As the October School Week begins, I wish all our teachers, staff, parents and pupils a well-deserved break. If you are getting away somewhere, I hope that you have a relaxing, fun time that enables the batteries to recharge. I'm hoping to have some time off myself in the near future.

It has been great to see many of our parishioners since things have eased a little. While attending Mass "virtually' is a great help when needed, there is nothing like being here at Mass and being able to receive Jesus in Holy Communion to strengthen us and to renew our spirits. While many people are rightly still cautious, I look forward

to seeing more of you when the time is right for yourself.

Various adaptations are being made here just now, and in the weeks ahead, to help us to be safe over the winter months. Soon there will be more windows able to be open in the Church, to allow for better air flow. In time this will mean that we will be able to close the internal doors at the entrance and still get fresh air in. During the winter it will be good not to have to experience the full force of the elements! When the heating is on then all the air coming in is fresh air so that allows us to completely change the air in the Church between Masses and for a period during a Mass. Unfortunately this is quite noisy but we are also expecting to increase the number of speakers in the Church, which will help during the periods that the heating is running.

Ventilation in the toilets is being improved to help airflow. When that is completed they will be more open for use. New sanitisers and antibacterial soap units are already in the toilets.

In the course of the coming weeks, some groups will begin using the hall again. Initially this will be established groups who have provided us with risk assessments. Some of our regular parish activities will be able to start once we have determined a safe way of working for that activity. In the meantime, however, the hall will be unavailable to hire for a private function.

In a few weeks time, I'll be speaking to you about the new format for the Parish Pastoral Council. I am really excited about the possibilities this will provide as we journey together in faith. This will build upon the great work of the outgoing Pastoral Council, that has been at the heart of so many great things over many years here in St Charles'. I am pleased that we are going to be able to continue to draw on the experience and insight of many of the former Council, and that the new format will allow also for the inspiration and talents of many more parishioners to help us to journey into the next few years of the life of this great parish community.

Finally, I wish to thank all of you, for your continued, faithful support of the parish over the past 18 months in so many ways. Firstly by joining in our worship of God, even when the Church Building was closed, through to all the tremendous work that has been done through the many, varied stages we have gone through since lockdown. The efforts and support of the whole parish community through your prayer, your volunteering and by your financial support are testament to greatness of this faithful and faith-filled parish community. 

PASTORAL LETTER ON THE LOCAL CONSULTATION FOR THE SYNOD OF BISHOPS 2023

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Ahead of the next Synod of Bishops in Rome, Pope Francis is calling the Church to begin a synodal journey which includes each and every Catholic – clergy, religious and lay faithful. The theme of the 2023 Synod is: *A Synodal Church of Communion, Participation and Mission*.

Pope Francis wants our journey to begin this month with a listening phase in every diocese across the world.

We are being asked to give our thoughts on questions the Pope has sent us, which we will discuss first at parish level through our Parish Pastoral Councils, and then at diocesan level through our Diocesan Pastoral Council. Our Diocesan Pastoral Council is made up of a representative from each parish and has its first meeting on Saturday 27th November.

You may remember how, five years ago, we held our own Diocesan Synod on *Evangelisation and the Role of the Laity*, a theme which is similar to what the Pope wants us to think about now in this Universal Synod.

Our Diocesan Synod created a Charter which blossomed into nine diocesan Commissions: on Evangelisation, Education and Formation; on Youth, Marriage and Families; on Liturgy, Structures and Collaborative Ministry; and on Communications, Caritas and Ecumenism, and it is wonderful to see so many of our lay faithful now taking forward the life and mission of our diocese through them.

Our own synodal journey showed us how our Church needs all of us, the whole People of God – clergy, religious and lay faithful - joining together on the same journey, with each of us playing our unique part, all of us united in collaboration. It was a precious time for our diocese to see how we all share a common dignity and vocation through our Baptism to be active participants in the life of the Church.



This is what Pope Francis means by a synodal Church where we all move forward together as one, carrying out one common mission, built up by the gifts and charisms of every member.

Getting everyone involved, of course, means getting as many of us back to our common celebration of Sunday Mass in our parish communities and I urge you to reach out to your families and fellow parishioners, to encourage them to come back to church and welcome them again to our parish families as we move out of COVID restrictions.

As we now look to the renewal of our diocese, I also encourage you to participate in this unique Synodal opportunity of listening to *what the Spirit is saying to our Church* through shared dialogue. I hope it will be a journey that not only guides our current pastoral mission at diocesan level but which can open up new pathways for the Church worldwide in the spreading of the Gospel and the salvation of souls.
