**Mystery Of The Eucharist In The Life Of The Church**  
USCCB – Transformation in Christ #37. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* reminds us that the “Eucharist commits us to the poor. To receive in truth the Body and Blood of Christ given up for us, we must recognize Christ in the poorest, his brethren.” (51 - *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 1397.)  
Preaching on Mt 25, Saint John Chrysostom observed: “Do you wish to honour the body of Christ? Do not ignore him when he is naked. Do not pay him homage in the temple clad in silk only then to neglect him outside where he suffers cold and nakedness. He who said: ‘This is my body’ is the same One who said: ‘You saw me hungry and you gave me no food.’” (52 - *St. John Chrysostom, Homilies on the Gospel of Matthew* , 50, 3-4: PG 58, 508-509, as cited by Pope John Paul II in *Dies Domini* , no. 71.)  
Saint Teresa of Calcutta is an outstanding example in more recent times of someone who learned to recognize Christ in the poor. It was her deep faith in the Eucharist and her reception of Holy Communion that motivated her loving care of the poorest of the poor and commitment to the sanctity of all human life. In beholding the face of Christ in the Eucharist, she learned to recognize his face in the poor and suffering. Mother Teresa is said to have asserted: “We must pray to Jesus to give us that tenderness of the Eucharist. Unless we believe and see Jesus in the appearance of bread on the altar, we will not be able to see him in the distressing disguise of the poor.”

### **Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ**

– Today we celebrate that Jesus has made Himself really present among us in the Eucharist wanting to give us Himself in Holy Communion. With belief in the Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist waning among professed Catholics, U.S. bishops are launching a three-year grassroots revival of devotion and faith in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, culminating in the first National Eucharistic Congress in the U.S. since 1975. The congress will take place in Indianapolis in 2024. The revival kicks off this Sunday June 19, the feast of Corpus Christi, with Eucharistic processions taking place in archdioceses and dioceses around the country. While we will not have a procession here today, we will have time for adoration after Sunday masses. I encourage you to study the Real Presence a bit. Here are some of many options: (1) Find out about a Eucharistic procession on-line. (2) Read about the conversion of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first American-born saint and co-founder of Catholic education in the U.S. When through a series of events she found herself in Italy, she learned from Catholic friends that the Lord was really present in the Eucharist. She longed to be close to and receive Jesus in the Eucharist and so became Catholic. Before her reception into the Church, she would sit in a seat in her Episcopalian church that was closest to a Catholic Church. Upon her reception into the Catholic Church at St. Peter's in NYC she said in her mind "At last, God is Mine! And I am His!" (3) Read about one of the many Eucharistic Miracles, such as in Lanciano, Italy, when in the 700s a monk who doubted that Jesus becomes really present at mass in Holy Communion, received a miracle when the bread and wine actually changed appearance to look like body and blood with – as shown by scientific studies - the chemical properties of fresh blood, type AB, and which remains to this day in Lanciano, Italy. (4) Read about the Angel of Fatima's teaching the children about the Real Presence (see below). (5) Make a resolution to stop in a Church to pray on a weekday(s) in front of Jesus in the tabernacle, maybe even a weekly holy hour. (6) Read a Catholic Commentary on Jesus Real Presence such as from Edward Sri on John 6. There are many more options. Lord Jesus help us grow in our gratitude and love for your abiding presence in the Holy Eucharist.

**Blessed and Given:** Scott Hahn Reflects on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ *Gen 14:18–20; Psalm 110:1–4; 1 Cor 11:23–26; Luke 9:11–17* At the dawn of salvation history, God revealed our future in figures. That's what's going on in today's First Reading: a priest-king comes from Jerusalem (see Psalm 76:3), offering bread and wine to celebrate the victory of God's beloved servant, Abram, over his foes. By his offering, Melchizedek bestows God's blessings on Abram. He is showing us, too, how one day we will receive God's blessings and in turn "bless God"—how we will give thanks to Him for delivering us from our enemies, sin and death.

As Paul recalls in today's Epistle, Jesus transformed the sign of bread and wine, making it a sign of His body and blood, through which God bestows upon us the blessings of His "new covenant."

Jesus is "the priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek," that God, in today's Psalm, swears will rule from Zion, the new Jerusalem (see Heb 6:20–7:3). By the miracle of loaves and fishes, Jesus in today's Gospel, again prefigures the blessings of the Eucharist. Notice that He takes the bread, blesses it, breaks it, and gives it to the Twelve. You find the precise order and words in the Last Supper (see Luke 22:19) and in His celebration of the Eucharist on the first Easter night (see Luke 24:30).

The Eucharist fulfills the offering of Melchizedek. It is the daily miracle of the heavenly high priesthood of Jesus. It is a priesthood He conferred upon the Apostles in ordering them to feed the crowd, in filling exactly twelve baskets with leftover bread—in commanding them on the night He was handed over:

"Do this in remembrance of Me."

Through His priests He still feeds us in "the deserted place" of our earthly exile.

And by this sign He pledges to us a glory yet to come.

For as often as we share in His body and blood, we proclaim His victory over death, until He comes again to make His victory our own.
