As we approach the end of the liturgical year, the Church moves us toward reflecting on the end times and great questions of life and death. We might well ask ourselves what we would like to be remembered for once we have passed to eternal life. Our Scripture Readings today offer some good ideas in terms of what we should want as our legacy. The First Reading, from the Book of Proverbs (Proverbs 31: 10-13, 19-20, 30-31), tells of the ideal woman, gifted not just with physical attributes, but with gifts of ingenuity, hard work, generosity and love of others. She is presented as a model of what is possible when someone uses their God-given gifts and skills well. The point of the Reading lies not in the fact that she is gifted, but in what she chooses to do with those gifts and skills.

The Gospel (Matthew 25:14-30) takes up this theme in the parable of the three servants entrusted with their master's talents. In this case, a talent was a measure of weight commonly used to weigh precious metals like silver and gold. To be entrusted with five, or two, or even one talent meant that you were entrusted with something of great value. As we heard the Gospel proclaimed, we might have found ourselves on the side of the servant who simply buried the talent that had been entrusted to him and then returned it to the master. After all, in financial matters, caution is sometimes best. Yet, as with many of the parables of Jesus, the Lord ultimately turns the story upside down. In this parable, the servant who buried the talent ends up losing everything, including what had been entrusted to him. All is taken away and given to the other servants, for those who take risks in faith can be given greater responsibilities and ultimately be invited to share in the Master's joy.

Now is the time to use all that God has placed at our disposal. Now is the time to use our gifts, talents, our sense of hope and our commitment to charity for the sake of the Gospel. This is the sacred task entrusted to each Christian by virtue of Baptism – to invest ourselves totally in the work of the Kingdom of God and to bring others to Christ. Now that would be something to be remembered for!

Anointing of the Sick

Question:

If it isn't only for people who are dying, when should someone receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick?

Answer:

One of the unfortunate realities in the Church today is that so few people understand the meaning and value of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, largely because so many people still mistakenly think of this sacrament as "Last Rites" or "Extreme Unction."

In his life and ministry, Jesus healed the sick. In this sacrament, the Church continues the healing mission of Jesus and, in hope, prays that God will grant healing to the person who is suffering. But even if there is no physical healing, the sacrament offers spiritual healing through the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. And so, anyone who is living with serious illness (including emotional or psychological illness) and the elderly are encouraged to celebrate this sacrament when it is needed.

The ritual for Anointing of the Sick does also include special prayers and blessings for those who are facing death, including viaticum (communion given to the dying, trusting that the Lord Jesus will be their companion along the way, as they make their final journey). ©LPi

With the tradition of improving education, housing situations, and economic development, they continue to make a positive impact on communities nationwide. Please give to the CCHD Collection.

Carlos Manuel Cecilio Rodriguez Santiago was born on November 22, 1918, in Caguas, Puerto Rico and grew up in a devout Catholic family. He attended the local Catholic grade school and served as an altar boy.

Carlos graduated from eighth grade in 1932, at the top of his class, winning a medal for religion. However, his early success in academia was not to continue. During his high school years, he was diagnosed with ulcerative colitis, a gastrointestinal disorder. Unable to complete high school at Perpetual Help Academy in San Juan due to his condition, he moved back to Caguas and over several years worked part-time and studied, finally earning his high school diploma in May 1939.

In 1946, Carlos began to work towards a bachelor's degree at the University of Puerto Rico. Despite excelling academically, illness again prevented him from completing his degree. Undaunted and with a true love of learning, he continued his studies informally, even teaching himself to play the piano and the church organ.

His love of the sacred liturgy led him to begin publishing the magazines Liturgy and Christian Culture, filled with liturgical texts that he translated into Spanish and edited. He organized a Liturgy Circle in Caguas and later another in Río Piedras at the University to spread the power and beauty of the liturgy and the love of Christ to all. In 1948, he formed a choir called Te Deum Laudamus. He was an active member of the Brotherhood of Christian Doctrine, the Holy Name Society, and the Knights of Columbus. He also taught catechism to high school students. He lived simply, with humility and grace, giving all to the Kingdom. A mark of his humble lifestyle was that he only owned one pair of shoes.

At the time, before Vatican II, the Catholic Mass was only celebrated in Latin. Carlos worked to promote the idea that Mass should be celebrated in the language of the people participating. He translated the Latin Mass into Spanish so that the beauty of the prayers offered could be understood by those in his community. In addition to his love of the liturgy, he had a particular passion for restoring the Easter Vigil to the night of Holy Saturday. He was known to often say, "Vivimos para esa noche." ("We live for that night."). Carlos was to see this change officially implemented by Pope Pius XII in 1952.

Carlos Manuel's life was cut short when it was discovered that he had terminal cancer. He died in 1963 at the age of 44. Marked with the status Venerable in 1997, Pope John Paul II beatified him, declaring him Blessed, only 8 years later-the fastest beatification of a lay person to date. He's fondly remembered today as "Blessed Charlie" and is the first Puerto Rican and Caribbean-born layperson in history to be beatified by the Church.

Baptizing a child-

Parishioners who are planning to baptize a child or may be acting as godparents for another couple should call the parish office as soon as possible so you can schedule a time to complete the

pre-baptism instruction which is required by the Archdiocese of Santa Fe. The certificate you will receive after competing the class is valid for two years from the date of completion.



PLEASE Do Not Block **Driveways on Morningside Drive!**

Some of our neighbors along Morningside Drive have informed us that their driveways are sometimes being blocked by the cars of people attending Mass at Our Lady of Fatima. To park this way is not only discourteous to the homeowners, it is illegal.

Remember that the City of Albuquerque prohibits parking on a street within three feet of a public or private driveway, within 15 feet of a fire hydrant, and within 30 feet of the approach to a stop sign or traffic signal. Violators may be ticketed by law enforcement and/or towed. If you are parking along Morningside, Roma, or Montclaire, please respect our neighbors and do not block their driveways with your parked car. Thank you!

We are adding something new to our parish activities this Advent. Given the popularity of Stations of the Cross during Lent, we are adding an Advent devotion attributed to the Franciscans called the Stations of the Crib. It is modeled on the Stations of the Cross and is presented as 14 stations from the Annunciation to the early childhood of Jesus. They will be held in the church each Friday during Advent (note that there is no 4th Friday of Advent this year) starting at 6:30pm. The Stations should take about 30 minutes. Folding cards with the Stations have been ordered for distribution to those in attendance.

Following the Stations, there will be a 20 to 30 minute Advent reflection by a member of the parish clergy. Confession will also be available during the Stations and reflection. Then, after the Stations/reflection/confessions, there will be coffee, hot cocoa, and Christmas cookies served in the parish hall for those who wish to attend. The cookies will be provided by a different ministry each of the three evenings. This social time will begin about 7:30pm and last no later than 8:30pm including clean-up.

These three evenings are taking the place of an Advent parish mission as well as an Advent penance service. You are invited to participate in these Advent liturgies on December 8th (following the 5:30pm Mass for the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception – a Holy

Day of Obligation), December 15th, and December 22nd.
