we celebrate the birth of Jesus, the great promise fulfilled after centuries of waiting and expectation. The creative energy of the Father is displayed in wonder and awe as the angels sing and people of good faith gather to celebrate. We join our ancestors in anticipation of this event through the liturgical season of Advent, a time of waiting and preparation.

The Christian holy day is a singular day, the feast of the Nativity of the Lord—Christmas—but the Church continues the celebration of God's life and love through the days that follow, culminating in the Baptism of the Lord, the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus. We are invited to hold the secular and the liturgical experiences in an integrated balance.

We can celebrate the secular holidays and we can enter the liturgical season that helps us contemplate something much grander and more spectacular.

#### Father Josh's Liturgical Tidbits: The Gestures at Mass

Now that we have gone through the different parts of the Mass, let's move on to the different gestures during Mass, starting with a general overview. Something that distinguishes our Catholic worship from other Christian services is that within the Mass we use quite a few different gestures: sitting, standing, kneeling, bowing, genuflecting, striking the breast, etc.

You may have wondered why we do all of these things in Mass and why not simply sit down for the duration. The answer is quite simple, really. We make gestures in Mass, because *they convey basic human emotions communicated through actions*. When the president of a country enters a conference room, most people in that room will probably stand in order to greet him/her. In the ancient world, if the king and queen is in someone's presence, then that person would usually greet them with one knee on the ground or by bowing. If a person is sorry for something they've done, one of the ways they can express their sorrow for their offense is to strike their chest. We do all of these basic gestures in Mass, too!

Remember now, whenever we're in Mass, we are in the presence of Jesus Christ, the King of the Universe. We stand in the beginning to honor His entrance in our worship; we strike our breast during the *confiteor* to express sorrow for our offenses against Him; like Jesus' disciples, we sit down as we listen to His words and stories; and we kneel down as He presents Himself to us as our King and Savior. We don't make different gestures in Mass just because we're told to do it; rather, we make them because there's usually a symbolic meaning attached to them.
