

A Word from Fr. John...



On All Souls' Day, we commemorate all those who have gone before us in death, whether they are in heaven or not (yet), by offering prayers on their behalf. These prayers we offer for our dead loved ones can help their souls to be purified more quickly, lessening their experience of purgatory and hastening their entrance into heaven. As such, these prayers express hope that God will free those who have died from any burden of sin and prepare a place for them in heaven. We base that hope on the word of God proclaimed in today's readings, which invite us to trust in the mercy of God and in God's desire to care for each of us for all eternity.

Yet, the loss of a loved one can leave us feeling empty and in pain. We are forced to face the harsh reality of the permanence of death. Nothing can reverse that loss. When we suffer from such profound grief, it is difficult to hold on to hope. Moreover, how can we summon the faith that undergirds our hope, when in our grief, we lack any sense of God's love and presence?

The question on the bookmark for this week, "How does accompanying others in good times and bad, affect my sense of hope?" points us to the important role of accompaniment. We need to walk with others in their grief. As much as the pain and sorrow of grief may lead us to retreat and isolate, we can't go it alone. We need others to accompany us through our grief.

If we are called upon or find ourselves accompanying those who are grieving, we need to resist the temptation to find a fix. Instead, it's best to offer not mere sympathy but true empathy, allowing us to identify with or vicariously experience the emotions, thoughts, or attitudes of those who are grieving. This requires active listening, wherein we listen with the intent to understand the other person fully, what they are thinking and how they are feeling. Our comments and questions seek comprehension and clarification. Our goal is to help the other person feel respected, supported, and truly heard. This helps to promote healing and opens us up to a renewal of our faith. This is particularly the case when we accompany one another as people of shared faith.

Through that shared faith, those whose faith is active can spark the faith in others whose experiences have called that faith into question. That has less to do with proselytizing and more to do with living out the faith in their daily lives. This can be particularly powerful when those who are grieving gather with others to offer praise and worship to the Lord. The inspiration of the Holy Spirit at work in those gathered to pray can spark the spirit and reawaken the faith among those who are grieving. In turn, that faith spurs hope in God's saving power and desire to gather all God's children into heavenly bliss. We cannot overlook or discount the importance of these collective expressions of faith in bolstering the faith and hope of those who are grieving. Thus, when our own faith is undermined by grief, the faith of those who are close to us and accompany us, along with the faith of those who gather with us to pray, especially at Mass, restore in us hope in the Resurrection, which is the ultimate consolation in the face of death.

May God inspire and empower us in our efforts to bolster the faith and hope of those who are grieving. Yours,
