

# A Word From Father John...



Lent: A Journey of...
Remembering...
Reconciling...
Becoming...
One in Christ, One in Hope

The parable of the Lost Son is a wonderful illustration of our Lenten focus. The younger son can't wait for his father to be dead, insisting that he be given his inheritance. He leaves home, wastes all that his father gave him, and falls on hard times. Coming to his senses, he remembers who he is and the goodness of his father. Admitting that he has sinned against God and his father, he heads home seeking to be reconciled with his father and hoping to be treated as a hired

worker. Before he gets all the way home, his father runs to him, hugs and kisses him. As he is confessing his sins, the father interrupts before he can ask to be treated as a hired worker. Instead, the father orders that he be restored to his place in the family as his beloved son and that a feast be held to celebrate. Having wished his father were dead, the son is one who died, but in coming home and being reconciled with his father, he has come to life again. The son, who had lost his way and himself, remembered who he was and whose he was. And in returning home to his father, he was reconciled with his father and found himself, becoming who he was and whose he was as the beloved son of his father.

A similar pattern of remembering, reconciling, and becoming plays out in the story of Peter (see below). And we are called to enter into that pattern in the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. Remembering who we are as beloved children of God, disciples of Jesus Christ, and dwelling places of the Holy Spirit, we recall the times when we have failed to be who we are and fallen into sin. Confessing our sins to God, we seek to be reconciled with God. In an astounding outpouring of love, mercy, and forgiveness, God restores us, so that we can return to right relationship with God, others, and ourselves. In the process, we are becoming who we are and who we are destined to be as God's children, who are welcomed back home and join in the feast, celebrating our being found and coming to life again.

Please consider responding to God's call by celebrating the sacrament on the Diocesan Day of Penance and Mercy, this Wednesday, April 2<sup>nd</sup> (see the bulletin cover for times and locations in our parish). Remember there is more joy in heaven over one repentant sinner than over ninety-nine righteous people who have no need of repentance, (Luke 15:7).

Peace and blessings as we continue on our Lenten journey of remembering, reconciling and becoming one in Christ.

# Lent: A Journey with the Saints - St. Peter



Saint Peter (died c.64 AD), originally named Simon, was given the name Peter (or Cephas) meaning 'rock' by Jesus (see Matthew 16:13-19). Prior to being called by Jesus, he was a Galilean fisherman, with his brother, St. Andrew. Appearing repeatedly and prominently in all four New Testament gospels as well as the Acts of the Apostles, Peter was the spokesperson for the Twelve Apostles and one of the first leaders of the early Christian Church. Church tradition treats Peter as the first bishop of Rome – or Pope – where he was crucified under Emperor Nero.

Remembering who he is, the Prodigal Son returns home determined to ask his father's forgiveness. But before he fully confesses, the father reconciles his lost son to himself and restores him to his place in the family. In much the same way, in his encounter with the Risen Jesus on the beach, Peter remembers who he is, is reconciled by Jesus through his three-time declaration of love, and restored to his place in the family of Jesus, where Peter becomes a prominent leader of the early Church.

As we have been on a journey of remembering, reconciling and becoming this Lent, we might ask ourselves:

"Have I experienced another chance in my life and how has this motivated me to follow Peter's example?"

"Where do I need God's help in moving through the process of remembering, reconciling, and becoming?"

# A Note from the Liturgical Environment Committee

The Broken and Repaired Pots are symbols of our human condition. We are broken in many different ways: we may have broken relationships with family, coworkers, friends, and society as a whole; broken by illness, disability, or accidents; broken dreams, broken spirits, or crises of faith. It is in recognizing our collective brokenness that empathy and concern for all the humans in the world become part of our Christian faith. However, such brokenness can leave us challenged to find hope.

The wayward son and St. Peter also had to face their brokenness; they found reconciliation and restoration in the love of the Father and in Jesus. As we become reconciled to our own humble state and we place ourselves in God's hands, like these clay pots, we are restored bit by bit, and our scars become a beautiful part of who we are.
