





What's Happening

Extra Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

Thank you for the good service you offer to our community especially in the liturgy. I am asking that when distributing communion alongside the priest, you and the priest go down by the steps of the sanctuary together and return to the altar together. Whether the priest's line or your line is done early, you reverently wait as that is proper to good reverent liturgy. Together you bring the ciborium back on the altar and wait for the priest or deacon to place it in the tabernacle. After the priest has returned the remaining hosts in the tabernacle, you bow reverently in front of the altar and head back to your seat. Please consider this change. Everything else is good. Last but not least, it is proper that when we are assigned to serve, we check in at the Sacristy and sign in so that the sacristan and priest knows that you are around. Coming in time helps all to prepare and minister well at the mass. Please keep dressing up respectfully whenever you minister and if you have to be absent, notify Sacristan and help us seek your substitute. May God bless you as we serve him together.

<u>Lectors</u>

A note to the lectors:

Lectors are doing a good job and I thank you all. Just like the EMS, please check in at the sacristy so that we are at peace that you are around. Dressing professionally is required when you minister at the altar. This is out of respect for our Lord and His church. In terms of order, all are doing well. I only request that while reading, always practice ahead of time, come early and pray with the readings. When you read, assume that the listeners are hearing the Word of God for the first time and it is your duty to help them understand you. Enunciate properly for all to understand. Take your time, it is the Word of God. No rush. No acting, we read it reverently for what it is, Word of God. Before and after reading, we now before the altar and handle the lectionary with respect whether opening or closing the book so as to avoid a sense of rush or irreverence. Thank you for your ministry to God and to His Church. And please we need more lectors, we are here to train you and assist you. You will have my support so that you can serve the Lord diligently.

Altar Servers

A note to altar servers:

Only trained altar servers are allowed to serve at the altar. Please always arrive early, dressed properly and in black shoes. Put on your vestments, light the candles and wait for the priest in the sacristy. While at the altar, we don't make noise or chat. We remain respectful because we are in the most sacred part of the church. Any time we pass by the altar, we bow during mass. Before or after mass, we bow before the tabernacle. During time to share sign of peace, we don't wave to our family in the pews. We can choose to shake hands with each other or simply bow to each other saying "peace be with you". You will always receive communion first from the priest and then you can help hold the paten as he or another minister distributes communion. Try not to be in between the two ministers. While holding the paten, remember we are serving and so it is not time to wave and hi-five the people you know or children coming in line for communion. Remain respectful as you stand by the side of the ministers and you can shake the hands of your family after mass. Long time ago as an altar server, I was trained that an altar server is there at the sanctuary to serve and not to be heard or cause distraction. I ask parents to please assist us in training and preparing our altar servers for this important ministry in the Church. If any of your child is 8 years and above and could help us serve, please present them to us for training. We desperately need altar servers for 5pm mass and 11am mass. We need these our young people to be involved in the ministry. Fr. Chrispine

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Our national pastime isn't baseball. It's what the Bible calls "condemning the world." We generally enjoy pronouncing curses upon those whom we see as trouble, wrong, or evil. Don't believe me? Listen to almost any podcast, cable news network, or social media platform to hear it. It will be some version of: "We all agree that if they are eradicated, things will be great." Condemning is almost always clothed in virtue. It basks in its good intentions. That's why it is so attractive. Condemning seems like our best path to saving what is good.

What a shock, then, to hear Jesus announce: "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him" (Jn 3:17). He comes to save the world, as we all want, but he will accomplish it without an act of condemnation. How hard it is to accept this! Condemning feels godlike. I judge who and what must be lost to protect the good. But in the light of Jesus' endless mercy and love, this is the least godlike thing we can do.

Lenten challenge: This week, I invite you to give up the delicious experience of condemning whomever in the world you most would like to see gone. Perhaps write down their names. Secondly, I invite you to consider fasting from any media that feeds the tasty but deadly tendency to condemn.
