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

The Liturgical Year in June: The Return to Ordinary Time


The Easter season concludes with **Pentecost** on **June 8**. We are once again back in ordinary time, but rest assured, June is not ordinary with its abundance of beautiful feast days.

The Month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. We will dig deeper into all of this for you below.



June: The Month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus (Feast: June 27)

In June, the Church invites us to turn our hearts toward the Sacred Heart of Jesus — one of the most beautiful and powerful devotions in our Catholic faith. Yet many Catholics are familiar with the term without fully knowing its meaning or significance.



The devotion to the Sacred Heart focuses on the deep, boundless love of Jesus Christ for all humanity. His Heart symbolizes not just His emotions, but His very being — burning with love, pierced for our salvation, and open to all who seek refuge in Him.

The modern form of this devotion was revealed by Jesus Himself to **St. Margaret Mary Alacoque**. In a series of visions, Jesus showed St. Margaret Mary His Heart, surrounded by thorns (symbolizing our sins) and burning with love. He asked her to promote devotion to His Heart as a way for souls to return love for love — to make reparation for

the indifference, ingratitude, and coldness He often receives.

Through St. Margaret Mary, Jesus gave twelve promises to those who honor His Sacred Heart, including:

- Peace in their families
- Comfort in their sorrows
- Strength in their labors
- Blessings upon their homes
- A secure refuge at the hour of death

The devotion particularly encourages:

- Receiving Holy Communion on the First Fridays of nine consecutive months
- Honoring the image of the Sacred Heart
- Making acts of reparation for offenses against His love
- Spending time in prayer and adoration before the Blessed Sacrament

The reminds us that Christianity is not simply a set of beliefs, but a relationship with the living Heart of Jesus — a Heart that loves, suffers, and longs for us in return.

The Holy Spirit: Our Sanctifier and Guide to

Pentecost (June 8)

As we celebrate Pentecost this June, we are reminded of the wondrous gift of the Holy Spirit — not only sent to the Church as a whole, but also to each of us personally. In reflecting on the writings of Archbishop Luis M. Martínez in *The Sanctifier**, we are invited into a deeper understanding of the Holy Spirit's intimate work in our souls.

Martínez describes the spiritual life as a "mutual possession" between the soul and the Holy Spirit. Through our free cooperation with grace — through surrender, docility, and trust — the Holy Spirit takes possession of us, and we, in turn, give ourselves entirely to Him. This relationship is not static; it is a living, transformative union. The Holy Spirit, dwelling within us, shapes us gradually into the image of Jesus Christ.

Each soul's journey to holiness is unique. Perfection does not mean becoming identical to others; rather, it means becoming the particular "Christ" God intended us to be, shaped by the Holy Spirit according to our own personality and vocation. In this transformation, we are made pleasing to God the Father — not by our own merits, but because He sees in us the reflection of His beloved Son.

Martínez reminds us that sanctity is **not primarily about extraordinary works** or visible greatness, but about **allowing the Holy Spirit to work within us**, often silently and humbly. It is through love — and especially through surrender to the Spirit's gentle action — that we grow into the full maturity of Christ.

As we approach Pentecost, may we open our hearts anew to the Holy Spirit, inviting Him to transform us in love, so that we may more perfectly mirror Jesus and give glory to the Father.

Mary, Mother of the Church: A Gift After Pentecost (June 9)

After Pentecost, the Church turns to another gift from God: Mary, whom Jesus gave to us as our Mother from the Cross: "Behold your mother." (John 19:27)

After the Ascension, Mary gathered with the Apostles in the Upper Room, praying for the coming of the Holy Spirit. At Pentecost, the Church was born — and Mary was there, mothering her Son's new Body on earth.

In 1964, Pope Saint Paul VI officially gave Mary the title *Mother of the Church*, recognizing her role from the earliest days of our faith. In 2018, Pope Francis established a special Memorial to be celebrated on the Monday after Pentecost. This ensures that, immediately after recalling the descent of the Holy Spirit, we remember the one who was already filled with the Spirit and now prays for us as our Mother.

Mary continues her mission today: leading us to Christ, praying for us, and strengthening the Church. When we struggle, we can turn to her with confidence. She is a Mother who never leaves her children.



On this beautiful feast, we are reminded: We are never alone.

We have a Mother — and through her loving intercession, the Church will endure and flourish.

Celebrating the Mystery: The Feast of the Holy Trinity (Jun 15)

On the Sunday after Pentecost, the Church celebrates the **Feast of the Most Holy Trinity** — one of the greatest mysteries of our faith. Many of us learned about the Trinity as children using simple analogies like the three leaves of a clover: three parts, but one whole. While helpful at first, the reality is even more beautiful and profound.

The Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christianity: One God in Three Divine Persons — the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Each Person is fully and truly God, sharing the same divine nature, yet each is distinct.

- The **Father** is unbegotten, the eternal source of all.
- The Son is eternally begotten of the Father, consubstantial (of the same substance) with Him.
- The Holy Spirit proceeds eternally from both the Father and the Son as their shared love.

The early Church Fathers often spoke of the Trinity in terms of **relationship and love**:

The Father loves the Son, the Son loves the Father, and the Holy Spirit is the Love between Them — a living, divine communion of perfect love.

This means that **God Himself is not solitary**, but a perfect and eternal relationship of love. When Scripture tells us, "God is love" (1 John 4:8), it is not a figure of speech. It is a revelation of God's very nature.

Why does this matter to us?

Because we are created in the image of the Trinity. We are made for communion — with God and with one another. Love, relationship, and self-gift are not just things God does; they are who God is.

Through Baptism, we are drawn into the life of the Trinity. Every prayer we make — every Mass we attend — begins and ends "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." We live within this divine relationship now and are destined to share fully in it for all eternity.

On Trinity Sunday, let us not only affirm our faith in this great mystery, but also rejoice in the incredible invitation it holds: to live in the love of the Father, through the Son, in the Holy Spirit — starting now and lasting forever.

Did You Know?

There is a Greek word, perichoresis, that's been used to describe the Trinity.

Perichoresis means "to dance around." The implication is that the Three are always moving, interweaving, enveloping, and indwelling one another in a perpetual dance





Corpus Christi: The Gift Meant to Change Us (Jun 19)

After Pentecost, the Holy Spirit filled the early Church with divine life, power, and unity. Yet the Spirit did not come just to inspire emotions or memories of Christ. He came to lead us deeper into the mystery that Jesus left us: Himself, truly present in the Eucharist.

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi is not only about adoring Christ's presence at a distance. It is about recognizing that we are meant to be transformed by Him. The same Holy Spirit who was poured out at Pentecost now draws us into union with the living Jesus — Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity — every time we receive the Eucharist.

If Pentecost is the birth of the Church, Corpus Christi is her heartbeat.

In the Eucharist, God's love is not just a message; it is a reality we touch, taste, and carry within us. Christ's Body is not simply "present" on the altar; it is offered to unite heaven and earth in every heart that receives Him with faith.

How easy it is for us to hear words like "Real Presence" without letting them penetrate our lives! Yet if we truly believe that Christ gives us His very self, it demands a response — awe, gratitude, reverence, and a willingness to be changed.

Corpus Christi invites us to renew our wonder. Not just that Jesus is here, but that He hungers for us even more than we hunger for Him. The same Spirit who made the first Apostles bold now sends us from every Mass to live as witnesses of the Love we have received.

May we receive Jesus with open hearts

— and let His life become ours.

St. John the Baptist: The Bridge Between the Old and New Testaments (Jun 24)



St. John the Baptist occupies a unique place in our faith. He is the last of the Old Testament prophets and the first prophet of the New Testament. His life marks the transition between the two

covenants, as he prepared the way for the coming of the Messiah.

Born to Zechariah and Elizabeth, John was foretold by the angel Gabriel to be the one who would "prepare the way of the Lord" (Luke 3:4). His message of repentance and baptism paved the way for Jesus to begin His public ministry. John's role was to point others to Christ: "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29).

Multiple Feast Days

St. John the Baptist is one of only two saints (the other being the Blessed Virgin Mary) whose birthdays we observe. His **birth** is celebrated on **June 24th**, marking the beginning of the great hope for the Messiah. His **martyrdom** is remembered on **August 29th**, when he was beheaded by King Herod for speaking out against his sinful actions.


A Model of Humility and Zeal

John's life was marked by humility and a burning zeal for God. He always pointed to Jesus, saying, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30). His example of selflessness and devotion to God calls us to prepare our hearts for Christ, just as he did for the people of his time.

As we celebrate his feast this June, let us reflect on how we can also "prepare the way" for the Lord in our lives.

Living a Life that Echoes Eternally — and Sharing It Through the Legacy Project Each of us is called to leave a legacy — not merely of material possessions, but of the spiritual imprint we leave on the lives around us. As Christians, our greatest legacy is the way we allow the Holy Spirit to work in and through us to build up the Body of Christ.



The Holy Spirit, whom we celebrate so richly in this season of Pentecost, is the divine Artist shaping our souls into the image of Jesus. His work within us — through the Gifts of the Spirit, the growth of virtue, and the flowering of the Fruits of the Spirit — is not meant to end with us, but to ripple outward to others.

Have you ever paused to notice how the Holy Spirit has been moving through your life? Sometimes it's in big, life-changing moments. Other times, it's a quiet nudge, a prayer answered in an unexpected way, or a gentle reminder that you're not alone.

St. Paul reminds us that each person is given the Spirit "for some benefit" (1 Cor 12:7). That means every grace we receive is also meant to bless others. Our spiritual legacy is formed by our cooperation with that grace — by our daily "yes" to the Spirit.

Even small, hidden acts — a kind word, an act of faithfulness, a silent prayer — when inspired by the Holy Spirit, can have **eternal** effects. The legacy we leave will not be primarily what we built with our own strength, but what the Spirit built in us and through us.

This summer, we invite you to reflect on that legacy by joining **The Legacy**

Project — a simple but powerful opportunity to prayerfully consider how God has moved in your life and to create a beautiful keepsake that shares your story.

1984 I had been praying for someone in my life to return to the Church, and out of nowhere, they asked me to take them to Mass.

1989 I felt an unexplainable urge to take a different route home from work, only to later learn that my usual path had a serious accident at the same time I would have been there.

1996 After struggling with 2 job offers, I prayed for guidance. The next day, a friend unknowingly spoke the exact words I needed to hear, confirming my choice.

1999 I was about to walk away from my faith when a stranger shared their testimony with me. It was as if God had sent them just for me at that moment.

 $\underline{2004}$ During a time of financial hardship, an unexpected gift arrived that covered exactly what I needed, down to the penny.

2005 Finishing a Marian apparitions book, I heard Mary urge me to repair my relationship with God. I said, "not now," but she didn't take no for an answer.

2011 When I was lost—both physically and spiritually—I prayed for help. Moments later, a kind stranger appeared to guide me exactly where I needed to go.

2016 The Holy Spirit told me 3 times to ask a grieving acquaintance what I thought was too forward a question. After doing so she was gushing joy.

 $\underline{2024}$ In the middle of grief, I suddenly felt a warmth and peace that words cannot explain. I knew it was the Holy Spirit comforting me.

The Holy Spirit is always working—we just have to take the time to notice. If you'd like to hear more about these moments, let's talk! Ind I encourage you to start your own list as a testimony of God's presence in your life.
