

A Word from Fr. John...



Jesus addresses today's gospel parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else. The story takes an unexpected twist as the Pharisee, not the tax collector, is revealed as the antagonist. While the Pharisee fasts and tithes beyond what is required, his prayer is directed at himself and listing his accomplishments. Gloating in God's face, his haughty and disconnected demeanor makes him appear to have no need of God.

In contrast, the tax collector humbles himself before God, acknowledging his sinfulness and seeking God's mercy and forgiveness. He gives an honest and accurate assessment of his relationship with God and utter dependence on God. The tax collector places his hope on God's merciful forgiveness and its power to transform his sinfulness. Unlike the Pharisee, he avoids comparing himself with others, which can lead to thinking that we are different from and better

than our fellow human beings.

As one commentator pointed out, it's easy to fall into the trap of comparing ourselves to the two characters in this parable. By imagining ourselves more like the humble and contrite tax collector and looking down upon the Pharisee, we start to differentiate and distance ourselves, potentially repeating his haughtiness and disconnectedness. Of course, erring in the opposite direction by being overly critical and harsh in judging ourselves also distorts who we truly are in relation to God and our fellow human beings. Comparing ourselves with others, whether favorably or not, draws us into jealousy, dissatisfaction, and a lack of self-worth.

Instead of comparisons, we should strive for connection with God and one another. While we need to honestly acknowledge our flaws and failures in serving God, we should also express our gratitude to God for our gifts and gifts of our neighbor. Also, we should pray for God's grace to transform us and help us to better use those gifts in service of love.

In loving God and our neighbor as ourselves, we don't need to puff ourselves up out of fear for what is different. Following Christ, we can engage in a radical self-emptying, humbling ourselves before God and others. When combined with open-heartedness, it becomes easier to acknowledge our weaknesses and struggles and share the gifts that we have received with one another. Often, by sharing our gifts, we help each other overcome our weaknesses and struggles, coming together to make the kingdom of God more apparent on earth. In this way, we build connections that mutually affirm and respect the inherent dignity and worth of our fellow human beings, recognizing our dependence on God and God's mercy, love and forgiveness.

As I indicated last week, in conjunction with our celebration of All Souls Day, we will be reading off the names of our deceased loved ones who passed from November 2024 through October 2025 at our Masses with Remembrance Service on November 1st & 2nd. To add the name of a deceased loved one whose funeral service was not held in one of our parish churches, please contact the parish office by this Monday, October 27th. To remember others who died in years past, a Book of Lives Remembered is available in all three of our churches. Our deceased loved ones whose names are written in these books will be prayed for in the General Intercessions at all our Masses next weekend. May we have faith and hope that our prayers for our deceased loved ones will pierce the clouds, reach their goal, and elicit God's prompt and loving response.
