4 Practical Steps to Avoid Gossip

1. Realize it is Gossiping in the Moment

Very often, we don't sit down with friends to have a gossip with someone about someone else (and if we are, that's the first step. Stop doing that!). Sometimes, a conversation takes a turn for the worse into being unkind, passing on private information about someone else, or in-depth speculating into someone's personal life. The first step to avoiding gossip is to recognize that that is what it is. You can ask yourself, 'would I want someone to be discussing this about me?'

2. Don't Ask Leading Questions

Once you realize that the conversation has gone into gossip, especially if it is someone else who starts the conversation, you can help stop it yourself by not asking any questions that will make the conversation more destructive.

Don't ask leading questions if the topic has gone there. Steer the conversation away. The truth is most people want to be included in a conversation and will most happily follow wherever a conversation goes. You can politely, cheerfully, and discretely move a conversation totally away from gossip by making another piece of unobjectionable small talk.

3. If it is appropriate, defend the person or put in a different perspective

This shouldn't be done with the intention to continue the conversation about the individual, but if you know that

something is being said that is untrue, you can put in a calm word to correct the gossip. Or you can remind those in the conversation that the person being gossiped about, as we all are, is a human being with flaws, by offering a different perspective. This could be something as simple as, "maybe they were having a bad day" or similar.

4. Offer up a silent prayer for this person.

St. Gertrude the Great said, "the more we pray for someone, the more that blessing rests on him, for no prayer made in faith remains unanswered, even if the manner of its answering is hidden from us." Praying for the person that we have been gossiping about reminds us of the other person's humanity and God's perspective on the situation. It reminds us that we are both immensely loved by God and that we are all human beings on our way to God. While our behavior falls short of that love, His mercy is there to heal us.

In Ancient Greece, Socrates had a great reputation of wisdom. One day, someone came to find the great philosopher and said to him:

Do you know what I just heard about your friend?

Socrates replied. Before you tell me, I would like to test you on the three sieves.

The three sieves?

Yes, continued Socrates. Before telling anything about the others, it's good to take the time to filter what you mean. I call it the test of the three sieves.

The first sieve is the TRUTH. Have you checked if what you're going to tell me is true?

No, I just heard it.

Very good! So, you don't know if it's true.

We continue with the second sieve, that of KINDNESS.

What you want to tell me about my friend, is it good?

Oh, no! On the contrary.

So, questioned Socrates, you want to tell me bad things about him and you're not even sure they're true?

Maybe you can still pass the test of the third sieve, that of UTILITY. Is it useful that I know what you're going to tell me about this friend?

Not really.

So, concluded Socrates, what you were going to tell me is neither true, nor good, nor useful. Why, then, did you want to tell me this?

Father,

Praise You for godly friends who hold us accountable. Thank You for illuminating the deceitful power of gossip, that we all entertain within earshot daily.

Forgive us for listening to it instead of walking away. We confess that often we don't speak up out of fear of rejection, and pray that you help us to have the courage to honor others with kind words when their character is being publicly slain.

Bless and heal those who have been mangled by gossip, and others enslaved by it's addictive habit. Heal our insecurities, and help us learn to turn to you for affirmation. Make us busy serving others in love to give You glory, instead of sitting in circles of babble and participating in chatter-filled phone calls. Empower us with Your Holy Spirit to head Your warnings, and steer our conversations with Your love.

The Family as a Domestic Church



The family is called the “domestic Church” that is the Church at home because the home is the first place where faith is professed and witnessed. The family is where we learn to love, care, forgive, and serve each other and to pray for each other to and to God. Family members help each other to live and grow in their faith.

Jesus, Mary, and Joseph are the original “domestic Church.” Parents are the first and most important teachers of faith to their children. They teach their children beliefs and values. Children also learn that they are loved and accepted which form the foundation of their image of themselves and their relationship with God and others.

Everything that a parent does or says becomes a model for good or bad: the way you speak, treat others, cope with stress or disagreement, show tolerance or forgiveness and even how you pray are all seen by your children.

Spending time together, establishing traditions and rituals that not only will enrich and strengthen family life, but also help to deepen and grow the faith of each member.

The following are several ways to pass on our faith:

(1) Scripture storytelling – Scripture told in a simple story that is memorable and enjoyable can help children understand the story better and give them a personal image of Jesus

(2) Mass – Think of ways to engage children in the Mass such as seating

near the sanctuary, explaining what is happening before and after the Mass, giving them a Mass book or telling Scripture stories from the day’s Readings.

(3) Family prayer time – Prayer time helps make God a part of our daily life. By connecting these events to God in prayer, we help children realize that God is always present in their lives and help them grow in their relationship to God.

(4) Moments that matter – Spend time together as a family, especially quiet time with God. Other moments to share are bedtime, mealtime or special family time, such as birthdays or anniversary of your child’s baptism and asking for and offering forgiveness. Give your children a blessing each morning before they leave for school / before bedtime.

(5) Saints as Role Models – Children look up to role models in sports, music, and other areas of interest. We should encourage them to learn about the saints who are role models of Christian living. Help them to select a saint and find ways for them to honor and imitate that saint.

(6) Our Home – Have religious art, crucifixes, faith based seasonal decorations, or even a prayer altar in the home as daily reminders of our faith.
