Friends,

I hope you all had a great Christmas celebration with family and loved ones. I hope it was a time of joy and peace for you as we remembered the birth of Jesus into our world.

Today we celebrate the Epiphany, a word that means "manifestation." Being born of the Virgin Mary, God was made visible to us and in a way unheard of before. And he became visible not to just a select few privileged people, but to all. He wasn't born in a palace, closed off from the world, but in a place accessible to everyone.

The appearance of the "magi" today makes this even more apparent. They noticed a star from far away in the east, a star that led them to the place where the infant lay. The birth of Jesus is for the whole world, without exception.

We learn something else from the Magi: that coming to Jesus, we ought to bring a gift. The Magi, as we know, brought gold, frankincense and myrrh. But I think the gifts Jesus wants from us are simpler. He came very simply, a baby in a manger. I think this tells us that he simply wants us to come to him with the gift our ourselves and love him.

Bring the gift that you are to Jesus, that is enough for him—

Gospel Reflection

Epiphany. The word means manifestation. God is revealing his glory, not with great fanfare or extraordinary signs but in the simple birth of a baby. Yet the Magi, following their star, recognized the sign and did him homage. How often do we look for great signs and symbols to know God's will for us? If only we had a star to follow, if only Jesus would speak to us and make his will clear. Yet, we have been given all the tools we need. We have the teaching of the Church, we have scripture, and we have the sacraments. We have the gift of the Holy Spirit. But like the Wise Men, we need to take time to study, to ponder and to allow God to show his will for us in the little everyday things. We need to take time to pray and to listen and then, we too, will come to recognize Jesus in our midst and will do him homage.

What do the Magi bring to the Christmas story?

Once upon a time

One legend has it that the Magi were three different ages. <u>Gaspar</u> was a young man, <u>Balthazar</u> in his middle years, and <u>Melchior</u> an elderly man. When they reached the cave in Bethlehem, they went in one at a time. Melchior entered first. He found an old man like himself with whom he was quickly at home. They spoke together of memory and gratitude. The middle-aged Balthazar entered next. He encountered a teacher of his own years. They talked passionately of leadership and responsibility. When young Gaspar entered, a young prophet met him with words of reform and promise.

The three met outside the cave and spoke to each other about their encounter with the Christ. They were shocked at each other's stories and marveled that each had gone in to see a newborn child but had met someone of his own years. They gathered their gifts in their arms and entered *together* for a second time. In a manger, on a bed of straw was a baby, 12 days old.

The message of Christ talks to every stage of life. The old hear the call to integrity and wisdom, the middle-aged to generativity and responsibility, and the young to identity and intimacy. This revelation accompanies us on our journey through life. We marvel at its richness and adaptability. To find Christ at any stage in our lives is to find ourselves. Yet no matter where we are in our lives, we are still *children of God*.
