Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) Isaiah 66:18–21 / Hebrews 12:5–7, 11–13 / Luke 13:22– 30

Some people find love in their lives; others complain of loneliness. Some find peace, while others seem to be perpetually angry. Some live comfortably amid human diversity, yet others insist that the rest of the world be like them. My wife mentioned that neither the Book of Mormon nor the Catholic Bible mentions purgatory. Please comment.

A not-uncommon frustration is when a person searches the Bible for a particular word or phrasing. Frankly, it is expecting too much from the religious text to be able to faithfully record a particular word or phrase that originated hundreds of years after the ancient text was composed. Purgatory is one such example of this frustration. The concept of purgatory is referenced in the biblical text, particularly in 2 Corinthians 5:10 and 7:1, Hebrews 9:27 and 12:14, and 2 Maccabees 12:46, but the word is never used. This should come as no real surprise because it was not until the writings of St. Thomas Aquinas (1225) -1274) that the concept was expanded and formed into a theological statement of belief that has become central to Roman Catholicism.

And what is that belief? The Catechism of the Catholic Church is clear: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different punishment from the of damned" (CCC, 1030, 1031a). The Book of Mormon never references purgatory, but it does speak about the afterlife and the experience of "waiting" in the spirit world for the completion of earthly time.

# Pray for our Sick and Deceased Loved Ones

### Father Josh's Liturgical Tidbits: <u>The Lord's Prayer (Part III)</u>

The last line in the Our Father, the one that asks "lead us not into temptation" has often bewildered many. How and why would God lead us into temptation or why would he entice us to sin?

The problem with the English language is it often does not show the original meaning of the Greek that the Gospels were written in. The original Greek word that was used here is "peirasmos" ( $\pi \epsilon i \rho \alpha \sigma \mu \delta \zeta$ ), which is the same word used for trials or temptations.

The petition in this prayer does not mean that God will entice us to sin, because God tempts no one. However, God does permit that we go through trials not so we can fall into sin, but to grow in strength. Like how a professor will give "trials" or "tests" to his students, not for them to fail, but to succeed.

Unfortunately, as is frequently the case, when we go through trials, temptations can arise. So the Greek here is ambiguous, but that ambiguity actually reveals a truth; it is in the midst of trials that we are tempted to fall away and commit a sin. So this petition, "lead us not into temptation," is not asking that we be enticed to sin, but rather that the Lord may send us his grace to help us not yield into temptation during times of trials.
