

In every age, Christ and his Church have been persecuted. Despite his message of love and compassion (or perhaps, because of it), Jesus was taunted by people of his time – by both religious authorities and ordinary people alike. Even his death on the Cross and his victorious Resurrection did not convince every person that he was the Son of God; the promised Messiah. Some of his own followers abandoned him. His Apostles faced ridicule and death. Countless early Christians were martyred for their faith.

In the First Reading today (Jeremiah 20:10-13), we encounter the prophet Jeremiah who, in his youth, had been called by the Lord to be a prophet during times of great political upheaval. Despite his initial opposition to God's call, Jeremiah accepted the vocation of prophet and endured imprisonment, scourging, threats from enemies and even former friends, and his own interior crises as he continued to question his suitability as a prophet of God. Despite such challenges, Jeremiah remained steadfast in the long run because he knew that the Lord was with him like a mighty warrior.

In our Second Reading (Romans 5:12-15), St. Paul reminds the Romans that Adam brought sin and death into the world "and thus death came to all men inasmuch as all sinned." He compares the effect of Adam's disobedience to God's will to Christ's total obedience to the father's will – and the effect that each had on the human race. Arguing "from lesser to greater," Paul states that if the disobedience (sin) of Adam was catastrophic to the human condition, how much more powerful is the obedience of Christ who brought reconciliation and healing to our relationship with the Father in Heaven?

In the Gospel (Matthew 10:26-33), Jesus has shared his message of love and mercy with his Apostles, but at the same time Jesus acknowledges that they would encounter a world that is hostile to his message. He assures them, however, that they will be protected by the same Father who cares for the sparrows. Like Paul, Jesus is using a persuasive argument "from lesser to greater" – if the Father looks out for something as seemingly insignificant as the sparrows, how much more will he look out for those followers of Jesus who believe in him?

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Saint of the Week

Venerable Pierre Toussaint was born into slavery in 1766 in what is now Haiti and raised as a Catholic. He and his sister, Rosalie, were brought to New York City by their enslavers, the Bérard family, originally of French descent, in 1787 as they fled unrest in Haiti.

Upon arrival in New York, Pierre was set up to apprentice to one of New York's leading hairdressers. Pierre learned quickly and started doing the hair of rich women all over New York. When Jean Bérard later died, Pierre was already in a position to support himself and Bérard's widow with the earnings he made from his hairdressing work. He voluntarily took on support of her until she remarried. Pierre was eventually able to purchase the freedom of his sister Rosalie and Pierre was freed by his enslavers in 1807.

Upon gaining his freedom, Pierre took on the surname of Toussaint, in honor of Toussaint Louverture, a Haitian revolutionary leader who helped transform the fledgling slave rebellion in Haiti into a successful revolutionary movement. Pierre Toussaint continued to work among the elite in New York as a hairdresser and, as his success grew, he began to use his wealth for several philanthropic causes.

In 1811, Toussaint purchased the freedom of Marie-Rose Juliette Noel — now we know her as Servant of God Marie-Rose Juliette Toussaint — and they were married. When Pierre's sister Rosalie died of tuberculosis, they adopted her only daughter, Euphemia, and raised her as their own. Alongside Euphemia, the Toussaints sheltered orphans and fostered numerous New York street children. They purchased a house on Franklin Street where they supported orphaned boys, getting them educations, helping them learn trades, and sometimes even setting them up with their first jobs.

The Toussaints became a charitable tour de force and well known among New Yorkers. They began an employment agency, a credit bureau, and a refuge for traveling priests and immigrants. During the cholera outbreak in New York City Pierre and Juliette would cross quarantine barricades and nurse sick people back to health in their own home. They raised money to build what is now Old St. Patrick's Cathedral on Mulberry Street and helped found the first black Catholic school in New York City — St. Vincent De Paul on Canal Street.

During all of his philanthropic work, Pierre continued to work as a hairdresser and support his family. He died two years after his wife Juliette's passing in 1853, at the age of 87 and was buried alongside her and Euphemia in the cemetery of St. Patrick's Old Cathedral in New York. When the investigation into his life for the cause of sainthood started, Pierre was exhumed and reinterred in the main cathedral. He was the very first layman to be honored by burial in the crypt below the main altar of St. Patrick's, an honor usually reserved for bishops of the Archdiocese of New York. He was declared Venerable by Pope John Paul II in 1996.
