

A Word From Father John...



In our Gospel today, Jesus presents us with a new commandment: love one another. However, is this really new? After all, when asked about the greatest commandment, he simply combined passages from Deuteronomy and Leviticus that collectively emphasize the importance of loving God with all our being and loving our neighbors as ourselves (as seen in Matthew 22:35-40, Mark 12:28-34, and Luke 10:27a). Therefore, the command to love is not new; what is truly new is the manner in which we are to love: "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another," (John 13:34). Moreover, loving in the way that Jesus loved us is not merely one among many qualities we

are expected to possess; it is the defining characteristic that distinguishes us as his disciples. Consequently, it is of utmost importance for us as followers of Jesus Christ to emulate his love.

A good starting point is to examine this new commandment in the context in which Jesus spoke these words. The passage comes immediately after washing the feet of his disciples and announcing Judas's betrayal, right before predicting Peter's denial. Washing the feet of his disciples demonstrates this love in action, revealing how it entails humbling oneself to the point of surrendering life for the other. Jesus extends this love to all, even those who won't reciprocate it. He washed the feet of Judas, who was about to betray him, turning him over to face his passion and death, and of Peter, who was about to deny even knowing Jesus. Throughout the Gospel, Jesus never ceases loving those who oppose him or don't understand him. We see this in his conversations with Nicodemus, the Samaritan woman at the well, Martha, and even Pontius Pilate. In each instance, Jesus pours himself out in service. As a result, this love isn't about warm and fuzzy feelings toward another person; it's about visible actions that signify a shared relationship with God as our parent and a commitment to one another. While this love doesn't require us to like or even feel kindly toward the other person, it does demand that we act toward them in the way Jesus loved his disciples. Putting this love into action acknowledges the inherent connection and solidarity we share with one another, while also nurturing and strengthening that bond.

This love is transformative. By consistently practicing it, we change and evolve, affecting our relationships with others and the world around us. A love that refuses to give up on anyone and refuses to let another's misunderstanding or rejection extinguish our acts of love creates an opening for God's transformative grace to reveal something new. This grace enables us to abandon tit-for-tat and creates space for healing what is bruised and broken.

As our second reading from the Book of Revelation emphasizes, it is God who brings about all things new. God is vast enough to encompass our diversity and division and unite us as one. This transformation occurs through God's extravagant and abundant love, which flows to us through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit. As we are caught up in this flow of love, we are transformed, inspired, and empowered to share that radical, unconditional, and nonjudgmental love with others.

Putting this love into practice in our daily lives involves imitating the way Jesus's love for his disciples, humbling ourselves to the point of sacrificing our own lives for the good of others. This will challenge us to help and advocate for the poor and needy, even defending and supporting those whose interests may be of no interest to us. Like Jesus, these acts of loving service will deepen our relationships, as we accompany the stranger who becomes a friend. As we become more aware of our inherent connection, we will truly know them and share in their joys and sorrows. By sharing in the love of Christ in these ways, we will reveal our true identity as disciples of Jesus Christ and begin to live life more abundantly—a life that is fully alive wherever and with whomever we find ourselves.

May our love for others, as Jesus loved his disciples, unite us in the joy and life unleashed in the Resurrection. Yours,
