

#### OUR BACK-TO-SCHOOL DRIVE ... A HUGE SUCCESS!



#### A Word from Fr. John...



Are we aware of the cost of following Jesus as his disciple? In today's gospel, as Jesus journeys towards his passion and death in Jerusalem, he insists that all of us who seek to accompany him must ask ourselves this question. This is not surprising, as each step he takes brings him closer to his own passion and death on the cross. Keeping this in mind, his seemingly harsh demands don't seem as unreasonable or unthinkable. After all, if we are going to accompany Jesus along the way, we need to be aware of what it takes to follow him the whole way through. As he clearly states, "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple," (Luke 14:27).

The form that cross will take may vary from person to person. However, Jesus highlights three common attachments that can cause us to stumble, as we seek to follow him along the way. First, his call to hate one's parents, spouse, children and siblings challenges our natural affection for and attachment to family. This can be particularly hard to hear, as many of us derive a sense of our identity and social standing from our families, who also can provide essential material, financial, and emotional support. Unfortunately, this latter aspect can lead us to treat family and friends as possessions that we need to dominate and control. Thus, the loss of family through death or any other means can seem tantamount to losing one's own life.

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we must be willing to embrace as family others who are not related by blood or any other usual affiliation. We have to be a brother or sister to those who are different across all the ways that we distinguish ourselves from one another: race, class, social status, ability, gender, sexual orientation, politics, education, occupation, etc. This is what Paul is calling Philemon to do in looking upon and treating Onesimus not as his runaway slave but as his friend and brother in Christ. For some disciples, this new family may cause tension and disruption within themselves, with their biological families, and with friends and associates. Jesus wants us to be forewarned of these challenges so that we can be prepared to confront them.

Second, Jesus calls us to renounce all our possessions, which is particularly challenging in our consumeristic and materialistic society. We have been conditioned to rely on things to provide us with safety and security, with fun and diversions. As Jesus's parables suggest, we also tend to gather resources to accomplish a given task or goal. Similarly, we tend to stockpile things just in case the worst should happen. This leads us to an overreliance on ourselves and our possessions, instead of relying fully on God. As his disciples, we choose Jesus, in place of every other thing, as the source of all that we need, even life itself.

Third, looking to Jesus as the source of our life points to his repeated call to lose our life to save it. In picking up our cross and following Jesus, we may be called to give our lives in bearing witness to the gospel. While this may not involve physical death, it may mean dying to ourselves in various ways, including letting go of our possessions, prejudices, and preferences. As we transcend both natural and habitual tendencies, we participate more fully in the all-encompassing love of God. By learning to love as God loves, we avoid division and give up our preferences, growing to love each human being equally and fully.

Through prayer and reflection, we can uncover and name our attachments. By detaching ourselves, we gain the freedom to establish and maintain relationships with everybody and everything in our life, such that we engage with them in ways that enhance our relationship with God and our humble loving service of others. In doing so, we don't rely solely on ourselves, but lean into the inspiration and power of the Holy Spirit to help us chart a way to follow Christ more closely, as the last line of today's first reading suggests. In this way, as faithful disciples of Jesus Christ, we pick up our cross and follow him trusting that God walks with us, guiding us along the way through death to new life.

Peace and blessings to all of us as we strive to free ourselves to fully embrace the life we share with Christ.
