

What can we do about microplastics in our environment?

First and foremost is to be *mindful* of our use of plastics. Then we can begin implementing ways to reduce our reliance on them. Its pretty tough. Everything we buy seems to be wrapped in plastic, even cucumbers at the grocery store! And changing shopping habits can be hard. You're not alone.

Consider the following actions to start:

- ⇒ Shop at local food markets. Take your own containers to bring home fresh fruits and veggies.
- ⇒ Replace buying plastic water bottles with a water bottle that can be used and reused.
- ⇒ Use glass storage containers and beeswax wrap covers.
- ⇒ Buy compostable plates and napkins, made from recycled paper, sugarcane, or bamboo, for picnics.
- \Rightarrow Bring your own container to restaurants for leftovers.
- ⇒ Check out: Marilla's Mindful Supplies at 661 South Avenue, a place where you can find everyday items without any plastic, including personal care products; and Impact Earth at 1458 Monroe Ave., which offers zero waste programs, services, and products aimed at reducing single-use consumption.

A Word From Father John...



The story of Mary and Martha, like the parable of the Good Samaritan, is familiar to most of us. When I hear this Gospel passage, I can't help but recall my seminary experience. Drawing on Jesus's admonition, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things," the seminary rector would give out the "Martha, Martha Award." This tongue-in-cheek award went to the seminarian, who was tasked with motivating and organizing us, his fellow seminarians, to help host various functions for large numbers of outside guests. Needless to say, it was a challenging and largely thankless task as a large number of seminarians resisted volunteering to help, but were only too ready to offer critiques and complaints about how things were being

done. While thankfully I was never chosen for that task, observing what happened was good preparation for facing similar challenges, critiques and complaints as a pastor of a parish.

That said, this passage is more relevant for what it has to say about offering hospitality as a disciple of Jesus Christ. Jesus adds to the above quotation, saying, "There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her." What's that one needed thing? Martha is trying to be a good host, to provide for her guests' bodily needs, but she is forced to do it without the help she was counting on. For her, the one thing that she needs is the help of her sister, Mary. As a result, Martha's service is not joyous or eager like Abraham's in the first reading. Instead, she gives while counting the cost rather than with abandon. Stressed and overwhelmed, Mary unloads her problem on Jesus, her guest, rather than confronting Martha with her concerns. Her efforts to offer hospitality in the form of comfort, rest, and peace, along with food and drink are overturned by dumping her troubles on Jesus. Martha, at least in part, remains focused on herself and what she feels she needs to accomplish for Jesus, influenced by cultural and traditional expectations.

In contrast to Martha, who is consumed with tending to Jesus's bodily needs, Mary chooses to sit at the feet of Jesus consuming his every word. Her posture signifies discipleship, which was usually reserved for males. She allows herself to truly encounter her guest, by opening her heart to enter into a relationship of belonging that fosters her transformation. In this way, she does the one thing needed: she gives herself over totally to Jesus. The hospitality that Mary offers allows for an encounter with Jesus that leads to loving relationship and life-giving transformation, similar to Abraham's encounter with the divine leading to Sarah's pregnancy and the birth of Isaac.

Given the current battle over gender identity and expression, encompassing a wide range of perspectives from "trad wives" to transgender persons, we note that Jesus prioritizes welcoming and offering hospitality in a way that enables us to be transformed by our encounters with Christ. Martha choses to offer hospitality according to the expectations and limitations that culture and tradition place on her as a woman. When she asks Jesus to impose those constraints on her sister, Mary, he rejects such thinking. In fact, he asserts that Mary has chosen the better part (usually reserved for males) and that it will not be taken from her. At the same time, Jesus isn't denying the good in the hospitality that Martha has chosen to offer. But he rejects any notion that gender alone should prevent someone from choosing the better part or result in having that better part taken away from them. The one thing that is needed is an encounter with Christ that leads to loving relationship and life-giving transformation.

We don't know when, where, or how we may encounter Christ. He comes to us as a stranger, as someone in need whom we have never met before. Yet, he may also come to us in someone whom we have known for some time but whom we encounter in a new way. We may also encounter Christ in a dream, while in deep reflection, or in prayer. Furthermore, we can't overlook how we encounter Christ as we gather in his name to celebrate Mass and the sacraments. In each instance, we are given the opportunity to respond as Mary did, opening our hearts and giving all of ourselves over to Christ in the other person. This often involves offering hospitality, charity, food, shelter, clothing, and reminding them of their inherent human dignity as a beloved child of God. When we do so, we invite the other person into an encounter with Christ that leads to loving relationship and life-giving transformation.

May God's peace and blessings be ours as we go forth to encounter Christ in one another.

Whatever support we can offer is very much needed and greatly appreciated.
