



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Praying with the Beautiful Liturgies of Holy Week

Next week, we begin the holiest week of the Church's entire year, what we affectionately call "Holy Week" (it's not a super creative name, granted...but it gets the point across). I would like to sincerely, whole-heartedly, EMPHATICALLY invite you to participate in these liturgies. They are some of the most beautiful and moving liturgies that we have in the Church, and I can remember from a young age my parish priest inviting us as children to come and experience them for ourselves. I did, and my love for them has only grown over the years I've experienced them. Please come! And bring your children. There are so many beautiful lessons that these liturgies teach us through their symbolic actions.

I find that these liturgies are immensely more attractive if we make the symbolism a little more explicit—so at the risk of sounding obvious, here's what the Church celebrates this coming week: **Palm Sunday**—so named because we receive those ever-familiar palm branches—marks the beginning of Holy Week. It's the celebration of the Lord's entry into Jerusalem, so you'll notice that we hear that Gospel proclaimed *at the beginning* of the Mass, before the priest enters the Church. In that Gospel, we hear how the crowds joyously heralded Jesus' coming into the Holy City, waiving palm branches and crying out "Hosanna to the Son of David!" After the palm branches are blessed (and the same "Hosanna to the Son of David" is chanted), the priest (dressed in red to call to mind Christ's passion, which is beginning) then enters the Church as the people hold the palm branches, representing Christ as He journeys into His city. At the proper time for the Gospel, we then proclaim aloud the entirety of the Passion from one of the Gospels (this year, it's from Luke, since we're in Year C of the Lectionary cycle). This is the way we begin our reliving of the holy events of Christ's passion in Holy Week.

There is a special Mass that takes place during Holy Week, called the **Chrism Mass**. This Mass is special because it is a diocesan Mass, and at it, two significant things happen: all of the priests of the Diocese renew their priestly promises and the holy oils are blessed/consecrated by the Bishop (these are the oils that are used in every parish throughout the Diocese to baptize, confirm, and give anointing of the sick throughout the next year). If you haven't ever come to a Chrism Mass, all the faithful are welcome and encouraged to attend. It's a very moving day for us as priests. Our celebration takes place on Tuesday (April 15) at the Cathedral at 6:30 pm. [Traditionally, the Chrism Mass would take place on Holy Thursday, the day that the Priesthood was instituted, but many dioceses transfer it to a more convenient day to ensure the participation of their priests.] Then comes the **Paschal Triduum**, made up of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday—the three most sacred days of the Church year. Really, these are *one* liturgy which takes place over three days. We start with the Sign of the Cross on Holy Thursday, and end with the final blessing of the Easter Vigil.

On Holy Thursday, we commemorate the Institution of the Priesthood and the Eucharist, and so the Church remembers and relives the events that occurred the night before Jesus' arrest and Passion ensue: the Last Supper and Agony in the Garden. Mass is largely familiar, but there are two things of note that occur during the liturgy: the washing of the feet and the procession of the Eucharist. The washing of the feet, which took place in the upper room on the night of the Last Supper (cf. Jn 13), is recalled by inviting a number of the faithful (usually 12, symbolically representing the 12 Apostles) forward before the Liturgy of the Eucharist in order to recall the moment Christ commissions them for service—the moment traditionally seen as the institution of the priesthood. We then celebrate the Eucharist together, obviously symbolic of the Last Supper. Finally, the liturgy ends with a procession of the Eucharist (all of which is removed from the tabernacle) around the Church, as the faithful are invited to follow, singing Eucharistic hymns. This procession recalls the moments in which Jesus, with his band of disciples, crosses the Kidron Valley to the Garden of Gethsemane. The procession arrives at the "altar of repose," which is traditionally decorated like a garden. There, the faithful are invited to "keep watch and pray," as the disciples did while Jesus underwent His agony. After a time of adoration (we usually leave the Church unlocked until about 11 pm), the Church is locked and the Eucharist is no longer accessible for public veneration until Easter—representing the time when Jesus is arrested and removed from our midst as He endured His trials and Passion. Whether the people stay in adoration or leave, they do so in complete silence, in veneration of Christ's impending suffering and death.


