WEEKDAY MASS SCHEDULE

March 17, 2024 Fifth Sunday of Lent



"Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go." John 11:43–44

The death of Lazarus can be seen as a symbolic representation of the soul that has died from mortal sin. This is similar to the fact that leprosy, physical ailments and the like are also symbols of sin. For that reason, Jesus' initial reactions reveal how we should respond to serious sin in our lives. When Jesus faced the death of Lazarus, "he became perturbed and deeply troubled," "Jesus wept," He became "perturbed again" and He "cried out in a loud voice." Though Jesus was God, He freely chose to assume human nature and to experience human emotions and passions to teach us how we should react. In this case, He chose to become perturbed, deeply troubled, to weep and to cry out to show us how we should react to grave sin. Grave sin kills the spirit. As a result, we must be deeply affected if we commit or witness a grave sin.

One lesson we can take from this passage is that when you or a loved one falls into grave sin, it must not be ignored. Final impenitence is a sin by which a person fails to have appropriate remorse for sin and reacts to it in a dismissive and casual manner. This cannot be our reaction. Begin by considering the great value of taking sin seriously, reacting to it with passion and emotion, and crying out to God for forgiveness.

When Jesus cried out, commanding Lazarus to come out of the tomb, the details were added that Lazarus did come forth but was still bound "hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth." Saint Augustine teaches that, in part, this symbolizes the entire process of confession and the forgiveness of sins. First, no person is capable of confessing their sins by their own effort. It must be that they are moved by grace and the command of our Lord to come forth to show themselves in their bound state to God. Lazarus' obedience to Jesus' command symbolizes the Christian's response to God when called to repentance. When our Lord says, "Untie him and let him go," this symbolizes the unmerited effect of the Sacrament of Confession and the power it has to release a person not only from their sins but also from the ongoing effects of those sins.

Our Church teaches that sin has a double consequence. First, it keeps us from eternal salvation. This effect is remedied through Confession and forgiveness. However, there is a second effect called "temporal punishment" (see the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* #1471–1473). This "punishment" is not from God, but from sin. It means that when we sin, even in a less serious way, we become attached to that sin and that the ongoing temptation to return to it is strengthened. Thus, ongoing conversion also means we hear our Lord say, "Untie him and let him go." This is especially accomplished by ongoing conversion and growth in virtue. *mycatholiclife.com*

LENTEN SCHEDULE 2024

Fridays of Lent: 5:30 PM Adoration and Benediction; 6:00 PM

Stations of the Cross on March 22. Confessions...Wednesday, March 20, at 5:00-6:30 PM.

Fasting and Abstinence...fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not 59. Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to each one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

Abstinence from meat is to observed by all Catholics 14 years or older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and on all Fridays of Lent. The determination of certain days as obligatory days of penance should not be understood as limiting the occasions for Christian penance.

THE FIRST READING ISAIAH 50:4-7 All who see me scoff at me; they mocked with parted lips.

Jeremiah, Rutilio Grande, Romero, Dorothy Day: morning after morning, you opened their eyes.

Sunrise to sunset, open our eyes too! that we may see you in all things.

Let us also hear the cry of the poor. All trapped in war and violence; the sick; the children starving; and the cry of the planet. Let us speak and act on their behalf.

Open our hearts that we may love you, holding nothing back, nothing at all.

GUIDE TO CONFESSION

- Prepare Prayerfully compare your life to the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes and the example of Christ.
- Go to confession After the priest welcomes you, both of you make the Sign of the Cross. Begin your Confession by saying,

"Forgive me Father for I have sinned. It has been [length of time] since my last Confession. These are my sins..."

- Act of Penance The priest offers suitable advice and gives you an act of penance, which may include prayer, selfdenial or works of mercy.
- Prayer of the Penitent Pray a prayer, such as the Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and a desire not to sin again.
- Absolution The priest extends his hands over your head and prays the Prayer of Absolution, making the Sign of the Cross over your head during the final words. You respond, "Amen".
- Dismissal The priest sends you forth to go in peace. Continue to express your conversion through a life renewed according to the Gospel and the love of God.
