


Love cultivates compassion in our hearts and solidarity with our brothers and sisters in need, and moves us to respond in an ongoing and continuous manner. The “Two Feet of Love in Action” describe how love is concretely expressed in action. In the table below, first reflect on how the Social Justice and Charitable Works responses are different. Why are both types of responses necessary? Second, in the last row, choose an issue you are interested in and then write down some possible ways to respond. In the first column, focus on Social Justice actions that can help address root causes. In the second column, identify Charitable Works that can aid individuals.

<b>General Responses</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Focuses on the rights and duties of individuals, families and all creation.</li> <li>- Analyzes social situations and structures.</li> <li>- Works for long-term social change.</li> <li>- Addresses the underlying social causes of individual problems.</li> <li>- Seeks just laws, fair social structures, and peace.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Focuses on the basic needs of individuals, families and all creation.</li> <li>- Looks at individual situations of need.</li> <li>- Meets an immediate need.</li> <li>- Addresses painful personal symptoms of social problems.</li> <li>- Relies on the generosity of donors.</li> </ul>
<b>Example: Responses to Abortion</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Extend legal protection to unborn children.</li> <li>- Adopt pro-family public policies that help families with children.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Provide prenatal care and medical services for poor women.</li> <li>- Offer crisis pregnancy services, e.g., counseling and transitional housing support.</li> </ul>
<b>Example: Responses to Homelessness</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Raise the minimum wage so workers can afford housing.</li> <li>- Expand affordable housing.</li> <li>- Expand job training opportunities and education.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Volunteer at a homeless shelter.</li> <li>- Give fast food certificates to homeless persons who ask for help.</li> <li>- Donate to an organization that does outreach to homeless persons.</li> </ul>
