

# A Word From Father John...



I am writing this column on the eve of the conclave that will select the new pope. The media has been all abuzz with explanations about the process and prognostications about the potential candidates to lead the Church. While the matter may be settled and the new pope announced by the time you read this, we still will have to wait to see what he will be like. Inevitably, the pundits will label whoever is selected as somewhere on the spectrum from traditional/conservative to progressive/liberal, either applauding or bemoaning how they might lead the Church. I am not sure if this categorization is the best way to judge the quality of the new pope.

Therefore, it is fortuitous and appropriate that our readings for this Sunday focus on Jesus's role as the Good Shepherd. As such, a more appropriate assessment might consider the qualities that make one worthy to shepherd God's flock. Some of these qualities would be universally recognized and welcomed in anyone entrusted with caring for other people, such as those mentioned in the Responsorial Psalm: being good, kind, and faithful.

Other qualities have both physical and spiritual significance. For instance, leading the flock to springs of life-giving water alludes to both quenching physical thirst and being renewed and filled with the Holy Spirit in the waters of baptism. Similarly, who wouldn't welcome being sheltered from the scorching desert sun and the heat, as well as being protected from trials, tribulations, and temptations to sin. And on this Mother's Day, are we not grateful to have a parent-like figure in God who stands ready to wipe away our tears and comfort us amid sorrow and grief? Such a God inspires and encourages us to reexamine our situation and see God at work amid the pain and suffering. Hopefully, we reach a point where we are like Paul and Barnabas, able to shake the dust from their feet and move on, filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

Still other qualities require a great deal more of the shepherd and perhaps only can be exhibited by those who manage to channel the Spirit of Christ. The way Jesus describes himself in today's Gospel suggests a personal and intimate relationship with those who hear his voice and follow him. As he indicates their hearing and following are rooted in his knowing them. This notion is further reinforced in the Alleluia verse before the Gospel, where Jesus declares himself to be the Good Shepherd, the hallmark of which is a mutual knowing in which he knows his sheep and his sheep know him.

Tying this back to my comments last week about the love of a friend being the hallmark of our discipleship, we recall that elsewhere in the Gospel, Jesus calls us his friends for whom he is willing to lay down his life. That gift of his life on the cross and through his resurrection is the means by which he gives us eternal life. The rest of the passage highlights the persona and intimate relationship that Jesus shares with his Father-God, as he declares that his Father and he are one. That bond between the Father and the Son is the basis of Jesus's trust in God, enabling him to lay down his life on the cross, knowing that no one and nothing could take him out of his Father's hand. By sharing that bond with us, Jesus assures us that no one can take us out of his hand. Elsewhere, Paul makes the same point in terms of nothing being able to separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ. When we experience this love of God, may we be blessed to respond as those in the Responsorial Psalm, singing joyfully to the Lord, serving the Lord with gladness, and coming before the Lord with joyful praise.

Lastly, John's vision in the Book of Revelation highlights, as the 153 large fish signaled last week, that the flock that Jesus seeks to gather is "a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation, race, people, and tongue," (Rev 7:9). Thus, that love of God is expansive enough to never exclude anyone and strong enough to include everyone no matter who they are or what they have done.

Taken all together, may we pray and trust that the Holy Spirit will guide the selection of the new pope to embody many of these qualities of Christ the Good Shepherd: goodness, kindness, and faithfulness; the capacity to act in ways that combine both practical and spiritual benefits; the capacity to channel the gifts of the Holy Spirit to foster the love of God that binds us in a personal and intimate relationship through Christ with God and one another, a bond that cannot be broken; and having the openness to welcome into the Church the great diversity of humanity and the courage to build bridges to overcome whatever divides us. That is a lot to ask of any single human being. Yet, I am encouraged by a story that I heard about Pope Francis. Those who knew him to have been a sourpuss in his past were delighted to witness the transformative power of the Holy Spirit in his becoming pope, which revealed a more lighthearted and humorous side of him.

Congratulations to all our children who are celebrating their First Communion with us this weekend. We thank their parents and catechists for their efforts to pass on the faith to them. May all of us continue to feed and tend to them as disciples of Jesus Christ, who in communion with us form the Church.

Lastly, we express our praise and thanksgiving to God for the success of the Next-To-New Sale, which raised well over \$80,000, setting a new record. We could not have done this without the invaluable contributions of our outstanding volunteers and those who supported the sale. Thank you, thank you!
