# **Contained, not Confined**

In my very belated graduate studies (2007-2009, Pastoral Theology, Loyola Marymount University, Los Angeles), I basically learned one thing: to look things up, and to use this skill to ensure that whatever you say or write has at least some level of credibility. So in the last few weeks in this space, I've been trying to suggest a broader way of thinking about the Eucharist than to simply gaze upon a consecrated host (which is perfectly fine, noble, and commendable way to pray).

The doctrine of Transubstantiation is central to an understanding of the Eucharist: bread and wine each become a different substance by the invocation of the Holy Spirit and words of Jesus: "Take and eat...this is my body... take and drink...this is the cup of my blood..."

To be sure I was staying inside the lines, I looked it up: the term used in several documents articulating this doctrine is "contained." The entire Christ, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity, are contained in even the smallest fragment of the Eucharistic species. ("Species" is the generic term for the bread and wine.)

Contained. What a strange word to use for the Body of the Risen Christ! Distance, locked doors, and even the tomb of death itself could not contain Him! But that's the word used in the time of the Council of Trent to expand on the concept of *Transubstantiation*.

But with reverence and respect for the teaching of the 16th century, what can we say about the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist today? Certainly the character and quality of the Eucharist has not changed in these 400 years. Nor has Christ Himself. Nor have the Gospels or the writings of St. Paul and the other early Christians. But, let's face it, we have information and knowledge about every aspect of human existence that was not available at that time.

St. Paul describes the Church as a body, with many parts and one spirit. He describes the Church as the Body of Christ, with Christ as the Head and the Baptized as the members of the Body. In this, Paul builds on Jesus' own image of Himself as vine and of us as its branches. Tomato, tomahto.

The Eucharist itself has a few parts: In the gospels of Mark, Matthew, and Luke, it's the bread and wine we celebrate each week. In the gospel of John, there's no mention of bread or wine. There is only the detailed, and very surprising to first-century readers, washing of


the feet of the disciples by their Master. And where Mark, Matthew, and Luke have "Do this in memory of Me," John's account has "What I have done for you, you must also do for one another."

But wait, there's more! Just before He is taken from the sight of the apostles at the Ascension, He leaves this pithy instruction: "Go, therefore, and teach all nations..." (This is sometimes referred to as The Great Commission. We even have a hymn about it, aptly entitled "The Great Commission.")

The Mass itself is named "Mass" after the Latin dismissal rite: "Ite, missa est," where "missa" means "a sending or commission."

The Mass (aka the Eucharist) thus includes all these aspects of what the Body of Christ experienced as Eucharist means: There is an assembly of the Body of Christ, there are bread and wine, and there is a sending in mission. The Word proclaimed impels us to embrace the Gospel and the justice through service to others that it teaches, and the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ is offered to us in the guise of simple food and drink.

Christ may be contained in the Eucharistic species, but Christ is not confined there. Touching the hem of Jesus' garment was enough to heal a lifelong affliction for a woman of faith. How much more is possible for us, who actually consume His flesh and blood?
