A Word From Father John...



Recalling that Jesus is addressing his disciples as they journey with him to Jerusalem helps us better comprehend and appreciate his message in this Sunday's Gospel. He is preparing them for his passion and crucifixion, as their faith and trust in Jesus will undoubtedly be tested. To experience the blessings and glory of the kingdom of God, they must maintain their faith and trust in Jesus. As we will see, these instructions apply to us as we seek to hear, know, and act on God's will for us.

First, we must let go of fear because God the Father delights in giving us the kingdom. God does not jealously guard the kingdom by throwing up walls, ramparts, obstacles, and tests to thwart our entry or by deporting us. God is a God of mercy and generosity, not condemnation and punishment. God's great

joy is to find us unafraid and reveling in the awe-inspiring gift of new life in God's kingdom.

Second, we must free our hearts from attachment to anything that is not the love of God and the reign of God. Selling our belongings and giving alms signals that we do not treasure our possessions so much that they capture our hearts. No thing but God should possess our hearts. By giving ourselves in terms of time, talent, and treasure in acts of humble, loving service to others, especially the poor and those in need, we amass a fortune of life-giving works of mercy, goodwill, and gratitude that can never wear out, be stolen, or be destroyed. We join the Lord in cherishing and nurturing life.

Third, we must remain vigilant and prepared to act as faithful servants when the Lord arrives or summons us. This requires sharpening our senses and diligently observing all signs of God's presence and indications of God's will. Even in the absence of such signs, we must remain vigilant and prepared, anticipating the Lord's unexpected arrival. When found vigilant and prepared, the Lord will bless us by acting as our servant, as he did when he washed the feet of his disciples at the Last Supper and then sacrificed himself on the cross to redeem us from sin and death.

Fourth, we must exercise caution and prudence in wielding the power and authority entrusted to us over others. We are to use the gifts we have been given as faithful and responsible stewards. This is particularly important in ensuring access to essential resources such as food and nourishment, most especially the word of God and the Eucharist. Additionally, it encompasses our treatment of others and ourselves, including refraining from abusing those under our authority and avoiding overindulgence of our appetites and passions. Such poor behavior will result in severe punishment for those who knew God's will but only mild punishment for those who were ignorant of God's will.

By letting go of fear, freeing our hearts from attachments, remaining vigilant and prepared, and being good stewards of the power and authority entrusted to us, we strengthen and deepen our faith and trust in God. At the same time, we prepare ourselves to fall utterly in love with the Lord. For in the end, our experiencing the blessings and glory of the kingdom of God is about our complete and perfect communion with love itself—that is, with God in heaven.

Peace and blessings as we journey together striving to make progress in all of these four areas.


The Southeast Rochester Catholic Community Supports Rochester Hope!
