Part Two: Waking Up the Woke *This is a two-part series on Wokeness

I remember reading a critique of liberation theology which both at the same time affirmed the endeavor but questioned the method, saying it was of course good to work towards better political solutions, improving the poverty and plight of the marginalized and opposing unjust governments but cautioned that the key was in how it was to be done. The critique was revealing in pointing out that we must not be content to merely treat the symptom without addressing the root cause of the problem, and perhaps most importantly, we must do so in a spirit of love.

The first insight therefore of the critique which is analogous to the critique of wokeness was recognizing the limitations inherent in liberation theology: that its ultimate goal would never be fully realized through mere legislation. One cannot achieve true liberation or permanently right all wrongs of social injustice without first identifying and addressing the root cause of the problem which is sin. The solution, therefore, resides not in merely changing any external unjust law (or shaming a person) but rather in interiorly changing hearts. The reality is that our human nature is a fallen nature and so our hearts are subject to the concupiscence inherited from our original sin.

This means that it is not a white problem, or a male problem but is a much deeper problem; it is in the end the result of the problem of original sin. The truth is we are all inclined away from God and in need of redemption from the slavery of sin. Ultimately therefore it is only through grace that our hearts can be converted and freed. This basic truth recognizes our universal need of redemption, and reveals God's love as the only means which can fully reform individual hearts and society at large. The way forward therefore must include God's grace, which is love, for love alone can transform hearts.

Awakening the Spirit of Love and Mercy

Before taking up our righteous effort to eradicate systemic evil, and exposing all forms of oppression, racism and prejudice, we must wake up the spirit of love which may be dormant. Jesus calls us to love the sinner but hate the sin; to never fail to meter our passion for justice with mercy, which triumphs over justice. This is precisely what can be omitted in a society bent on vengeance and entrenched in the frenzy of a cancel culture. With no room for redemption, mercy, forgiveness or reconciliation, a sense of revenge, retribution and vigilance prevails.

Without a spirit of love, the rigid letter of the law becomes a weapon used to punish and beat people over the head with. A recent article written by Eddie Ejjbair has suggested that at the very heart of wokeness is a bitter spirit of reckoning called resentment. He contends this is what explains the disproportionate anger that is




sometimes characteristic of cancel culture. Our Lord himself showed us how being angry at injustice is warranted and not always sinful when he turned the tables of the money changers over at the temple. This righteous anger was clearly motivated out of love for the gentiles. Note that Jesus sought to destroy the system but not the person. Sinful anger however seeks to destroy and cancel the person rather than eradicating the problem.

Virtue signaling functions in much the same way. The focus is on pointing to and blaming others with a judgmental outrage which accuses others of sin, saying, "that's the bad guy!" In truth this is projection which by default presents the accuser as the "good guy." There is nothing Christian nor anything from the Holy Spirit about publicly standing up and shouting loudly against another person in order to shame or blame them by calling out their sins. Pointing disapprovingly at others in the name of certain beliefs, values, or virtues is in reality not only a futile, judgmental and self-righteous attempt to define yourself against others but an example of finding the splinter in our neighbor's eye while missing the plank in ours. He who is without sin should cast the first stone.

In some ways wokeness can reflect humanities' very first temptation itself. In her new book, Awake, Not Woke: A Christian Response to the Cult of Progressive Ideology, Noelle Mering argues that "wokeness" is, in fact, nothing other than the ageold temptation to take the place of God. She believes the cancel cultures propensity to make their own meaning and morality is just another attempt to be our own gods. The passage of Judges 21:25, speaks of the dangers of a people who take the basis of morality, right and wrong, upon themselves.

In conclusion we can say that authentic Christian love calls us to work towards justice and confront injustices. The way we do so however distinguishes the Christian as we are called to follow the example of Christ who always encourages us to enter into a constructive dialogue which does not seek to create a distance between ourselves and others but rather has as its goal, loving communion. We are not here to judge or condemn others but rather to bring our brothers and sisters back into a loving communion with God and others

which we do best by following the prescripts of the Bible which states how in Galatians 6:1, "If we see a brother or sister who is caught in a sin, we should restore him or her 'gently." Restoration starts with loving confrontation. We need to be willing to go to this person and show him his fault. Mathew 18:15-17 outlines the process thus:

"If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church. And if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector.

PLENARY INDULGENCE CELEBRATING THE NATIVITY SCENE 800 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

This year, Catholics will be able to receive a plenary indulgence from Dec. 8 the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to Feb. 2, 2024, the Feast of the Presentation in the Temple of Our Lord Jesus Christ, by praying before a nativity scene in a Franciscan church.

As part of the celebration of this Franciscan Centenary, the Conference of the Franciscan Family asked Pope Francis for the approval of this plenary indulgence.

The conference wrote: "In order to promote the spiritual renewal of the faithful and increase the life of grace, we ask that the faithful receive a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions from 8 December 2023, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to 2 February 2024, Feast of the Presentation in the Temple of our Lord Jesus Christ, by visiting the churches run by Franciscan families throughout the world and stopping in prayer in front of the nativity scenes set up there."

A plenary indulgence is a grace granted by the Catholic
Church that removes the temporal punishment due to sin.
When one receives an indulgence, it always washes away all temporal punishment, but it must be accompanied by a detachment from sin.



In order to receive a plenary indulgence, one must have a detachment from sin, including venial; receive the Holy Eucharist and the sacrament of confession within 20 days of praying in front of a nativity scene. In addition, those attempting to receive the indulgence must pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.

Those who are sick or unable to participate physically can obtain the indulgence by offering their suffering up to the Lord or by "carrying out practices of piety.


