

MONSIGNOR RICE LEAVES FATHER FORD ARRIVES



On January 18, 1966, the 500 pupils of the John F. Kennedy School assembled in the lobby of the building to bid Monsignor Charles O. Rice a tearful farewell. He was leaving after eight years of magnificent service to our Parish. His new assignment is Holy Rosary Parish in Pittsburgh. The grade school joined with numerous church and civic organizations in paying tribute to the wonderful works of Monsignor in behalf of so many worthy causes which came his way in his care of souls.

Within a few days this same lobby was the scene of a warm welcome to our new Pastor, Father Howard Ford who came to us from St. Peter Church Tarentum, Pa. On this occasion a song composed by S. M. Annunciata and S. M. Concetta and adapted to the melody of "Spoonful of Sugar," rang through the halls as Father Ford became acquainted with his new family of children.



THE JOHN F. KENNEDY SCHOOL which was dedicated by Bishop John J. Wright on January 5, 1966, replaces the 65 year-old structure known as Immaculate Conception Grade School, formerly located on North Franklin Street. The new building was named in honor of President Kennedy because it was in the planning stage at the time of his tragic death. Monsignor Rice said on this occasion, "We named the structure in his honor because of our pride in his life and our sorrow at his death."


The new school building consists of three levels comprising 15 class-rooms, a library including an audiovisual center, science laboratory with display and storage rooms, two materials centers for small group instruction, a bookstore, faculty lounge, staff room, health room, administration office with adjoining workroom, a lobby, and an activities room.

Each classroom is equipped with built-in screen projection area across

the upper front of the room, and provision has been made for closed circuit television in the near future. On each of the three levels the classroms in the west wing have movable walls to accommodate combined groups on occasion. There is also an electric service elevator on each floor.

The revised curriculum will utilize the latest in instructional technology. Nearly all classrooms now have overhead projectors, film projectors, and materials for team teaching. A nongraded program in mathematics and language arts is the goal of the curriculum planners for 1966-67.

The architects for the John F. Kennedy School were Deeter & Ritchey of Pittsburgh; the contractor was McAnallen Brothers, Incorporated of Washington. Monsignor Charles Owen Rice, the pastor during the construction and planning months, and Sister M. Colman, principal, were active in the planning and recommendations for the new building.



JOHN F. KENNEDY SCHOOL

THE JOHN F. KENNEDY LIBRARY

Pictured here is a typical afterschool group engaged in research. These pupils are middle grades who find the library very helpful in preparing their assignments, especially in the area of the Social Studies. The library is open for the use of classes with their teachers throughout the day, though there are specific hours assigned to each room. The library is open for circulation of books from 3:00 until 4:30 each day. Mrs. Joseph Barbarossa assists Sister M. Colman in the administration of the library. Several eighth grade girls are being trained as library-aides for after-school service.

The library proper is 36 feet by 34 feet in floor space with a communications center and librarians' workroom included. In the communications center is kept all the audio visual equipment and teachers' materials for instruction. The library houses approximately 2000 books in this beginning stage. The expected increase for next year is about 50%.

In the past week several donations have been received for plates to be placed in the front of books In Loving Memory of Susan M. Kittridge, our first grader who died on May 10th, 1966. These include requests from Mr. and Mrs. Gandy Interval, (5 books), Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Colombo, Eighth Grade Class of 1966, (3 books) and Children of the Grade School, (3 books).

Our LIBRARY will receive many new books in September because of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act approved by the Government recently. Our plan this year is to enrich the story book section for the middle grades.

Next semester the library will also install three or four carrels for private study or research by upper grade students. One of these will be equipped for viewing of slides or filmstrips; another will have recorder and earphone sets for private listening.

MUSIC

Some time ago our school purchased many musical instruments for group and individual instruction for pupils of all grades, but chiefly for the primary department.

Pictured here are some of the instruments of percussion, namely xylophones, glockenspeils, timpani, cymbals, drums, triangles, and tambourines.

Plans are under way to begin this course in September in our school. The course originated in 1948 in Germany by Carl Orff who has developed his own School of Music for children in Munich, Germany.

Mt. Mercy College and Carnegie Tech are offering a special ten day course in July for music instructors.



PHYSICAL FITNESS

On Wednesday May 4, 1966 approximately 50 students from the John F. Kennedy School participated in the Physical Fitness Pentathlon co-sponsored by the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States and the Quaker Oats Company. This event was held at the A & P parking lot on Jefferson Avenue. Those who took active part in the program were presented Certificates of Achievement stating that they have contributed to the physical well being of the youth of our nation. Each participant was also given a prize for his efforts in competing with other children in his own age group.

CANCELLED STAMPS

The annual drive for cancelled stamps was held this year, under the supervision of Sister M. Cornelia. Students of John F. Kennedy School, and their friends aided in the collection of these cancelled stamps. As in the past, the student effort was most gratifying. The five bags of stamps, totaling 200 pounds, were mailed on April 28th to the Cantian Stamp Bureau in St. Louis, Missouri. Our thanks to all of those who helped in the collection of these stamps, and to Timothy Cook of seventh grade who has sorted thousands of stamps into the various categories. Our goal is another trophy for aiding the missions.

RECEIVES HONORS

Finalist in the school spelling competition, Catherine Noroski represented us in the Annual Spelling Bee conducted in the Washington High School Auditorium. Catherine was also selected to receive the D A R. History Award which was presented by the Washington Chapter.

PART IN ABC's

Each grade in our school participated this Spring in the annual A B C's of Industry. This contest is sponsored by Industry in the interests of improving handwriting and essay skills. Our students have taken awards for the past 8 years and hope to be among the winners to be published in October.

SPEECH:

In order to provide for every need that a child might have in his school day, the services of a speech therapist have been made available for the past few years. Last year and this year Mr. William Kusmirak has been our very successful therapist. He instructs the children who need speech corrective drills for one period a week. This service is given to pupils of all grades as they are recommended by their teachers or parents.

CAMP FATIMA

Many students of John F. Kennedy School have registered at Camp Fatima, a summer camp for boys and girls of the Pittsburgh Catholic Diocese. This camp is operated by the Catholic Youth Organization, and is located in Connoquenessing, Pennsylvania. Numerous events are scheduled for girls and boys from the ages of 8 to 14. A religious program, consisting of Mass and the Rosary, is also included.

WORK & PLAY . . .

Some work and some play Makes first graders happy all day.

A certain amount of free time is given each day to an Activities Period in which the little children choose from a variety of educational experiences such as storekeeping, puzzle matching, checking out story books from their own library and very important to the "caretaker of the day"—the feeding of several pets. The most popular choices each day are the management of the lending of library books and the observing and care of the fish, the hamster, turtles, and rabbits.

WHAT NEXT?

First graders may learn the fundamentals of the alphabet, the study of phonics, through the use of typewriters next September. This will be an experiment with about twenty youngsters who may show an aptitude for this particular skill. Comparison will be made with those who follow the familiar procedure of using separate cut out letters printed on small squares of cardboard. The evaluation will measure speed and permanence in the learning of letters of the alphabet. One of the objects of this experiment is to conserve the time usually lost in searching out a letter from hundreds in a box. The letter on the keyboard will always be in the same place. Youngsters will be taught proper finger positions on the keyboard.



SUSAN KITTRIDGE

On Tuesday, May 10th 1966, the soul of our little first grader, Susie Kittridge, entered into heaven for all eternity. We will miss seeing her around the school, especially at change of class time in the primary department when Susie rang the bell. She was a very superior pupil in all her lessons in spite of the fact that she started school a year early. Susie was six on March 27th Susan received God in First Holy Communion on January 16th.

At the Mass of the Angels, A Funeral Mass for Little Children, Father Howard Ford, our New Paster, consoled the Kittridge family their friends, relatives, and the 500 pupils of the grade school with words of deep sympathy. Father explained why Susan's death was really just a departure from us, and that God had called her soul to be with him forever, saving that one of the greatest joys possible is the positive salvation of a soul. Her soul is now with God in heaven: her family and friends here on earth are lonesome for her pre-sence, but, in God's own words, "Your Sorrow Will Be Turned To Joy".





ABACUS TO ALGEBRA

This is one of many typical classrooms scenes during lessons in modern mathematics throughout the school Here Sister M. Hilary is explaining to one of her fourth graders the fundamentals of fractional measurement on a number line.

The "new" math program has been in progress here for several years from the abacus of first grade to algebra in the eighth. Recently students from the eighth grade have been admitted to sophomore high school math classes in their freshman year.

MANY FIRSTS

The transportation of approximately 25% of our pupils by public school bus began in September. Over 100 children are picked up outside the city limits and taken to the Trinity High School campus where they board Immaculate Conception Parish buses which bring them to the door of John F. Kennedy School. Parents, faculty, and children are very grateful for this arrangement. All are proud to note that there has been a successful first year of free transportation for those students who live beyond walking distance.

ANOTHER FIRST in the history of the school is the request of the parents for the adoption of uniforms for the girls. The boys have always worn clothing which is more or less uniform and in keeping with good grooming. The girls are now wearing forest green open jumpers and white blouses. Accessories are optional. The girls are pleased with the numerous conveniences of this arrangement. Those who participated in the Forty Hours Procession in late September were the first to wear the new uniforms for such an occasion.

A NONGRADED SCHOOL

There are many definitions of "nongraded" schools. In general, the plan in operation at John F. Kennedy School is that of nongraded subjects within the three departments usually referred to as primary intermediate, and junior high. The subgroups of the departments are called levels. There can be as many levels as the room capacity, number of teachers, etc. can accommodate. For example, in the primary department this year there are five report rooms, and four additional rooms where smaller groups may be instructed simultaneously.

The subjects which will be nongraded are Mathematics and the broad area known as the Language Arts which include reading, spelling, phonics, English and handwriting.

Pupils are placed according to their achievement level and they have the opportunity to advance or not according to their ability. The goal of nongradedness is not to accelerate promotion from grade to grade, but to progress from one level to another according to one's own rate of learning. This type of program eliminates the "repeating a grade" for those who learn more slowly. The pupil does not usually repeat the entire grade but the subject in which he has failed to maintain normal standards.

The student's age and other social aspects of the grouping situations are carefully considered by the instructors in each group.

V. A. P. INSTITUTED AT JOHN F.

A year ago Monsignor John B. McDowell, superintendent of schools for the Diocese of Pittsburgh, authorized and encouraged the establishing of VAP, Volunteer Aid Program, in the schools. The purpose of this organization is to aid the school faculty in routine duties and to assist teachers in areas such as physical training, library services, clerical help, art and music appreciation lessons, care of audio-visual equipment and resources, and guided drills in remedial or enrichment aspects of the language arts and mathematics.

Several of the aides who are now giving many hours a week are specializing in specific subject areas, such as phonics and art. They are greatly aided by the teacher-training courses currently offered on television station WQED.

The program is under the direction of Sister M. Colman, principal. Mrs. Joseph Barbarossa, the assistant librarian is the coordinator for VAP

ALASKA BOUND!

The University of Alaska, situated outside the city of Fairbanks, will be the scene of summer study in Geography for Sister M. Colman, principal. Sister has been awarded a grant from the National Science Foundation for an eight week course in geology. Sister is a specialist in geography and related subjects and has spent several weekends this past semester working with the Eastern Educational Network in Boston on a television course in social studies.

Also attending the same University this summer will be Miss Dolores Cobucci, eighth grade teacher, who has received a grant from the same Foundation for study in Mathematics and Science. Two other Sisters of Mercy from this area are also recipients of similar grants for summer study.

Pupils who will be entering the first grade in September and have not been tested for group placement will be notified of the date for this test prior to the last week of August. Watch the Church Bulletin for further information.

SCIENCE LABORATORY FACILITIES

The science laboratory in our new building has served its students well in this, its first school term. Visitors may tour on the third floor and stop in amazement at the activities taking place in the lab. At times, small groups of children may be working there alone, testing, studying, taking notes. Usually an entire class uses the lab for some special instruction or demonstration.

Little children are especially fascinated with the laboratory. A group of 40 first graders was given the grand tour one afternoon. They experimented wonderingly with a magnet and iron filings, learned how to peer into a microscope, witnessed the use of a bunsen burner. They fed and handled the guinea pigs, hamsters and chicks and they shrieked at the jars of preserved frogs, crayfish and worms.

Everyone who enters the lab is immediately attracted by the professional collection of rocks and minerals. Large valuable specimens are displayed in the specially built glasstopped cases. A short written description or history of each specimen is there. A little rock tumbler is usually operating, polishing small chips of agate, obsidian or jasper. This room is the headquarters of the school Geology Club, a newly formed science organization designed to stimulate interest in earth science. Members have frequent meetings, field trips and other activities involving Geology. 160 active members hold club cards and contribute information and activities from time to time.

Recently, the seventh grade class donned lab coats, overshirts or aprons, and performed dissections on the animal specimens preserved in formaldehyde. They sketched drawings of the vital organs and included appropriate labels. Students in other grades marveled as each seventh grader displayed his work, and they received commendations from all the teachers.
