A Word from Fr. John...



Starting with today's feast of the Exultation of the Holy Cross, we turn our attention once again to Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope. For the final eleven weeks of Ordinary Time, our focus will be "Anchored in Hope". This builds upon the jubilee logo, which depicts four differently colored figures representing people from the four corners of the earth coming together to embrace the cross and one another in love. The cross, a symbol of our faith, is the means by which Jesus secured our redemption and salvation. At the same time, the cross transforms into an anchor, a traditional symbol of hope. Joined together as pilgrims on life's journey, we embrace faith and hope as guiding

forces making our way through the challenges and difficulties symbolized by the turbulent waves. The bend in the cross and anchor symbolize the dynamism of our journey through life. We move forward carrying the cross of faith anchored in hope, while at the same time, the power of faith and hope draw us forward through the turbulence of life.

At first glance, it may seem strange to associate the cross with hope. After all, the cross was a profane instrument of humiliating and excruciating torture and death. Most of us would be taken aback to see a hangman's gallows, guillotine, gas chamber, or electric chair enshrined in our churches or hanging from the neck of a loved one. What makes the cross of Christ different is its unique role in our redemption and salvation. Jesus made the cross holy by sacrificing his life to save us. Through this unsurpassable outpouring of God's love, the atrocity of the crucifixion is transformed into the means by which we receive abundant and eternal life. Through his Resurrection and Ascension into heaven, Jesus is exalted by God the Father, opening up eternal life to all who believe in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior. In this process, our two great fears, sin and death, are overcome forever and for all of us.

Through what Christ accomplished for us in his death and resurrection, the cross is transformed into a symbol of hope and a guiding standard for our own lives. By embracing the cross of Christ, we commit ourselves to the transformative power of God's love. When faced with challenges and difficulties, especially those that involve pain and suffering, we trust in God's willingness and ability to turn those around for us. For example, when faced with sickness and disability, Christ's healing can come to us through miracles, medicines, and medical care, but also by accompanying us as we pass from this life to the next.

Our hope in the transformative power unleashed by the cross of Christ extends into other areas of our life as well. Reflecting on our daily experiences, we witness how failures are reversed, humiliations are exchanged for blessings, anger and tension are dissolved, and bad habits are replaced by good works. This involves more than passive waiting and wishful thinking, as authentic hope impels us to be responsible and responsive by actively cooperating with the Lord in the pursuit of justice and peace. In hope, we move beyond our present incomplete existence to anticipate the fullness of life and joy with God in the new heaven and the new earth that awaits us.

As we celebrate the exultation of the Holy Cross, we may be horrified by Jesus's suffering or sorrowful for our sins. Yet, we place our hope in the transformation that our Lord offers us. We affirm this every time we make the sign of the cross. When we were baptized and the sign of the cross was made over us, we were incorporated into the transformative process of Christ's death and resurrection. The virtues of faith, hope and love, which fuel and are strengthened by this transformative process, are themselves strengthened through prayer, which begins with the sign of the cross.

If we love one another as Christ loved us, we will not escape having to carry our crosses. But our crosses are not just instruments of suffering and hardship. Through the transformative love of God, they can become the means of our salvation. May we embrace the cross, anchored in hope, as we journey with Christ from death to new life.
