

Parish Tithing Support of St. Michael's Woodshop

As an integral part of our Parishes Social Ministry, John Myers, Chairman of the SRCC Tithing Committee and Deacon Duncan visited St. Michael's Woodshop which recently received a tithing grant from SRCC.

The purpose of this visit was to learn more about the programs the woodshop offers. The woodshop operates five days per week for city boys and girls, ages 13 to 18 who work after school and in the summer. Each



youth receives a small stipend for participating and their success is measured in the growth of the individual.

The woodshop is housed at 691 St. Paul St. in the basement of the Monroe County Social Services building. Students develop and enhance their skills under the director, James Smith, and from volunteer mentors. Students learn such skills as measuring, cutting, sanding, fitting and painting while using a full range of equipment including some recent state-of-the-art technology which creates physical three-dimensional objects from digital designs.

St. Michael's Woodshop is funded by grants, donations and sales of its products. Our parish has supported St. Michael's Woodshop in the past. St. Michael's is always looking for volunteers and mentors to work one-on-one with students helping them solve problems with kindness and respect. Volunteers do not need woodworking or other skills to assist. Individuals can assist with reading, writing, math and everyday life skills. A Word from Fr. John...



As I mentioned in last week's bulletin, today we celebrate the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica, the cathedral church of the Pope as the Bishop of Rome. As it is called the "mother and head of all the churches of Rome and the world," this feast day symbolizes Christian unity, as Catholics gather together under the guidance of the Pope. It also commemorates the end of persecution as Emperor Constantine's legalization of Christianity led to the construction and dedication of the basilica in 324 AD. However, as emphasized in our readings today, it reminds us that all baptized Catholics are living "temples" of God. While we are grateful for our parish's three churches as spaces where our community gathers to worship, this feast encourages us to recognize ourselves as forming the Mystical Body of

Christ, the Church, with each of us as a living temple of God, where the Holy Spirit dwells.

Paul explicitly states this, calling us "God's building," whose foundation is Jesus Christ and upon whom others build. The Church is founded on a person, both fully human and fully divine. It is built up through relationships formed with Christ, who sends out apostles to spread the good news and connect more and more people with Christ and through Christ with one another. Our sense of church may develop within a specific building, but it is rooted and sustained by the relationships and connections that we have with those who gather with us to celebrate the Eucharist.

Moreover, as "the temple of God" in whom the Holy Spirit dwells, every human being is endowed with an inherent dignity and worth. The presence of Holy Spirit within the body of every human being makes them inviolable in the eyes of God. Therefore, anyone who disregards or attempts to diminish or deny the sanctity of human life puts their own life at risk, as God will hold them accountable. As Jesus explains in the Sermon on the Mount, the prohibition against taking someone's life ("Thou shall not kill") extends beyond murder to include name-calling, cursing or any action that diminishes or denies the inherent sanctity of another human being.

This perspective helps us understand Jesus's anger and use of coercive force in today's Gospel. Jesus's all-consuming zeal for God's house drives him to overturn the system of temple worship in response to the misguided attempts to commodify the relationship between God and humanity, as if it could be bought and sold. Religious practice is not akin to buying grace and blessings from God, as if God were some sort of a cosmic vending machine. As the Temple of God, the Holy Spirit always already dwells within us, and we only need recognize and act upon it.

When Jesus says, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up," he is referring to destroying his body as a Temple of the Holy Spirit, trusting that God the Father will raise him up in a glorified body. By extension, his death and resurrection opens the way for our being incorporated into the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church, through baptism and the Eucharist. These sacraments, which flow from Christ through the Church like the water flowing from the temple in today's first reading, bring refreshment, new life, nourishment, and healing. By celebrating the sacraments, the Church welcomes new members and deepens our relationship with God and one another.

This further broadens our understanding of "Zeal for your house will consume me." Jesus's zeal for us as the "house of God," consumes him in his loving self-sacrifice on the cross, leading to the establishment of the Church. Coming together as the Church, we memorialize Christ's passion, death and resurrection, as we consume him, his Body and Blood in the Eucharist, which further unites us in loving communion with God and one another.

Therefore, as we celebrate the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica, we recognize the significance that particular church buildings play in our faith journey. However, we recognize that the Church's true essence lies in our relationships and connections with God and one another, especially those we gather with regularly as the house of God, the body of Christ, and the temple of the Holy Spirit.

Peace and blessings as we journey together through challenging times for the Church, our nation and the world.
