

A LETTER FROM FATHER JEFF

The Little Black Book has been a popular Lenten devotion here at Blessed Sacrament. It offers people an excuse to take a short break each day during Lent for prayer. As I was reviewing the current booklet, a reflection on the "homeless Jesus" Fr. Jeff Grant caught my eye. This sculpture was the



work of the acclaimed artist, Timothy Schmalz. The original homeless Jesus was commissioned for a church in Davidson, North Carolina, where it was quickly noticed. In fact, shortly after it was installed, someone called the police thinking a homeless man was sleeping on a bench outside the church. In the ten years following, copies of this sculpture have been made for places all over the world including Detroit. Chicago, New York, Washington DC, Dublin, London, and Rome. It is definitely a social statement. When the dignity of a person is ignored or denied, so is the dignity of Christ.

Timothy Schmalz has a special connection to Blessed Sacrament Parish. In 2018, parishioner Vicki Schmidt, who headed the Co-workers of Mother Teresa in the United States, had the vision of a statue that would honor the saint, Mother Teresa She asked if the parish would be willing to provide a site for the statue. The funds would all be privately raised. She approached Schmalz and asked if he would cast a bronze statue of Mother Teresa embracing children. The artist liked the idea and soon presented sketches of the sculpture. However, it was delayed due to another project. Schmalz had been commissioned to create, a work entitled Angels among Us. This sculpture was to call to mind the plight of refugees. It was to be placed in the Vatican for six months and then moved to a permanent location at the U.N. headquarters in New York. However, this work was so well received that he was requested to make a duplicate for the U.N. This project bumped ours; delaying it for over a year. Finally, Mother Teresa with Children, was dedicated in September 2020. Like many of Schmalz's works, it too makes a social statement. Every human life is valuable. As Christ upheld our dignity, we, in turn, must do the same for others, especially those most vulnerable. This sculpture stands in a prayer garden adjacent to the church. It is there to remind, witness, and challenge us to respond charitably to the gift God has given us. Whether it is the hungry Jesus, the homeless Jesus, the child, Jesus, the forgotten Jesus, the suffering Jesus, each disciple must find a way to respond to Christ's call. Lent gives us time to reflect on our charity to others. What are we doing to make that happen?



Vestment Colors

Question:

What do the colors of the priest's and deacon's vestments mean?

Answer:

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the colors of the vestments evolved over the course of several centuries and there was wide variation both in the colors used, and in the feasts and seasons associated with particular colors. It was Pope Innocent III (d. 1216) who gave us the basic outline that was later prescribed by Pope Saint Pius V in 1570. The various colors remind us of the dominant themes of a particular season or celebration.

White: Used for the seasons of Christmas and Easter and in celebrations of the Lord, of Mary, the angels, and saints who were not martyrs. This color is also used in Masses for the dead, at baptisms, weddings and other festive celebrations.

Red: As the color of both blood and fire, red is used on Palm Sunday and Good Friday, as well as Pentecost and special celebrations of the Holy Spirit. Moreover, red is used on the feasts and memorials of the Apostles and those saints who died as martyrs.

Violet: The color for Advent and Lent. Violet may also be used in Masses for the dead and on All Souls Day (November 2).

Green: A color of life and hope, green is used throughout Ordinary Time.

Other colors: Rose may be used on the Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent, black may be used in Masses of the dead and on All Souls Day, gold or silver may be used on solemn occasions in place of white, red, or green.
