

## PLEASE VOLUNTEER TO HELP US WITH HOLDING PUBLIC MASSES

Both these tasks require people with tact, patience and leadership skills. It would require being at Mass at least a half an hour early to receive instructions. 

### VACATION BIBLE CAMP: Seeing with the Eyes of God

### Summer Journey of Faith: Week 5 July 26-Aug. 1

**Theme**: Do you have an understanding heart? The treasure of God's Kingdom might not have been revealed to you yet. LOOK FOR IT! It may be "buried"!

**Scripture:** Kings 3:5, 7-12; Psalm 119; Romans 8:28-30; Matthew 13:44-52

**Prayer:** Have a conversation with God this week. Spend some time in quiet and see if you can hear where God is trying to lead you.

Service: Go on a shopping scavenger hunt for a soup kitchen or food cupboard by finding their wish list... or ...
Contact your local donation center for example, St. Vincent de Paul, Goodwill, etc. and find out how to give clothing. Then, "HUNT" through your dresser and closet and pull out clothes that you no longer wear. Together as a family, ask: Why do we pass along our clothing to those in need? How many outfits does a person really need? How do I feel when I donate extra clothes to others? Say a prayer for the families who receive the clothing you gave.

### Summer Reading

While out walking through my city neighborhood on a recent beautiful day, I was struck by the number of people sitting on their porches reading books. If I had a camera, it would have been a perfect picture. It made me think about what is on people's summer reading list. I reached out to a few people to ask. I shared some of their choices below. I hope the summer provides you an opportunity to enjoy a good book while sitting on your porch, in your yard or safely at a park.

For summer reading, I suggest almost any of Anne Tyler's novels. They're beloved for their poignant pictures of contemporary family life. Among my favorites are **Saint Maybe**, A Patchwork Planet, and Breathing Lessons.

I return to Jane Austen's novels year after year—especially **Pride and Prejudice** and **Emma.** But all of them are playful and wise.

If you want a looooong read, a fictional world you can return to day after day, read Vikram Seth's **A Suitable Boy**. Taking place in India after the creation of Pakistan, the story follows a mother's quest to find the right husband for her daughter—but many subplots also bring in political and social issues of the time.

If history is your interest, read Jill Lepore's well-researched and very accessible books. **Book of Ages: The Life and Opinions of Jane Franklin** is a marvelous biography of Ben Franklin's sister. Lepore's **These Truths: A History of the United States** is an eye-opening re-examination of the way slavery has formed our history.

Sarah Smarsh, **Heartland**: a fascinating account of the effects of growing up in poverty on a midwest farm.

### A Word From Father John...

After several weeks of celebrating Mass in church with more members of the faithful present, I thought it might be helpful to update you on how things are going. I am happy to report that we have a wonderful group of volunteers who have been assisting us serving as Mass Ambassadors, who assist with check-in, hand sanitizing, seating, ushering folks to communion and to the exits at the end of Mass, and also serving on our Disinfecting Teams, who disinfect the pews and touched surfaces after each Mass. Without their help, we would not be able to celebrate these Masses. At the same time, we would welcome more volunteers to assist us. If you are interested in volunteering, please contact the parish office. I also am grateful for the wonderful way those attending have cooperated with all the new processes and procedures to help us do our best to keep everyone safe and mitigate the spread of the Coronavirus. And I cannot overlook the members of our parish staff who have been working harder during this interlude between Sue and Deacon David's retirement and Gina Morgese and Dennis Mahaney joining us in August. So far, God has given all of us the grace we need to do what we need to do. These are just some of the many things for which I can be grateful as we offer God praise and thanksgiving at our Masses.

As is the case at many parishes in the diocese and beyond, our attendance at Mass has not approached the limits established by the requirements of NY State and the Diocese. The 4:00pm Mass on Saturdays at St. Mary's has had an average attendance of 44, ranging between 39 and 53, with a capacity of 75. The 9:00am Mass on Sundays at St. Boniface has had an average attendance of 45, ranging between 40 and 54, with a capacity of 75. And the 11:00am Mass on Sundays at Blessed Sacrament has had an average attendance of 62, ranging between 54 and 67, with a capacity of 100. From what I have observed, a number of folks are coming consistently each week. After a few weeks, it seemed that we were poised to see attendance pick up, when the spread of Coronavirus surged in areas that had opened up ahead of us. That seemed to put a damper on things. Yet, we did see a slight uptick last weekend. I hope that others consider joining us when they are ready. It is obvious from these numbers that we have room to accommodate more.

Along these lines, a number of people have mentioned to me that they have not come to Mass, because the busyness of their lives often means that they forget to register on Wednesday or Thursday, and only think of it on Friday or Saturday. And they are not interested in having to stand in a waiting line to find out if they can get in. Who can blame them given the heat that we have been experiencing? Yet, since we have not reached capacity, no one has been forced to wait. We have a separate list with the number of spaces still available after the reservation process. Those who come without making a reservation ahead of time have to check-in, supplying their name and contact information should contact tracing be required. That takes a little more time than for those who have registered ahead of time, whose names can be simply checked off the list. But, so far, it has not meant having to wait very long. I would strongly encourage everyone to keep making reservations as that helps us know how many Mass Ambassadors are needed to handle the expected crowd, and it speeds the check-in process for everyone. To help those who miss making a reservation, we will include the number of those who have registered and the number of seats still available in the email newsletter that is sent out on Friday to those who have signed up to receive them. Hopefully, that will help give you an idea of your chances of just showing and getting a seat. At this point, I am not eager to add more Masses, when we are not approaching capacity in the ones that are already offered.

As indicated previously, we will continue to offer Mass via livestream and recorded for viewing at your convenience. We would like to stay connected with those of you who are not in a position to join us in person or who are not yet comfortable with assuming the risks that are involved with attending public gatherings. The obligation to attend Sunday Mass remains suspended. So, none of us need to rush back to church at this point. We miss seeing you, but respect your decision to do what you need to remain safe and keep others safe in the midst of this pandemic.

Lastly, thanks to all of you who have continued to support our parish with your donations. It certainly enables me to rest easier knowing that those contributions are helping us to meet our financial obligations and continue our parish ministries.

### What does LIVING IN JUSTICE or JUSTICE MAKING Bring to your mind?

During these summer months with so much attention being given to the sin of racism, we are reprinting articles members of the parish Social Justice Committee will reflect on the U.S. Bishops' pastoral letter on racism:

### "Open Wide Our Hearts"

The Social Justice Committee read and discussed the document Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love - A Pastoral Letter Against Racism, which was approved by the "full body" of United States Catholic Bishops. Previous to reading it, my education on the topic of racism was through a "secular lens." Learning about and understanding racism, including being in touch, to the extent possible, with my own conscious and unconscious prejudices, was a big part of my training as a psychotherapist.

It was refreshing, invigorating, and hopeful to read this thoughtful document and think about racism through the "lens" of my faith tradition. "Refreshing," as the document does not mince words about what racism is, what we are called to do as Christians, and how our church is called to work toward healing "divisions" brought about by racism. Having the American Bishops single out this issue as important and worthy of significant attention and action makes me feel proud to be Catholic.

The "Christian lens" invigorates me, gives me hope, remembering that with "God all things are possible" (Mt 19:26). The document touched me as it quoted from the prophet Micah that we are called as a people "to walk humbly with your God." It calls me to an "honest acknowledgement of our [my] failures," such as when I have thought of someone as unworthy of equal regard, and reminds me that "it is the Lord who, by his grace, forgives and restores us to these relationships and heals the wounds between us." Being called to walk humbly with my God, and knowing I am loved by God, gives me the safety required to be open to looking at the unconscious ways that racism has penetrated my heart. I am grateful to have read this "letter" and to have my faith to help heal me of prejudice.
