A Message from Fr. Bob

ASCENSION FEET



In a small medieval church in Kumla, Sweden there is a famous painting of the Ascension. It was created by Albertus Pictor renowned for his church decorations. But, when you look at it you might think something is wrong, You see the apostles staring up, but all you see of Jesus are his feet and about a foot of his garment. When I first saw it, I wondered why he didn't paint all of Jesus,

Was he not sure how to draw Jesus...did he run out of room... here was a famous painter whose Ascension painting was a cloud and feet.

Finally it dawned on me that feet were the great lesson of the Ascension. When Jesus departs, an angel asks the apostles: "Why are you standing there looking at the sky?" or in present day language: Isn't there something you should be doing...move your feet... do something... don't just stand looking to the sky. In Matthew's Gospel Jesus tells the apostles "Go, make disciples of all nations...baptizing...teaching...and I am with you until the end of the age.

This is a great day to contemplate feet...not corns and bunions but where have our feet lead us these past months. But wait ... this is lockdown time. I wasn't supposed to be going anywhere. This is only part of the truth.

We haven't been meant to stare at the sky or a TV set and feel helpless. I'm thankful for the feet and hands of responders who are working in so many medical fields to serve us. I'm thankful for the feet and cars of parishioners who have shopped for neighbors and friends

who could not. I'm thankful for the feet and hands and generosity of parishioners who were a part of the last food drive. I'm thankful for the feet and minds of imaginative people who have helped graduates celebrate. I'm thankful for the feet and creativity of those who are setting up virtual camps for the summer. I just heard of a virtual soccer camp and the soccer stars who are helping out. The list can go on and on. But then it comes to us. The angel speaks to us and asks what are we supposed to be doing.

We are not asked to look to the sky and stare at Jesus feet. We are asked to be doers and with our actions to speak the good news.

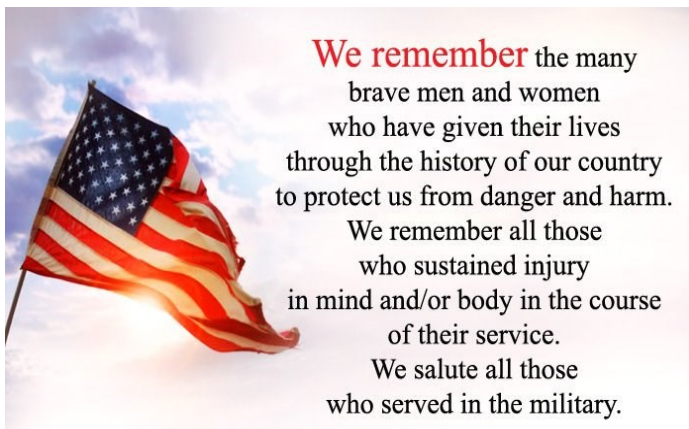

ATTENTION - Parents of Children Receiving First Reconciliation & First Eucharist in 2020-2021

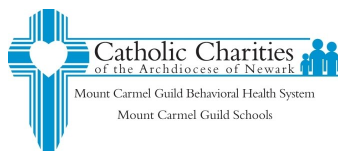

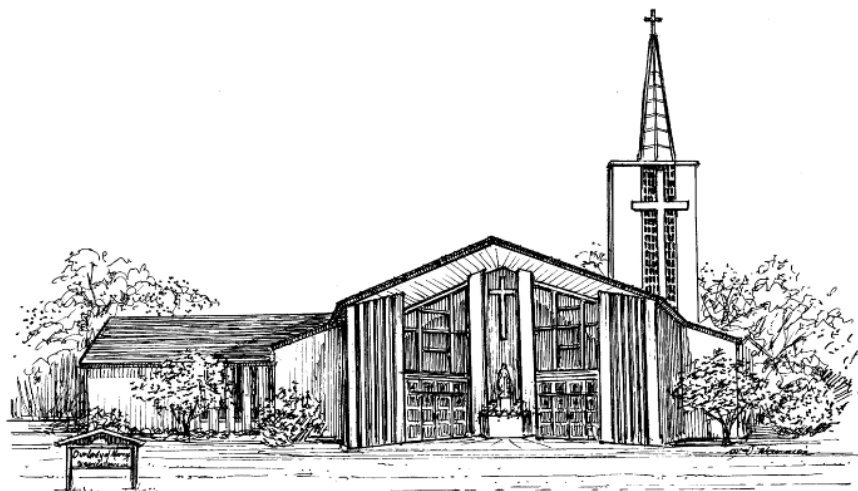

- A priest or deacon will greet each visitor to ensure compliance of mask, hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes

Please Read the Compliance Guidelines

It is important for everyone to accept that things will not immediately go back to life before the Corona virus.

Anyone at high risk due to age, ongoing health concerns, with fever or exhibiting signs of any illness, should not consider visiting any church.

In the interest of the common good and compliance with state & local authorities, all parish priests, deacons, staff members, parishioners and visitors must follow the OLM Parish Guidelines or we will not be able to continue opening the church.

Our Lady of Mercy Church Guidelines

Social Distancing Confession Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday 1PM-1:30PM

- Cars are to enter single file into the right lane in front of the church
- Do not leave your car. You will drive up to the priest where confessions will be heard through your driver's side window
- Fr Patrick will be waiting in his car in the far left lane
- Follow instructions to remain at a considerate distance
- Only one person per car

Individual Prayer Daily from 12Noon-2PM

- Access to the church will be from the Pascack Rd front doors ONLY. We suggest parking on the south side of the church
- Waiting will be OUTSIDE the church doors with 6ft markings indicated on the ground, similar to the grocery store
- All parish priests, deacons and staff members must wear a mask in the presence of others**
- All parishioners and visitors are required to provide their own mask, hand sanitizer and Clorox/Lysol wipes (not baby wipes)**
- A priest or deacon will greet each visitor to ensure compliance of mask, hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes**
- A maximum of 10 individuals will be admitted into the church at one time in compliance with state & CDC restrictions. Children will be included in the 10 person limit
- Designated seating with social distancing is mandatory. Please adhere to the signs posted
- As a courtesy to others, **your visit will be limited to 20 minutes**
- Visitors are required to clean their designated pew before and after their time of prayer
- At the conclusion of your visit, you are asked to proceed directly to your car from the same door you entered. Socializing and gathering will not be permitted
- Walking stations of the cross, kneeling in the aisles, approaching the Altar and tabernacle will not be allowed
- There will be no access to the Chapel, saints room, gathering space or balcony
- Bathrooms will not be available



What to expect when public Mass resumes

From May 11, 2020

As painful as the decision was to suspend all public Masses in the Archdiocese of Newark, during the Covid 19 pandemic, the process was straightforward and necessary for the common good.

As we see numbers flatten and decrease, we are beginning to sense the situation improving. In the interest of the common good, we do not want to contribute to a second wave that could disrupt our liturgical life.

As health restrictions are eased and we are able to start gathering together again, it is important for everyone to accept that things will not immediately go back to life before the Corona virus.

Health experts and civic leaders are currently determining new guidelines and restrictions for the next weeks and months, and at the same time the Archdiocese of Newark is planning for how public worship will be celebrated with respect to any new regulations.

We know the desire to return to your parishes, participate in the liturgy, and receive the Eucharist is incredibly strong, but we ask that everyone approach this reopening with a patient, loving and charitable mindset.

The specific details of when public Mass will resume and how it will be celebrated are still being determined, but the return will occur through a three-phase gradual process. Each phase will be rolled out with specific dates and directives to follow determined by Archdiocesan leaders.

Phase 1.

Churches will first be opened for personal prayer only. Individuals and families can come to church for quiet prayer, and the Sacrament of Reconciliation may be celebrated if social distancing can be maintained and masks are worn.

Phase 2.

Following on Phase 1, churches will be permitted to celebrate public weekday Masses and funerals with very specific restrictions, such as the strict practice of social distancing, use of masks and limited number of people present.

Phase 3.

Following Phase 1 and 2, churches will be permitted to celebrate Sunday Mass publicly with the obligatory practice of social distancing, use of masks and limited number of people present. All other sacraments will resume according to the directives during Phase 3.

Five Things to Be Mindful of During the Return Process

1. A general dispensation from the Sunday obligation will remain until further notice. The dispensation for the obligation to attend Mass will remain in effect. No one will be required to attend Mass when public celebrations resume. Hence, live stream Masses for parishioners at home will continue.
2. Attendance will be limited. We know restrictions will remain on holding large gatherings, so we are working with parishes to determine the best way to ensure safety. Communications will come from the parish so parishioners will know how many people can attend any given Mass. It is likely that all parishioners may not be able to attend Mass regularly at first.
3. Social Distancing will be practiced. Expect that your parish will have pews/rows that are taped off, and that households, even of one individual, will be asked to keep six feet of separation from each other. No one will be admitted without a mask. Parishioners should take their temperature before coming to Mass. Anyone with any symptoms of sickness must stay home.
4. Liturgical changes will be in place. Similar to protocols established when churches were closing, extra precautions will be taken. Temporary adjustments will be made to how we celebrate Mass and receive Communion.
5. **There still will be a risk for anyone who attends a public Mass. Even with best health practices and strict social distancing, anyone who enters a public space should recognize there is a risk of contracting the coronavirus. Improved cleaning will occur at our churches, but no one should expect that they will be any safer from germs than in other public spaces.**

Finally, we should recognize that this is a unique time and we need to continue to work together to make progress. There will be challenges and frustration. You may not be able to attend Mass at your parish the first few weeks it resumes. However, we believe these guidelines are a call to love our neighbors.

If we all work together, we can incrementally expand our options and increase our participation in the liturgy. However, if we look for ways to get around the regulations, we will likely contribute to the sickness and death of others, creating situations that force us to take steps back. Each of us is called to be faithful members of the Body of Christ as we implement the reopening of our churches. Thank you for all you have done and continue to do in our parish communities.

Over the past three years, many parishioners have discovered our parish courtyard/garden. Nestled between the back of the gathering space and our Parish Center, it provides a quiet place to pray, take family photos after Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations, weddings, not to mention a convenient cut through to church, from parts of the parking lot. It is where we gather to light the “new fire” for the Easter Vigil, and celebrate an outdoor mass before our parish picnic.

This past fall, it’s most frequent visitor was Msgr. Turro. Accompanied by a caregiver, or Kathy McCabe, Msgr. was able to walk to and from the courtyard, enjoy the beautiful plants and solitude, only happily interrupted on “Tuesday” afternoons, where he met with the 2nd graders from OLMA, who joined him in saying the Rosary. It was late fall when we sadly discovered, the 3 trees originally planted to provide shade, were infected with a blight. In spite

of the best efforts of parishioner, Bill Koenig, a landscape architect and designer of the courtyard, and Pete Jacobson whose landscape company installed the courtyard/garden, the trees did not survive the winter.

Over the last few weeks of Lent, a plan to replace the trees came together. Through the generosity of Bill and Marlene Koenig, Pete Jacobsen and his landscape company, and recent gifts to the OLM Courtyard/ garden fund, from Marianne Coche in memory of her husband, Walter, and Peter and Kathy Bowen in honor of their grandson Jared, the **trees have been replaced**. We also wish to acknowledge the original donors of the trees, the Jordan and Ballanco families, the Lange family, and an anonymous donor who planted a tree to honor Msgr. Turro for 65 plus years of priestly care to our parish.

In the midst of the darkness Covid -19 has cast over the entire earth, signs of new life and the promised hope of Resurrection are manifesting themselves too, even in our courtyard/garden! We hope that when we are able to come together again as a faith community, we will be able to share with a renewed sense the intention of our courtyard/garden; **a place to gather, pray and reflect** on the collective experiences these painful and difficult times have brought to so many in varied ways. As people of faith, we are mindful that the agony and despair experienced by our Lord in the garden of Gethsemane, is transformed for all eternity in another gardens’ empty tomb, Easter morning.

“Jesus’ hope is different. He plants in our hearts, the conviction that God is able to make everything work unto good, because even from the grave He brings life”. (Pope Francis, Easter Vigil 2020)

While we wait, take inspiration in the words of Pope Francis, ***“As stewards of God’s creation, we are called to make the earth a beautiful garden for the human family.”***

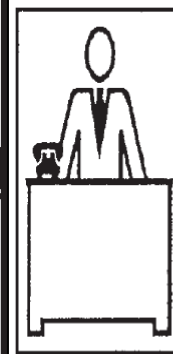
