Kenosis- The Greek word for self - emptying

As we approach the great feast of our Founder St. Francis, we can easily see how Sundays scriptures are enfleshed by his example. One of the most attractive parts of Francis' life which fascinates most people was his radical and even romantic embrace of poverty. At first glance, this total detachment from material things might make us only curious or even intrigued but it is not until we later revisit it and meditate on it that we can come to appreciate its depth and mystery. In our culture consumed by materialism, and enslaved by the need to buy the latest 'things', Francis' example of utter dependence on God, and the freedom, joy and peace that poverty brings is especially appealing. Francis once said: "Understand that Poverty is a choice way of salvation; the fruit it bears is manifold, and rare are they who know it well."

For St Francis, poverty was merely a means to an end, with the goal that we might imitate Him and thus "be rich through his poverty". In order to understand Francis' embrace of poverty, it is necessary to understand Francis' God first. Francis discovered, and followed a God who gives everything; A God who gives all. For Francis, God is the Great Giver, who, as St Paul states in today's second reading to the Philippians, "though He was in the form of God, did not deem equality with God something to be grasped at. Rather, He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave coming in human likeness and found human in appearance, He humbled Himself becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." Francis was in fact blown away by our God's overwhelming generosity of self, His complete and prodigal self -giving and total self-abandonment.

Francis was set aflame by the experience of the unimaginable love of God, revealed first in the Incarnation when God emptied Himself and the Word become flesh in Bethlehem in the form of a vulnerable, naked baby. He then contemplated that same brilliance in the ultimate sacrificial gesture of the Last Supper and of every Eucharist: Jesus handing over his Body and Blood--his complete self--to those he loved. In this way we can see that Jesus' poverty is a consequence of the way He loves us. TOTAL SELF-GIVING.

Jesus would later invite Francis to imitate Him in His complete self immolation on Mount La Verna where Francis received the stigmata and became a living icon of the God who holds nothing back out of love for us. Francis, in feeling the deepest experience of this reality, decided that the only true response to this great and total love was to love HIM with EVERYTHING, to give up everything for love of the God who gave up everything for him.



Since Jesus was willing to give up everything - (heaven, riches, comfort, his very life) to save us, Francis reasoned that he too, would strip himself and follow the naked Christ, naked. "Nudum nudus sequitur."

This experience of God's total self-emptying thus explains Francis' love for poverty. If the God-man could be poor--not clutching anything of his own, not even the divine nature, but accepting the poverty and nakedness of a crude manger at Bethlehem and the cross at Calvary--then Francis too could respond with self-giving and hold nothing back in his love of Christ.

For Franciscans, then, the self-sacrificing love of Jesus, as revealed in the cross, is the shining summit of God's revelation. The richest revelation of God's word and goodness peaks in Jesus, especially in his glorious self-emptying death and resurrection. "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). This is why the cross has been central for Franciscans and, of course, for Christianity itself.


Transitus of St. Francis



St. Leonard, coming out of this tradition, refined the devotion of the Cross by popularizing the Stations of the Cross and preached that we can be transformed in and through the Cross.

Saintly Franciscan Parents

We all know and love St Therese of Lisieux, also known as "The Little Flower." She was a young Carmelite nun in Northern France. You could say her spirituality had noticeable characteristics of Franciscanism in its "Little Way." St. Francis called his followers "lesser Brothers" or as we know them today, the Friars Minor. Being little was Francis' way. In 2015, Pope Francis canonized Louis and Azelie-Marie or "Zelie" Martin, the parents of St. Therese. Saints Louis and Zelie were Secular Franciscans. The first canonized married couple.



The Martins' spiritual director had to talk them into consummating their marriage after ten months of living celibate together as husband and wife. They went on to have 9 children. Five daughters would make it into adulthood, all of whom became religious sisters.

St. Zelie died of breast cancer when Therese was four years old. St. Louis held to a routine prayer life and found inspiration and God in nature. It was no question that the Little Flower was her father's favorite, as he called her, "Little Queen". Her love of nature and flowers in particular came from her father as well as the hidden life of prayer. She devoted her short life to prayer until her death at the age of twenty-four.

Is it all in the name? Louis and Zelie named their youngest Marie Françoise-Thérèse Martin. Francis is in her name. It was later that she would take the name Thérèse of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face. It was not unusual that a girl of her time in France would look up to Saint Joan of Arc, another saint in the Franciscan family. She even wrote and performed a play about the French heroine.

Saints Louis and Zelie's feast day is July 12th. Saint Thérèse had her feast day on October 3rd, the day Saint Francis died. It was then appropriately moved to October 1st, since sister death took her on September 30th 1897.




FINANCIAL REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023 (JULY 1, 2022, THROUGH JUNE 30, 2023)

Thank you...A heartfelt thank you to the entire St. Leonard Parish family for your generosity and commitment which continues to enable us to minister to the needs of the parish. Much of the last fiscal has been centered around celebrating St. Leonard's 150th anniversary, which has been a tremendous effort with tremendous results. The 150th anniversary is a special milestone for us to Honor the Past and Build the Future. As a parish St. Leonard has been celebrating with monthly events that deepened our parish community...with many more to come throughout this year. In addition to building community and celebrating our faith, the 150th celebration fundraising continues to be a tremendous success, with over \$500K raised thus far. Your generosity enables St. Leonard to Build the Future and keep our parish buildings viable - whether repairs to Sacred Heart façade; a new HVAC system at St. Leonard or repairing the rectory roof. Again, thank you!

In addition to the 150th celebration, our parish continues to grow its ministries through the St. Jospeh Artisans, Encounter Ministry who minister to the homeless in our community, and the Italian school whose classes continue the Italian heritage.



Three areas contributed to the increases the most – Fundraising expenses, such as the Gala increased to support the fundraising drive; Maintenance continued to increase over the years to maintain our buildings; Clergy stipends, as St. Leonard expanded the number of masses it offers, the number of visiting priests to support those masses also increased.
