



My brothers and sisters in Christ,

Praised be Jesus Christ!

Each October the celebration of World Mission Sunday leads us to the heart of our Christian faith. At the heart of the Faith and of the Church is the Mission of Discipleship. In his World Mission Sunday message for this year, Pope Francis encourages us to have "hearts on fire" and "feet on the move":

So let us set out once more, illumined by our encounter with the risen Lord and prompted by his Spirit. Let us set out again with burning hearts, with our eyes open and our feet in motion. Let us set out to make other hearts burn with the word of God, to open the eyes of others to Jesus in the Eucharist, and to invite everyone to walk together on the path of peace and salvation that God, in Christ, has bestowed upon all humanity.

Pope Francis tells us that "Missionary conversion remains the principal goal that we must set for ourselves as individuals and as a community, because 'missionary outreach is *paradigmatic for all the Church's activity.*" He reminds us that "[t]oday more than ever, our human family, wounded by so many situations of injustice, so many divisions and wars is in need of the Good News of peace and salvation in Christ." We need to be the hearts and feet that bring salvation and material assistance to our brothers and sisters.

I ask you again to remember the needs of the people the Church serves in her worldwide missionary work and to offer our financial help through the Propagation of the Faith. Please be as generous as your means will allow and be assured of my personal gratitude for your generosity in the past. The missionary work of the Church depends on each one of us.

Parking Lot Replacement Project update

We have so far raised over half of our goal which is \$100,000. Thank you for supporting this needed improvement. We hope to begin the project after we reach our goal and possibly in Summer of 2026! A new parking lot will drastically improve safety for everyone especially our seniors. Last time any work was done on the parking lot was before 1970. Large cracks are visible and getting worse, the downgraded areas not only can lead to tripping and falling, they also collect pools of water that remain for some time looking like "small swimming pools"! 

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Every now and then readers of these reflections write letters in which they object to something. Years ago, this Gospel of Luke 18 prompted such an email. A man wrote to me: "I find it deeply offensive that you suggest we are still sinners once we are God's sons and daughters." His objection stirred in me a profound awareness of the paradox at the heart of our faith. Are we sinners or beloved children of God?

In this Gospel (Luke 18:9-14), a tax collector appears as one who has missed the mark. His sins have isolated him. His breast-beating is not an act of self-flagellation for pride's sake but a heartfelt admission of his failure and unworthiness. Remarkably, Jesus honors the candid humility of the parable's penitent. Why? Because we are always in need of mercy, always. But even more, perhaps because on the cross, Jesus will fully embrace a similar place of humiliation and rejection. He will enter into the most shameful, offensive place of the sinner so that we might "go home justified."

There is a sacred tension in admitting that we are sinners and yet have profound hope. We are beloved sons and daughters of God, growing precisely through our honest acceptance of failure. When we cry, "Have mercy on us," during Mass or when we repeat the "Jesus Prayer" in quiet moments, or in the confessional, we embrace our imperfections as fertile ground for divine grace. In doing so, we follow Christ's example — finding true exaltation in the humble acknowledgment of our human frailty.
