


### The Lord is Risen! Alleluia! Alleluia!

With all the unsettledness and drama occurring in the world these days, entering into and celebrating Easter may be particularly challenging this year. A lack of stability and certainty may prevent us from being able to relax and unwind trusting that things will be okay, so that we can celebrate and enjoy the day. Yet, as we consider the disciples on that first Easter Sunday, we recognize that they were not much better off. Their world had

been turned upside down by the events of the prior few days. Their hopes that Jesus was the long-promised Messiah, who had come to save them, were dashed by Jesus's passion and crucifixion. They were physically, mentally and emotionally shattered and scattered.

Yet, this did not stop the Resurrection of the Lord from happening on that first Easter Sunday morning. Jesus rose from the dead shattering the bonds of sin and death as new life burst from the tomb. The emergence of new life fundamentally changed everything for everyone, for all of creation, for all time. In many ways, it turned the world upside down for a second time in just a few days. We often talk of this change in terms of the tomb, a place of death, being transformed into a womb, out of which new life emerges. Sunday, which had marked the first day of the week following the sabbath rest, became the eighth day marking the first day of a new creation after the original seven-day creation in Genesis. Coming to recognize, accept, and understand the Resurrection of the Lord and all that entails would take time and effort, especially for those who are shattered and scattered like the disciples.

Reviewing the Gospel stories from that first Easter Sunday, we recognize that what enabled the disciples to grow in their recognition, acceptance and understanding of the Resurrection was their being pulled together, each doing their part in conjunction with the others to reveal showing more of this wondrous and awesome new reality. Consider the role that Mary Magdalene, Peter and the beloved disciple played in the discovery of the empty tomb. Without Mary Magdalene, who witnessed first hand Jesus's death and burial, how would they have known where Jesus had been laid to rest and been able to report to the others that that tomb was now empty. Without the bold and impetuous Peter, who jumps out of boats in storm-tossed seas and dares to be the first to profess that Jesus



is the Christ, who would have rushed into the tomb to confirm that it was empty with the burial clothes rolled up in a separate place from the cloth that covered the head (Grave robbers would not have taken the time to unwrap the body, let alone neatly stow those cloths away in separate places). And the beloved disciple, who had not abandoned Jesus, but stood at the foot of the cross with Jesus's mother, Mary, and thus was less encumbered by shame and guilt than Peter, was needed to follow Peter inside, so as to see and believe. They each had a part to play in helping to unpack the mystery of Christ's passion and resurrection. They could not have done it alone; they needed to pull together, acting in conjunction with one another to reveal the truth of Easter. That truth would set them free as it frees us to stand once again on the Rock who is Jesus Christ, and to experience the joy and celebrate the wonder and awesomeness of Easter.

Considering in this way the Gospel stories of that first Easter Sunday gives us a model to follow as we come to terms with our present experience of being shattered and scattered by recent events. Just like those disciples, none of us can do it all on our own. We each need to do our part, drawing on the gifts and insights we have been given to reveal a part, on which others can build using their gifts and insights to reveal more of the truth. Then in that new found truth, we can stand once again on stable ground and find our bearings to continue our journey of hope in a troubled world. Admittedly, we have a ways to go before we get there fully. Yet, we know that Jesus Christ is the way, and the truth, and the life that will get us there. And that is enough for us to be glad and rejoice in the Resurrection of the Lord this Easter Sunday.

Peace and blessings as we continue on our Easter journey, rejoicing in the glory of the Resurrection and pulling together to do our part in conjunction with others to reveal more and more of the new life we have in Christ.
