

As you plan for your Native Garden, where can you buy Native Plants? A good local source is *Amanda's Native Garden* in Dansville. You can place your order on online and they will ship it to you. A similar website

by phone or online and they will ship it to you. A similar website is "Prairie Moon Nursery". Local options include Brighton's Farmers Market which opens on Sunday, April 27th, near 12 Corners, 9am-1pm, and "Flower City Public Market Days" during the month of May at the Rochester Public Market. (Google for specific dates) Locally owned stores can also be a good source. Remember, no matter where you shop locally, always ask the vendor to direct you to their native plants. Lastly, a word of caution: the big box garden centers may have a limited selection of native plants, if at all, and they may also use pesticides on their plants. Pesticides would defeat the purpose of a native pollinator garden. Always inquire!

A Word From Father John...



Lent: A Journey of... Remembering... Reconciling... Becoming...

We are nearing the conclusion of our Lenten journey and entering the holiest week on the Church calendar. Hopefully, our use of the traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving has assisted us in responding to God's call to repentance and the One in Christ, One in Hope transformative change that God desires for all of us. Our specific focus was on remembering, reconciling,

and becoming as a means of reflecting on that call and guiding our response. Our Lenten reflection booklet and the posters of the saints drew upon the wisdom and exemplary lives of the saints to facilitate this process. However, at this point, especially amid these unsettled and challenging times in our nation and the world, we may feel exhausted and yearn to simply conclude this journey. Nevertheless, it is precisely at this moment that we must summon the strength and determination to persevere and complete our Lenten journey.

Regardless of our current circumstances, we have a chance to remember and participate in the central and fundamental events of our faith from Palm Sunday through Easter Sunday. The events we experience during Palm Sunday, which we delve deeper into during Holy Thursday and Good Friday, create a rollercoaster of contrasting events accompanied by a whirlwind of emotions that encompass a wide range of human experiences. We are invited to accompany Jesus as he is initially welcomed into Jerusalem as a hero-king-like Messiah by adoring crowds, then to his Last Supper where he institutes the Eucharist and establishes a pattern of humble, loving service to others. Next, we witness his betrayal, abandonment, and denial by those closest to him as he endures suffering and death on the cross.

The powerful, dark, and negative emotions evoked by this part of the story may resonate with our present experiences on multiple levels. For instance, I can relate to this as I accompany my mother as the physical effects of aging diminish her quality of life. Perhaps I am better prepared because I have accompanied and am currently accompanying several others through similar trials and tribulations in my role as a priest and pastor. However, being part of a family and immersed in family dynamics adds a whole other dimension. At the same time, having studied the history, politics, and culture of Russia and Eastern Europe, I am deeply moved by the plight of ordinary people caught up in the senseless death and destruction in Ukraine. Having learned about the horrors of the Holocaust and genocides perpetrated by authoritarian and totalitarian regimes, I am troubled by many aspects of the current Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Moreover, I cannot ignore the struggles and challenges faced by many in our own country, city, and neighborhood. These concerns can fill my thoughts and prayers, and I am certain that they fill yours as well.

The challenge for many of us is to avoid getting caught up and stuck halfway through the story. While we must pass through the events of Good Friday, that is not the end of the story. We must continue, entering into the silence and stillness of Holy Saturday, where we have the opportunity to absorb and reflect on what has happened. As we wait, the Holy Spirit stirs hope within us and prepares us for what is to come.

The Resurrection of the Lord at Easter turns everything upside down. The tomb, a place of death, is revealed as a womb from which springs new life. This shocking reversal is so profound that his disciples initially struggle to comprehend and appreciate what has happened. Eventually, the disciples, who had been cowering in fear and darkness, with the doors locked, encounter the Risen Lord, radiating light, imparting peace, and drawing them out to share the new life they possess in him. All of this was beyond their wildest imaginations just a few days prior, when they had followed and believed in the Messiah, only to have it dashed in his suffering on the cross and his burial in a tomb.

Perhaps, we find ourselves in a similar predicament, grappling with numerous challenges and disappointments in our own lives. If so, it becomes even more compelling to immerse ourselves in the events that mark our participation in the liturgies of Palm Sunday and the Triduum, spanning from Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday. By doing so, we hope to be emmersed in the Paschal Mystery, encompassing the suffering, death, and resurrection of the Lord. This transformative experience aims to reshape our lives and very essence, infused with the grace unleashed.

In addition to the core liturgies of Palm Sunday, the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the Commemoration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening, and the Easter Sunday Masses celebrating the Resurrection of the Lord, I encourage you to join us for Morning Prayer on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. The highlight of this half-hour of prayer and song for me is the opportunity to hear laypeople preach.

Furthermore, if your work schedule prevents you from attending the daytime liturgies on Good Friday, I invite you to join us for Taizé Prayer around the Cross that evening. Taizé is a form of simple, sung, repetitive prayer that fosters reflection and meditation amidst the demands of our busy lives. In these moments, I find it an excellent way to unwind and be fully present. I hope that you find your way to the liturgies that nourish and inspire you.

May peace and blessings accompany us as we embark on this sacred week, leading us to the joy and new life of Easter. Yours,
