

A LETTER FROM FATHER JEFF

Prepare for the Lord's coming. During the season of Advent, the scriptures remind us to be on the watch. The Lord is coming. But what is it we should watch for? Some say it is earthquakes, storms, wars and violence. We have seen all of that during the past year. Does that mean the apocalypse is

near? The theme of Advent is not a prediction of when the Lord will come; rather, it is to remind us to be vigilant as we wait. As to what, here are some things Jesus told his disciples to look for:

- Watch for truths you can trust. There are many things we do not know about our world. Science gives us many answers to these mysteries and yet, there are still many things even science does not know. A good economy can give us a sense of security; but the events of our world can quickly shake it up. Government can protect and serve us, but it can also be manipulated. To put our hopein these things is to ultimately be disappointed. What the church offers is a child born to a woman named Mary. He is the evidence God has not abandoned us. It also offers Eucharist. In this, we believe that God will feed us and give us life. These are signs of truth that will not fail us.
- Watch for God's love and mercy. In a world with so much negativism, many people prefer to destroy rather than build. They blame rather than forgive. Yet scripture tells us that such destruction is not God's way. After the flood, God promised Noah he would never do so again. Instead, he sent His son to heal and rebuild our world. Signs of healing and forgiveness tell us God is near.
- Watch for opportunities to show God's love to others. The humble person is always better at this than the proud. A humble person knows what failure is and offers a hand to those in need. This type of love comes from the heart and not from a book. During the season of Advent, we are reminded the Lord will return. We need to be ready. We need to watch...and what do we watch for? I would not waste my time speculating about wars, disasters, or pandemics. Instead, watch for truths you can trust. Watch for signs of healing and mercy. Watch for opportunities to love and grow closer to the Lord. If you do this you will be ready for the Lord when he comes.

The Sign of Peace

Question:

Why do Catholics give the sign of peace to one another at Mass?

Answer:

The sign of peace is a part of the Mass that takes place immediately after we offer the Lord's Prayer. Inspired by the Jesus' words to his first followers, we stand together in a spirit of communion to pray as Jesus taught us: "Our Father who art in heaven..." In this prayer, we call for the coming of God's kingdom in all its fullness and ask that God provides for our needs — "Give us, this day, our daily bread" — to forgive our sins and to bring us to the joy of heaven.

It is almost natural, then, that the rite of peace would follow. As the celebrant prays that Christ's peace will fill our hearts, our communities, the Church, and the whole world, we extend to those around us a sign of peace (usually a hug or a handshake) as a symbol of the communion that we experience now and will experience forever in the fullness of the reign of God.

We are also reminded of Jesus' teachings that if we are at prayer and remember that a brother or sister is holding something against us, then we are to go and seek reconciliation with them before we continue our prayer (see Matthew 5:23). And so, the sign of peace also reminds us of the need to truly be in communion — united in love and peace — with God and one another before we approach the altar to receive the Eucharist.

So, the next time you're at Mass and the time comes for the sign of peace, remember that this is a moment to celebrate the gift of Christ's peace that each of us has received from God and to pass that peace along to those around us. We need this moment to practice, because this is also the same peace of Christ that we are instructed to carry out into the world at the end of Mass when the priest or deacon says to us, "Go, in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life."
