

A Word from Fr. John...



In last week's column, I introduced our focus for the remaining weeks of Ordinary Time: "Anchored in Hope." This builds off the logo for Jubilee 2025: Pilgrims of Hope. The logo features the cross, a symbol of our faith and the means by which Christ secured our salvation, which transforms into an anchor. This is fitting as the transformation unleashed by Christ's death and resurrection opens the way for us to share new life in Christ. We will experience this new life most fully in loving communion with God and all the saints in heaven. Until then, our hope in the transformative power unleashed by the cross of Christ helps to shape us, and to overcome the obstacles and setbacks we encounter as we follow Christ on the way to new life.

In today's gospel, Jesus challenges us to examine our relationship with God and material wealth. By indicating that we can't serve both, Jesus is asking us to consider in which of the two we will anchor our hope. We realize that we can't simply ignore our need for material goods and resources to sustain life. Yet, as Amos in today's first reading and the Responsorial Psalm indicate, prioritizing the pursuit of wealth can damage our relationship with God and our neighbor. God will not overlook evil behavior, whether it is giving the praise and worship due God short shrift or mistreating others through fraud and abuse, especially the poor and lowly, whom God raises up to be treated like royalty. Our attitude toward money and wealth shapes our fidelity and devotion to God and our care of the poor and lowly.

On a deeper level, it also points to how our choice to depend either on our possessions or on the Lord reflects our understanding of wealth and of what holds value in this life and the next. If we acknowledge our dependence on God, we must embrace the freedom God offers and reject any attachment or enslavement to our possessions. By doing so, we recognize our solidarity with our fellow human beings and our need to work together with God to care for one another and our common home. This leads to both almsgiving and tithing. When we give alms, we affirm that true wealth is found in the dignity of the human person regardless of how others may label, undervalue, and dismiss them. When we tithe, we acknowledge our dependence on God and the need to be in communion with God and others, especially the poor and the lowly. Put simply, we prioritize discipleship over managing wealth and property, finding greater joy in spending time with others than in obtaining the next new thing.

This ties back to the Jubilee logo, as seeking right relationship with God and material wealth requires nothing less than embracing a new way of life – a life consistent with the gospel of Jesus Christ. That means embracing the cross of Christ, a symbol of our faith, anchored in hope. As we take up our cross and follow Jesus along the way, we will pass through challenging and turbulent times. This doesn't require superhuman skills or knowledge. We all have the capacity to act prudently, whether we are dishonest or trustworthy. This requires an honest assessment of our own strengths and weaknesses, as well as those of the community we are part of, while carefully considering different options and cultivating relationships with those who can help us. When we gather together in communion with God and others representing the full spectrum of humanity, we can face those challenges placing our faith and hope in the Lord.

Peace and blessing as we anchor our hope in our relationship with God and one another above material wealth. Yours,

They included a refugee organization, a small enterprise that provides employment to women in addiction recovery, and a land trust of low-income people becoming homeowners in inner city Rochester.
