If you park for longer than 3 hours, the validation is void and regular rates apply. For the discount, parking ticket must be validated by a North End store, church, attraction, restaurant, business or organization.

Despite it being Easter, we may be feeling our life is unraveling, that everything has gone south. In this time of uncertainty about our job, the economy, and the future, we may be feeling a little lost. Maybe we are concerned about our children's education, or maybe we've had our dreams broken, our wedding, or graduation cancelled; everything seems up in the air right now. We may even feel hopeless, and be questioning what is going to happen next? We can give in to discouragement and this can lead to depression and even despair.

The image one of my friends gave me was like a boat being tossed on the ocean with no anchor, just floating adrift, without knowing where it is or will it will end up; subject to the whim of the next wave with nothing to hold on to.




The Word of God refers to Christ as an anchor in Hebrews 6:19 which states "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, both firm and secure." An anchor in the ancient world was a sign of stability which insured ships were rooted in something and empowered them to withstand any weather. While anchors don't seem useful when the waters are calm, they are a necessity during storms.

The truth is you cannot see an anchor because it is underneath the water! 

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Padre Pio

Francesco Forgione, was bom on May 25. 1887. He was the son of Giuseppa and Grazio Forgione, peasant farmers, who lived in the small Italian village of Pietrelcina. Francesco was very devout even as a child, and at an early age felt drawn to the



priesthood. As a young boy, he was able to see and communicate not only with his guardian angel but also with Jesus and the Virgin Mary. In his simplicity, he assumed everyone had the same experiences.

He became a Capuchin novice at the age of sixteen and received the habit in 1902. Francesco was ordained to the priesthood on August 10, 1910 after seven years of study and became known as Padre Pio.

On September 20, 1918, Padre Pio was kneeling in front of a large crucifix when he received the visible marks of the crucifixion, making him the first stigmatized priest in the history of Church. The painful wounds would remain with him for 50 years. The doctor who examined Padre Pio could not find any natural cause for the wounds. Upon his death in 1968, the wounds were no longer visible. In fact, there was no scaring and the skin was completely healed. He had predicted 50 years prior that upon his death the wounds would heal.

The wounds of the stigmata were not the only mystical phenomenon experienced by Padre Pio. The blood from the stigmata had an odor described by many as similar to that of perfume or flowers, and the gift of bilocation was attributed to him as well as healing, prophesy and discernment of spirits. When a friend once questioned him about these charisms, Padre Pio responded, "You know, they are a mystery to me, too." His day began at 2:30 in the morning when he would rise to begin his prayers and prepare for Mass. His regular workday lasted 19 hours divided between Mass and confessions. He was able to carry on with just a small amount of sleep and food. He rarely left the monastery and never took a day's vacation from his grueling schedule in 51 years. Padre Pio had the ability to read the hearts of the penitents who flocked to him for confession which he heard for ten or twelve hours per day. The confessional was his means of bringing both sinners and devout souls closer to God; he would know just the right word of counsel or encouragement that was needed. Even before his death, people spoke of the possibility of his canonization. He died on September 23, 1968 at the age of eighty-one. It is estimated that his funeral was attended by approximately 100,000 people.

On June 16, 2002, over 500,000 people gathered in Rome to witness Pope John Paul II proclaim Padre Pio, Saint Pio of Pietrelcina. His feast day is celebrated on Sept.23.
