

A LETTER FROM FATHER JEFF

Holy Week 2024. This week our church recalls the last days of Jesus as he approaches the cross. On Thursday evening we begin the Easter Triduum; that is the time from Jesus' Last Supper, through his passion, death, and burial, to the resurrection. These three days are what we have been preparing for during Lent. They are the most important days in the church's calendar and we commemorate them with special liturgies.

Holy Thursday. The Triduum begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. (No other Mass is allowed on this day.) Scripture tells us that on the night before he died, Jesus ate the Passover with his disciples. Passover goes back to the time of Moses. However, when Jesus gathered his disciples, no longer would it just recall how God saved the Israelites from slavery in Egypt; now, it would celebrate how God saved all people from the slavery of sin and death. It was also at this meal that Jesus washed the feet of his disciples emphasizing the importance of serving others. Mass will begin at 7 pm, followed by adoration until 11 pm.

Good Friday. This is the only 24-hour period when Mass is not celebrated. The day is marked by fasting. The official service focuses on the passion of Jesus as told in the Gospel of John, and the veneration of the cross. Where we do not celebrate Mass, communion is offered to the faithful during this service. Our service begins at 3 pm. Confessions will be heard from 11:00 am to 1 pm in the Adoration Chapel.

Holy Saturday. This service concludes the Easter Triduum. It begins at dark (8pm) with the blessing of a new fire on the steps in front of the church. The Easter Candle, symbolizing the light of Christ, is lit and carried into the dark church. Scriptures are read, leading up to the Gospel of Jesus' resurrection. We then baptize and receive into the church those who have been preparing for initiation. This Easter Mass is often called the most powerful liturgy in the church. I strongly recommend parishioners to attend. (It does fulfill your Sunday obligation.)

On **Easter Sunday**, Masses will be held at the regular times of 7 am, 8:30 am, & 10:30 am.

A few reminders: There will be no 4:30 pm Mass on Saturday and no Saturday afternoon confessions. On Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, morning prayer will be held in the church at 8 am. The **Chrism Mass** (Blessing of the new oil) will be held at the Cathedral on Tuesday evening beginning at 6:30 pm.

Our 7th Grade Class will re-enact the **Stations of the Cross** on Wednesday at 5:30 pm. (please note the change in time from previous years, and also the time change for Good Friday Services.)

Every Christian should make the effort to celebrate these solemn days of the church. These three days are about Jesus' gift of salvation to you and me. It reminds us how he suffered death and overcame it in the glory of the resurrection. It is the greatest gift of love ever given. Please make plans to join us in our celebrations. You will be glad you did.

The Triduum

Question:

I haven't attended Triduum services before. What happens that's different from a normal Sunday Mass?

Answer:

The liturgies during Holy Week are unique and rich in symbolism. The Mass for Palm Sunday follows the pattern of the day 2,000 years ago when Jesus entered Jerusalem. It includes a Gospel reading outside the church building and the entrance of the priest into the sanctuary while the congregation waves palms.

The Holy Thursday Mass also follows the rhythm of the ancient Last Supper. The presider washes the feet of members of the congregation, like Jesus washed the feet of the disciples. After Mass, all remaining hosts are taken to an altar of repose, where adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

occurs late into the night. Parishioners can remain like the disciples in Gethsemane, asked to "watch and pray."

On Good Friday, we celebrate another special liturgical service. Following the Liturgy of the Word, there is a communal reverencing of the cross. The intercessions are solemn and include prayers for many different groups of people, reminding us that Jesus' passion is for the whole world. There is no Liturgy of the Eucharist. Hosts consecrated on Holy Thursday are distributed, after which the tabernacle is empty. The tabernacle remains empty through Holy Saturday — just as Jesus departed from this earthly world in death — and we wait in hope for Easter Sunday!
