

FATHER PAUL'S POST

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

The theme of this week's readings is forgiveness. Maybe a good way to look at forgiveness is to see what unforgiveness does. If you look at



many global events, many nations keep trying to get revenge on another nation for some real or imagined act of cruelty. Some "family feuds" have gone back centuries. Sadly, some people still live by the ancient principle of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." However, in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew chapter 6;38) Jesus states that we should no longer live by that rule. We can't hold on to hating and desire for revenge. We have to let go.

Refusing to forgive is a form of anger. It can be an anger we will not let go. The man in the parable refused to forgive his fellow servant may have been motivated by selfishness, or pettiness, or greed, or even by the thought of not letting anyone take advantage of him.

Whatever the reason, refusing to forgive is probably some form of pride. Sometimes we are treated badly.....very badly. We end up doing more harm to ourselves than to anyone else when we keep that anger alive in us. It had the potential to eat us up emotionally and maybe even physically. Jesus' suggestion to forgive is good not only spiritually but psychologically as well!

If we are struggling with forgiveness, it's always best to put Christ in the situation. Ask for His help, His guidance. Just remember the twelfth station of the cross. It's where Jesus dies on the cross. After being betrayed by a close friend, denied by another, his other best friends ran away. He was ridiculed and mocked, scourged, forced to carry a cross. He was mocked by one of the criminals as He was hung upon the cross. Yet, through all that, Jesus said, "Father forgive them. They know not what they do."
