SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM (AYUDA ESCOLAR) UPDATES

Many of you know about the longstanding ministry St. Tom's has of providing Scholarships for students in our Sister Parish Mary Mother of the Poor. This ministry started around 1989 when our Sistering relationship first began. Currently we are providing partial scholarships for High School and College students to aid them in obtaining an education. High School is "technically" paid for by the government if you attend a


public school, however many of our

students do not have ready access to a public high school and attend a local Catholic High School (which charges tuition) and if they do attend a public High School, they need to pay transportation (bus) costs, as well as supplies and additional expenses. This can be prohibitive for a family making WELL under the minimum necessary to exist. University students that are lucky enough to get into the National University do not pay tuition- but they must pay transportation, copy fees, internet access, books, labs, etc. If they go to a private university,



their monthly tuition is between \$55 and over \$100/month in addition to transportation, copy fees, internet access, books, labs, etc. Those who attend the National University have classes during the day, so they are unable to work (at

> least "normal" hours), whereas if they go to a private University, they often have classes on weekends and evenings to accommodate a work schedule.



In addition to their studies and work schedules (if they are lucky enough to get a job), the student must do 2 hours a week of "social hours" to give back to the Parish They also must keep up their or their community.

grades, not fail classes, and attend monthly formation classes. The program is run totally BY the students, the committee is chosen by their peers, and although they do have an administrative oversight, but they do the hard work. Some of our previous graduates continue to voluntarily help, also in administrative type roles.

During COVID all University classes have been online, and it is anticipated that this year the school year will also begin online. This has caused difficulties for many students as they do not have computers (they have been attending classes and doing homework assignments on their phones), or internet access. Many have had to use their phones to do all their work, and they buy minutes or data on an as needed basis, as they cannot afford

is AMAZING to me what they have had to overcome in order to keep up their studies- many of the faculty are not trained in online education and they have not had question/answer sessions for those who need help understanding material.

K-12 education went back in a hybrid format the last semes-

ter of last year and plans were to start the school year in person (or in a hybrid format) on January 31, 2022. They were hoping for most days to be in person.

I was blessed to visit our Sister Parish from January 12 - 28 and celebrate student graduations from 2020 and 2021 at the beach. The students had not gone anywhere or celebrated together in the past two years, so this was a treat for all of them. Due to illness/familial illness or work, only 40 people were able to attend. We celebrated 9 High School and 6 University graduates from 2020 and 12 High School and 6 University graduates from 2021. They all received St. Tom's t-shirts and the cards that you all signed. In addition, University grads get certificates with official seals and signatures.

The Romero Day Center is a program that provides Lunch, a hearty afternoon "snack", fellowship, exercise, and an opportunity to be useful to the elderly in the Mary Mother of the Poor area. They arrive around 12:30 and leave around 4:30-5pm. They have lunch, work on different projects (like the beautiful altar cloth), exercise, chat with each other and for "holidays" celebrate or take excursions. Monthly they try to give each senior some staples to help them through the month. Many of them do not have families that support them, and there are no governmental services for the

elderly. If they have sufficient funding they also provide help with medical expenses and medication for those who participate in the program and need it.

During COVID, it has been too dangerous for the elderly to gather- for the staff (2 people) or the participants, so they have still been making lunch and their snack, and they come to pick it up (or they deliver to those that are having a hard time getting out). St. Tom's Advent Project is one of the only supports they have to fund this project.
