

A LETTER FROM FATHER JEFF

All Saints Day. How many saints are there? Perhaps you have wondered or even asked the question. In the Catholic Church, there are thousands of men and women we honor because they led holy lives or died for their faith. The latter we refer to as martyrs. As to the actual number of saints. no one

knows. Even if we were to count only the holy men and women the church officially recognizes, it is still nearly impossible to say. The reason is because the process of naming saints has changed down through the ages. In the early church the veneration of men and women as saints was by popular demand. It was not until the late 10th century that a pope formally canonized a saint. The first to do so was Pope John XV who in 993 declared Ulrich of Augsburg a saint. In 1243, Pope Gregory IX asserted that only a pope had the authority to declare someone a saint; and, in 1585, Pope Sixtus V established the Congregation of Causes of Saints. This established a uniform procedure for the process of naming a saint. Over the next 400 years only 285 people were canonized. However, in 1983, St. John Paul II revised this long-standing process. In fact, Pope John Paul II canonized 480 new saints before his death in 2005. Since his time, the naming of new saints has become more common. On May 12, 2013, 803 saints were named on one day. To be fair, it should be noted that 800 of them were from the town of Otranto in southern Italy. They were all killed in the year 1480 when the Ottoman Turks overran the town and put to death anyone who would not convert to Islam.

Sometimes the cult of certain saints has been suppressed. This is usually due to the lack of historical evidence of the miracles attributed to them or, in some cases, to whether they existed at all. Eighty popes have been canonized. Fifty two of the first 55 are recognized as saints. However, in the last 1,000 years only seven have been canonized and three of those (Popes Pius X, John XXIII, and John Paul II) lived in the 20th century. The Oxford Dictionary lists 1,700 names of saints and Butler's Lives of the Saints lists over 1,500; but there are somewhere between ten and twenty thousand who may actually hold the title and millions more who are anonymous among the citizens of heaven. It is all of these we honor. By their lives and generous response to Christ, they show us how to live by faith in the Gospel. They inspire us and intercede for us. May we be mindful of their stories and may our faith be deepened as we reflect on their trust in God. Please mark your calendar and join us this Wednesday as we celebrate the Feast of All Saints.


