

CST Theme 5: The Dignity of Work, Part 2: A Two-Sided Ethical Coin

In our last exciting episode, you may remember Benedict XVI's assertion that poverty is often the result of the unjust exploitation of workers (low wages, limited opportunities, etc.) And there was a compelling teaser about who might be defending the right of workers to organize.

Now, to set up and then make that point, here is Pope St. John Paul II: "The obligation to earn one's bread by the sweat of one's brow also presumes the right to do so. A society in which this right is systematically denied, in which economic policies do not allow workers to reach satisfactory levels of employment, cannot be justified from an ethical point of view, nor can that society attain social peace." (The Hundredth Year, #43)

John Paul II makes other important points: Work is necessary for a person to become more fully human; work is an obligation out of regard for others, for society and the whole human family; work participates in the building of a future for those yet to come. And finally, this: "All these rights, together with the need for the workers themselves to secure them, give rise to yet another right: the right of association, that is to form associations for the purpose of defending the vital interests of those employed in the various professions. These associations are called labor or trade unions. (St. John Paul II, "On Human Work," #20)

A personal anecdote: I grew up in Bay City, where the biggest employer was the Chevrolet Small Parts plant. Many of my friends' fathers, and later my friends themselves, worked there, or not far away in Saginaw at the much larger Grey Iron Foundry (engine blocks), Nodular iron Foundry (crankshafts), or Saginaw Steering Gear (steering parts for nearly every car made in the world.)

The UAW was very powerful in those days, and negotiated good wages and benefits for workers across the country. That's a good thing, according to this section of Catholic Social Doctrine. But there was another side. Many of my friends or their dads would revel in stories of how they used the union protections to avoid work, to do poor work, or to actively sabotage the products they were making as a way of "getting back" at a supervisor with whom they had a conflict. This could have been mostly fiction, but, given the volume and frequency of such accounts locally, I got the idea that it was based in fact.

You'll see the word "ethics" or "ethical" throughout this section of Catholic Social Doctrine. And if it is unethical to deprive workers of decent jobs and just wages, it is just as unethical for workers, having gotten some power in their work relationship, to deprive the employer of the benefits of wages paid. In other words — and this did not take very much thought or research — everyone is obligated to be fair and just in their work relationships with each other.

Ironically, during the pontificate of John Paul II, defender of the rights of workers, labor unions were systematically marginalized in our country. The wages of workers — those who actually produce the value that makes a corporation profitable, and who were named "essential" during the first months of the pandemic — have steadily lost value in terms of purchasing power, while the compensation of CEO's, and stock market values (shareholder wealth) have skyrocketed. Average CEO pay today is 399 times the average worker's wage. Of course the CEO is valuable, with responsibilities the average worker could neither imagine nor understand. But 399 is very big multiple, and could be difficult to justify.

This Theme of Catholic Social Teaching calls workers to responsibility, accountability, and honest work for honest pay. And with equal authority it calls employers to the same responsibilities and accountability, including the part about honest pay. Finally, this Theme demands that, together, we work to build and maintain an economy that provides for the dignity of work and workers, so that every human person can live with the dignity God intended.
