

The Mass 2025, Issue Twelve

At the beginning of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the Roman Missal says: "When all this has been done [in the liturgy of the Word], the Offertory Chant begins. Meanwhile, the ministers place the corporal, the purificator, the chalice, the pall, and the Missal on the altar. It is desirable that the faithful express their participation by making an offering, bringing forward bread and wine for the celebration of the Eucharist, and perhaps other gifts to relieve the needs of the Church and of the poor" (pp 21-22).

At the conclusion of the Universal Prayer, if the Deacon is present, he will approach the altar and begin to set it for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. In the absence of the Deacon, the Priest himself will set the altar. He will receive the Roman Missal to be placed either directly on the altar or on a book stand. At the same time, he will receive a veiled chalice with paten, pall, purificator, and corporal to be placed on the altar. Following this, the side chalices will be brought to the altar for the congregation, so they can receive from the Precious Blood at communion, and these are placed on the altar as well.

You may have noticed that we began using a chalice veil during Advent. The Adoremus website says this about the chalice veil:

...The General Instruction for the Roman Missal [GIRM 118] states, "It is a praiseworthy practice for the chalice to be covered with a veil, which may be either of the color of the day or white"... Like most liturgical vestments, the chalice veil is a mysterious garment. We may be tempted to dismiss it as a kind of decoration. But the chalice and the veil not only have a function during the celebration of Mass, [but] they also remind us of a dignity that is [also] often veiled. A veil is used to cover the chalice when it is carried to and from the altar during the celebration of Mass. It is usually the same color as the vestments. As a liturgical vestment, it was probably introduced in the Middle Ages, and may have had a functional origin, perhaps developed from a sacculum or small bag for carrying the sacred vessels. The veil still has a function. For example, the veil is [a]...sign to parishioners accustomed to reciting the entrance and Communion antiphons during weekday Masses, which vary according to the feast. The priest is often given the choice of celebrating a memorial in honor of a martyr. When he uses a red chalice veil, this indicates even before Mass begins that he has chosen that optional memorial.

The veiled chalice can also highlight both the relationship and the distinction between the two main parts of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Just as the Gospel book, which contains God's Word, is adorned and dignified with beautiful covers, so the vessels that will contain the Body and Blood of the Lord should be adorned and dignified with the veil. Also, since the chalice is the visible sign of the Eucharist, it seems appropriate that it should be veiled during the first part of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Word. The source of a deeper symbolic meaning of the chalice veil is found in the Scriptures. As prescribed in Exodus and described in Hebrews, a veil or curtain separated the Holy of Holies from the rest of the Temple... The chalice veil reminds us of the curtain setting apart the Holy of Holies, and prompts us to approach the altar aware of our unworthiness to enter into union with God. The removal of the chalice veil is one of the first liturgical actions at the Offertory in preparation for the reception of the gifts of bread and wine from the congregation. The removal of the veil following the Liturgy of the Word signifies that the sacred mysteries are about to be revealed...Despite the barrier of our unworthiness, the unveiling of the chalice invites us to enter into the celebration of the sacred mysteries. When the veil is removed, the splendor of the chalice is exposed. (https://adoremus.org/1997/02/the-veil-the-chalice-and-the-dignity-of-man/)

Once everything that is needed is placed on the altar, the Deacon, or the Priest himself, sets the altar in a way that is needed for the celebration of the Eucharist. The corporal (a large square or rectangular cloth that contains the elements to be consecrated) is placed in the center of the altar. The chalice veil is removed and placed at the top of the altar with its burse (the flat container that holds the corporal). The chalice is placed on the corporal with its paten (the flat plate that holds the Priest's larger host). The side chalices are placed on the corporal and the purificators to the side. A purificator is a rectangular cloth that accompanies the chalices to wipe them after one consumes and is used to clean up any drops of the body or blood after the consecration. They are also used to purify the sacred vessels with water at the end of Mass. The pall is also placed at the top of the altar and is used during Mass to prevent dust or flies from entering the chalice.

Once the altar is set, the book is positioned for the Priest to be able to celebrate and is set to the proper page, then the Priest moves to the front of the sanctuary to receive the gifts from the people of God. The Priest is accompanied by the servers and, if there are not enough servers, the Deacon, if present. The Priest will receive the gifts and pass them to the servers and/or Deacon. If the Deacon is present, he will mix wine with a drop of water into the main chalice (representing the blood and water that flowed from the side of Jesus on the cross). While this mixture is taking place, the Deacon, or the Priest himself, says a prayer in a low voice asking God to allow us to share in the divinity of Christ, as He chose to share in our humanity. Once this is completed, the Priest says prayers over the bread and wine to be consecrated. On Sundays, the prayers are in a low voice, but during the week, they can be out loud since there is no music. Next, we will finish the Offertory and then the Eucharistic prayer.
