## First Sunday of Lent, Year B



Last Wednesday we began the season of Lent, a favorable or opportune time, inspired by Scriptural references that speak of returning to God as something completely desirable and positive. Lent is the time to review our lives, reflect upon our thoughts, words and deeds, and concentrate our efforts more fully on the things of God. Lent is a reminder of what life is all about: not health, wealth and beauty, but liberation from slavery to sin, which means passing through trials to arrive on "terra firma," the heavenly Jerusalem, where we hope to enjoy God's company forever.

I like to call this first Sunday of Lent "Christ in the Desert Sunday," as the name of our Monastery is "Christ in the Desert." Every year on this first Sunday of Lent we hear a Gospel account of Jesus' forty-day desert experience, when Christ was tempted by the devil, but ultimately is victorious over the forces of evil that assailed him. This year we hear the account by the evangelist Saint Mark describing Christ's forty days in the desert of Judea. If you've been there, you know it's very barren, more so than our alpine desert in New Mexico. It's very hot there too, even outside of summer, and can be very cold at night year round.

Christ must have felt those hardships in his intentional desert retreat, but was not to be swayed by them or by the devil's desire to see Christ follow a path other than God's. As the redeemer of the human race, Christ in the desert was not defeated, but strengthened to go forth with his mission to open the path of redemption for all peoples of every time and place.

Forty is a significant number throughout the Sacred Scriptures of our tradition. For example, the flood in Noah's time lasted forty days. For forty years the Hebrews wandered in the desert before entering the Promised Land. Jonah the prophet preached for forty days to the Ninevites. At different times both Moses and Elijah spent forty days fasting and praying on the mountain.

In a great tradition, Jesus also fasted and prayed in the desert for forty days. Our Church to this day maintains the timeline of forty days of reflection, fasting, prayer and almsgiving, in preparation to celebrating the culmination of Lent, Holy Week at the end of the forty days, and then powerfully recounting and reliving the events of our redemption in Jesus Christ, called the Sacred Triduum, leading up to Easter Sunday.

In the desert experience he endured, Jesus teaches us that trials are not to defeat us, but to strengthen us. We all face trials, but what we do with them makes all the difference; we can become bitter or transfigured by our trials. As the desert and the number forty are important themes in our Catholic experience, those who intentionally live in deserted places, dedicating themselves to the Lord are privileged to be able to walk the Lenten path with the support of brothers and sisters. No matter where we live, the Church strengthens us in our efforts to grow in inner freedom, love, peace and holiness, dying to sin in order to belong more completely to God and partake of risen life in Jesus Christ.

To enter the desert is to recognize our fragility and fears. Only with the Holy Spirit can we be comforted and sustained in our efforts. As the Holy Spirit protected Christ in the desert, so we too count on the same kind of help. At the moment of his baptism, just prior to his sojourn in the desert, the Holy Spirit appeared in the form of a dove to accompany Christ in his work as Messiah.

In moments of our desert journey we too are assured of the presence of the same Holy Spirit and of final victory over death. This is promised us by the baptism we have received. Only our own choice of rejection of God's help, by our free will, can forfeit the promise made to us by God.

Whatever crisis we endure can be a source of victory. From the ashes, new life buds forth. We hold this to be true by our baptismal covenant with the living God. Saint Peter speaks of this in the second reading today when he states emphatically, "You are now saved by a baptismal bath."

The word of God we hear at every Eucharist needs to be for us a continual reminder of God's loving initiative toward us as his people and as individuals. May this help us to know more and more the immense love of God for us and our call to return that love by a life of simple regard for God and neighbor.

May this Lenten journey 2021, which we have just begun, be a time of grace and growth. May Christ, teacher in the desert, be our guide throughout these days.

## WHAT IS LENT?

Lent is a preparation for the new life offered to us in Easter. In these 40 days, we prepare our hearts, purifying them through penance, acts of sacrifice, almsgiving, and prayer so that we may fully share in the joys of Easter.

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

1. During Lent we are obligated to fast and abstain from meat:

## ABSTINENCE:

Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to complete abstinence from meat on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent.

## FASTING:

Catholics over 18, and up to the beginning of their sixtieth year, are bound to fast Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these days, only one full meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed.

2. This is a graced time to fulfill our yearly obligation to cleanse our heart through the sacrament of reconciliation and receive the Eucharist during the Easter season.

## Praise God for Second Chances, and Third . . . and . . .

The season of repentance is upon us, and once again we celebrate the Lord's merciful invitation to turn it around and bring his love, peace, and justice into this suffering world. "As I live, says the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that they turn from their ways and live," (Ezekiel 33:11). "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).



The Secular Franciscans – an order of laypeople founded by St Francis of Assisi, an order for men and women, young and old, married and unmarried, an order for everyone – were originally called the "Brothers and Sisters of Penance."

Our name may have changed, but penance and conversion remain at the heart of who we are and what we do.

Our Rule calls us to daily conversion, to "conform [our] thoughts and deeds to those of Christ," (Article 7). The Rule also counsels us: "As the Father sees in every person the features of his Son, . . . so the Secular Franciscans with a gentle and courteous spirit accept all people as a gift of the Lord and an image of Christ," (Article 13). Can you imagine a penance that would please the Lord more than asking forgiveness of someone you may have hurt, forgiving someone you have been holding a grudge against, or just loving someone — anyone — a little more?

The next meeting of the Secular Franciscans will be on Tuesday, February 20, at 7pm in the Church Hall. We will be discussing Chapter 2 of Richard Rohr's "Eager To Love: The Alternative Way of Francis of Assisi." Copies are available in the church bookstore, on Amazon, and from many other vendors. After lunch, well visit the Cathedral of Imperia Porto Maurizio where we will celebrate Mass and pray over the body of St. Leonard. Overnight in Porto Maurizio

**Day 4 | October 11th, 2024 | Tuscany & Florence**After breakfast well depart for Assisi, in route we stop in Tuscany for lunch, a beautiful place to admire the countryside, relax and enjoy some local wine tasting. Next, we'll visit the Convento Dell'Incontro, a Franciscan Monastery atop the hills just outside of Florence. Convento Dell'Incontro was founded by St. Leonard in 1710 and where he would retire to from time to time after his missions. Here we will celebrate Mass and pray for the intersession of St. Leonard. Finally, well arrive in Assisi for Dinner. Overnight in Assisi

## Day 5 | October 12th, 2024 | Assisi

Following breakfast, we will proceed to the basilica of St. Francis where we will celebrate Mass, pray over his tomb. Next, we will visit Chiesa Nuova, built in 1615 on the site of the birthplace of St. Francis. Then onto the Church of St. Clare to see the Saint's body and pray for her intercession. St. Clare was the foundress of the Order of Poor Clare's. We'll visit St. Mary Major, the Shrine of the Renunciation, where Blessed Carlo's body is interred. Finally, we visit San Damiano the site of St. Francis's conversion, where he obeyed the orders given to him by the Crucifix, which told him "Go forth Francis, and rebuild my crumbling house". Overnight in Assisi

**Day 6 | October 13th, 2024 | Greccio** After breakfast we visit St. Mary of the Angels where St. Francis spent most of his life. Here we'll visit the Chapel Portiuncola and celebrate Mass near the rose bush and cave where St. Francis retired for prayer. Next, we'll depart Assisi and begin our journey to Rome, in route we will make a stop in Rivotorto where St. Francis of Assisi

started his life of austerity. We then continue onto the medieval town of Greccio. Greccio itself, set on a beautiful mountaintop, is famous for its cool summer climate and its mineral springs. However, it is even more renowned for its connections with St. Francis of Assisi and as the birthplace of the Christmas crèche. On Christmas Night 1223, St. Francis led shepherds to the top of a nearby hill where they gathered together in a stable sheltering an ox and a donkey. According to legend, the Baby Jesus miraculously appeared in the manger. On this spot the Franciscan convent of Greccio was built, and the Chapel of The Crib was erected in 1228, the year St. Francis was canonized. Finally, we board our bus and continue to Rome for dinner. Overnight in Rome

### Day 7 | October 14th, 2024 | Rome Basilicas

After breakfast, we will visit the church of San Bonaventura al Palatino, here we will have to opportunity to pray before the relics of St. Leonard and celebrate Mass. San Bonaventura al Palatino is where St. Leonard studied and later taught as a professor. Next, before our entrance at Colosseum, we will visit the Church of St. Peter in Chains and then we will embark on a historic tour of Ancient Rome starting with a visit to the Colosseum, a grand amphitheater of the ancient world, St. Leonard set up the Stations of the Cross in over 500 different places, including the Colosseum. Passing by the Roman Forum, we will witness the ruins of ancient government buildings. After the Roman Forum we'll visit Collegio Romano, a school established by St. Ignatius of Loyola in 1551, just 11 years after he founded the Society of Jesus, where St. Leonard studied with the Jesuits before receiving his habit. Overnight in Rome

## Day 8 | October 15th, 2024 | St. Leonard & Ancient Rome

Today, we will visit the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls, the Basilica of St. Mary Major, as well as the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran. It is here (the Basilica of St. John Lateran) that St. Francis persuaded Pope Innocent III to give permission to begin the Franciscan Order. We will celebrate mass at one of the basilicas. At the end of the visit, transfer back to your hotel in Rome and rest of the day at leisure. Overnight in Rome

Day 9 | October 16th, 2024 | Vatican City & Papal Audience Following breakfast, we have an early departure for St. Peter's Square to participate in the Papal Audience (subject to the Pope's schedule). After lunch, we have a guided tour of the Vatican Museum, the Sistine Chapel, and St. Peter's Basilica where we will celebrate mass in one of the Chapels. Overnight in Rome

### Day 10 | October 17th, 2024 | Return home

With a renewed sense of pilgrimage, and an invigorated love of our Catholic faith, we transfer to the Rome Fiumicino Airport and board our return flight home.



DR. GILBERT R. LAVOIE is a medical doctor, a specialist in internal medicine, occupational medicine, and public health. He has also pursued a forensic and scriptural study of the Shroud of Turin for more than 40 years. He has published books, a video. and articles related to scriptural and medical forensic studies of the blood marks and image of the man of the shroud. His most recent book, The Shroud of Jesus and the Sign John Ingeniously Concealed was published in June 2023 by Sophia Institute Press. Dr. Lavoie, along with his colleague, Tom D'Muhala, digitized and organized some of the finest photographs of the Shroud of Turin done by Vernon Miller, who was the official scientific photographer of the 1978 Shroud of Turin Research Project. The Vernon Miller photo collection is now available worldwide on the internet at www.shroudphotos.com.

In the past several years Dr. Lavoie worked with the internationally known sculptor, Pablo Eduardo. Eduardo recently completed a bronze sculpture which is a three-dimensional replica of the image of the man of the Shroud of Turin. This was done in exquisite detail, paying much attention to the anatomy of the figure. This sculpture named The Sign, reveals a whole new way of understanding the shroud image.
