

RENEWING AND REFRESHING ADULT FAITH

We asked parishioners: has Covid affected your prayer life? If so, how? Here are some of their responses.

"Prayer life" for me during the Covid I characterize by its social expression. It developed within the body of two wonderful groups within the SRCC. Studying the weekly Sunday Scripture readings with one group and praying the Rosary with another, both on Zoom, have been spiritual benchmarks for gratitude. They have brought me together socially, but remotely, with some of the remarkable people of our parish. Taken "as one body", brought together in prayer, I have felt the presence of the Holy Spirit among us.

I can say with conviction that my prayer has changed in that I no longer ask for blessings of health. I only say thank you to God for keeping my loved ones healthy and also make it known that I am ok with whatever His will decides. I know that if I or any of my loved ones are to be affected by illness that there is a reason for it and that it is up to God, not me.

He is teaching me to not stress over these times. He is teaching me to only focus on the things that I can control. It is a huge weight off of my shoulders.

I now spend a lot of time reciting the "Hail Holy Queen" many, many times throughout the day. It's one of the few prayers that makes sense to me right now: Hail, holy Queen, mother of mercy, Hail our life, our sweetness, and our hope. To you we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to you we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn, then, most gracious advocate, your eyes of mercy toward us; and after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of your womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

A Word From Father John...

In our gospel today, John the Baptist calls his own disciples attention to Jesus, saying, "Behold the Lamb of God." This is a reaffirmation of what John already had declared at Jesus' baptism, "Now I have seen and testify that he is the Son of God." The two disciples heard what John said and followed Jesus, staying with him, becoming his disciples and leading others to Jesus.

What about us? Have we heard John and others of God's prophets? Who have we chosen to follow? Why would we ever consider that possibly John or another of God's prophets has pointed to someone else as God's chosen one?

Considering the current crop of candidates to behold, do we really think that God is asking his prophets to say, "Behold, Donald." or "Behold, Joe."? Why would we look to either of them or anyone else except the one that God has revealed as the Christ? Do we really believe that anyone else can fulfill that role better than the Son of God, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ?

It seems that many have fallen prey to what is often extremist rhetoric that portrays their chosen candidate as the only one who can save us from the alternative, who only will bring about some sort of apocalyptic death and destruction, from which the world will never recover. Everything then becomes a life-and-death, zero-sum game. Viewing things that way, one imagines that the only way for one side to gain anything is for the other side to lose something in direct proportion to what one side gains. There seems to be no appreciation, let alone consideration, that through negotiation and cooperation both sides can gain some benefit. It can be a win-win for both or all sides involved. Admittedly, this may require each side to sacrifice something for both or all sides get that something more. In that regard, the Church's teaching about solidarity, subsidiarity, and the common good may help to reshape our perspectives and come to appreciate that sustaining the betterment of each and every one over the long haul requires us to work together cooperatively, each and every one doing what we can, each and every one making sacrifices for the good of all.

An essential primary step requires us to refocus our attention on the one that we are to behold. As the disciples discovered in listening to John and following Jesus, by coming and seeing what Jesus was about, they found what they were looking for. An important step in that process involves staying with Jesus for a period of time. Spending time with our Lord will help us to recognize and appreciate that he indeed is the Christ, the one with us, the one for us. While we do not have the advantage of Andrew, Peter, and the other disciples, who could stay with the earthly Jesus, through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we have a number of ways to spend time with our Lord.

The primary means for us to do that is in prayer. And the variety of forms of prayer offer us many possible ways to spend time with our Lord. Those of you who are familiar with Matthew Kelly's story, as told in *I Heard God Laugh* and other of his books, know that Matthew's prayer life took a dramatic turn when he followed the advice of an older and more experienced friend, much like Eli advising Samuel in our first reading, and started spending ten minutes sitting in church on his way to school just talking to God about his day. After some time, Matthew came to a graced realization that instead of just talking at God in a manner that equated to "Listen up, God, your servant is speaking," he would do better to echo the words of Samuel in our first reading, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." Turning things around and asking, "God, what do you think I should do?" changed his life forever.

While it might be wonderful to speculate how much our society would be transformed for the better, if more people would shift the same amount of energy, resources and fervor from chasing after the word of those who are not the one to behold, to pursuing the word of God in Jesus Christ, we probably do not possess a magic wand or incantation to bring that about. Instead, we might do better to model ourselves after Andrew in the gospel, taking the advice of others, like John, who already have a close connection with God, and following our Lord when he is pointed out to us. And having done so, willingly accepting our Lord's invitation to come and see. And above all, developing a habit of spending time with our Lord, so as to discover that Jesus Christ is indeed the one for whom we are looking. And then once we have been convinced that indeed we have found the Christ, going and bringing others to our Lord.

Admittedly, that will take a lot of more time and effort than simply waving a wand and speaking an incantation, but that is the way that discipleship works. By making ourselves better disciples, we prepare ourselves to bring others to Christ, so that they too can become his disciples. All the more reason to get that process rolling. Prayer is a place to start. Matthew Kelly's book, *I Heard God Laugh*, may offer some insights as we seek to grow in our spiritual life through prayer. Please consider taking some time to engage what he has to offer.

It is clear that digital outreach through the Internet to both parishioners and others is not just a fluke caused by the pandemic. It is an important component of both our



present and future outreach efforts. During the pandemic our parishes have successfully provided a wide range of digital offerings: recorded and livestreamed Masses, faith formation programs, prayer and retreat programs, etc. Christian organizations around the country are making it clear that digital connections are not a temporary phase due to the pandemic but must be considered part of the meat and potatoes of ongoing church outreach. Predictions suggest that 10-20 percent of people who regularly attended church services before the pandemic will not return in the future. It is also clear that a digital church connection is favored by over a third of millennials. If anything, we are being encouraged to expand our digital/virtual outreach while also encouraging parishioners to attend services and programs in our churches and church buildings. For this to happen we need people of all ages who are interested in learning about and expanding our ability to serve both parishioners and non-parishioners through online connections. We need people with not only digital computer skills, but also those who want to learn how to set up a livestreamed event or host a ZOOM meeting.
