"I Can't Get No Satisfaction" A Woman at the Well and Babette's Feast



What is it I most thirst for? What is my greatest hunger, for what do I most long for?

I think this is the question the word challenges us to ask ourselves this week.

On Monday, February 26th, our parish family gathered, each with a dish of food and watched the movie Babette's feast, the most Eucharistic movie I have ever seen. This movie serves as a perfect appetizer to feasting on the story of Jesus and the woman at the well, because it depicts how we all have deeper thirsts and hungers than those desires of our bodies.

The movie opens with Lorens, a young man, who like us all, is searching to satisfy his deepest longing for happiness and fulfilment. After a failed love encounter, he convinces himself he will find fulfilment by dedicating himself to the military and making a great name for himself, stating: "I will think of nothing but my career and someday I will cut a brilliant figure in the great, wide world." It is only in the twilight of his life, however, after having achieved great success and honor, that he discovers the shallowness and vanity of all that he chased after and so experiences a deep regret and dissatisfaction of his life choice. Looking at himself in a mirror, he says "Vanity. Vanity. All is vanity." He asks his wife "Can the sum of a row of victories over many years be defeat?" He tragically realizes his pursuit of worldly honor and fame has not quenched his deepest desire nor satisfied the deepest longing of his heart.

Similarly in the Gospel this week, we encounter a thirsty woman at the well who is clearly thirsty for something more than water. She has had six lovers, who have all failed to satisfy her. Jesus, the living water, however, meets her dry soul at a well that cannot satisfy the deepest thirst she has. This is because both Lorens, the woman at the well and each of us have a thirst and hunger of the soul which God's love alone can satisfy and which give us true lasting happiness and fulfilment.

Enter Babette. She is a French woman who decides to spend all of the money she won at a lottery on cooking a huge French Feast. She hopes this banquet will bring happiness to the sisters who employ her and help to reconcile their fractured prayer community. The banquet is absolutely exquisite and during the dinner, General Loren is so impressed that he states he has only tasted something similar in France. He shares a story about how in France he heard of a woman, (who we later realize is Babette) who was a head chef, and "had the ability to transform a dinner into a kind of love affair, a love affair that made no distinction between bodily appetite and spiritual appetite."

This deftly describes the central metaphor of the whole movie and speaks of satisfying the deep spiritual thirst and hunger we all have for love.

This reflects the truth the catechism begins with which states that our hearts were made with a deep hunger for God, a hunger that God alone can satisfy. Everybody therefore has a hungry heart which longs for the infinite. Jesus, born in a feeding trough, desires to satisfy this hunger in the Eucharist. Babette serves as a Christ figure who not only unselfishly gives up everything she has, but in giving of her very self, she nourishes her friends. The feast she provides therefore is a symbol of the self-sacrificial love Christ offers us in the Eucharist. The Eucharist then is the sacrament of satisfaction which gives us a foretaste of heaven, the true hope of nourishing our deepest hungering ache.

Through the Eucharist, Jesus not only fulfills and reconciles us, but also unites us together. We are made to be in communion with God as Augustine famously wrote: "our hearts are restless until they rest in God." St John Paul II puts it this way:

"God has placed in human hearts a 'hunger' for his word, a hunger which will be satisfied only by full union with him. Eucharistic communion was given so that we might be 'sated' with God here on earth, in expectation of our complete fulfillment in heaven."

More specifically, both the movie, and the story in the gospel show that our heart aches for the infinite. Nothing finite can satisfy us. Fillipa, one of the sisters that had hired Babette reflects on God and his infinite love saying:

"Oh God,Be our infinite light in the valley of night, the sand in our hourglass will soon run out, the day is conquered by the night, the glories of the world are ending, so brief their day, So swift their flight, God, may your brightness never dim, nor mercy's door be closed to man." So many of us take our hunger to the wrong table. We attempt to satisfy our ache for the infinite with that which is finite and so can never fully satisfy. The reality is that there is no ultimate satisfaction of our desires on earth. All created things merely



give us a glimpse of true heavenly satisfaction, where all our desires will be fulfilled.

Although we often stray and take the wrong path and try to satisfy this heavenly longing with earthly things like sex, power, money, prestige, and honor, all is not lost as God is merciful. General Loren's climatic speech captures the point when he says:

"There comes a time when our eyes are opened and we come to realize that mercy is infinite. We need only await it with confidence and receive it with gratitude. Mercy imposes no conditions. And lo! Everything we have chosen has been granted to us. And everything we rejected has also been granted. Yes, we even get back what we rejected. For mercy and truth have met together, and righteousness and bliss shall kiss one another."

As St. John Paul II states, "We can all get lost at times, lost within ourselves or lost in the world about us. Allow Christ to find you, to speak to you, to ask of you whatever He wants."

Finally, Jesus, in trying to show to the woman at the well how in the future we would have communion with Him everywhere, states: Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem.But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth."

The General therefore states:

"You must also know that I shall be with you every day that is granted to me from now on. Every evening I shall sit down to dine with you. Not with my body, which is of no importance, but with my soul. Because this evening I have learned, my dear, that in this beautiful world of ours, all things are possible."

Both Babette's feast, and the story of Jesus encounter with the woman at the well are beautiful reminders of the Easter feast that we are preparing for during Lent. Each Eucharist is not only a sacrament or a sign of the ultimate communion we get to experience in the heavenly banquet, but a glimpse or a foretaste of that heavenly banquet we get to share in now.

Let us end with a prayer by St. Bonaventure:

"May my heart ever hunger after and feed upon you, Whom the angels desire to look upon, and may my inmost soul be filled with the sweetness of your savor; may it ever thirst for you, the fountain of life, the fountain of wisdom and knowledge, the fountain of eternal light, may it ever seek you, find you, run to you, meditate on you, speak of you, and do all for the praise and glory of your name, and be you alone ever my hope, my entire confidence, my riches, my delight, my pleasure, my joy, my rest and tranquility, my peace, my sweetness, my food, my refreshment, my refuge, my help, my wisdom, my portion, my possession, my treasure; in Whom may my mind and my heart be ever fixed and firm and rooted immovably. Amen."





BABETTE'S FEAST

On Monday night, St. Leonard's parishioners gathered in St. Joseph's Hall to share in a potluck and watch the Danish film, "Babette's Feast".

Released in 1987, the film is set against the beautiful coastline of Denmark and tells the story of the two daughters of an austere Pastor and the suitors they turn down at their father's heading. Years go by, the Pastor passes and the daughters continue his ministry in their old age. One day, a mysterious stranger arrives at their door, only to reveal herself as Babette Hersant, a friend of one of the scorned suitors of the daughter's youth. Babette is a member of the French Bourgeoise and a refugee from the civil war breaking out throughout Paris. She asks only to stay with the sisters and serve them as a maid for the rest of her days and they accept.



Fourteen years go by and Babette acclimates wonderfully to her poor but simple life...until one day, she receives news that she has won the lottery back in France! She receives 10,000 francs as her prize and the Danish sisters assume sadly that she'll use the money to return to France.



However, having noticed in-fighting breaking out amongst the people of the village's church, Babette instead insists on spending the money on an indulgent French feast for the parishioners. At first the sisters object, saying it's too much, but finally they acquiesce.

Babette makes her feast and the celebration is so joyous and the food so delectable, that it begins to heal the broken relationships within the parish.

After the dinner, the sisters find out that Babette didn't just fund the feast, she spent the entirety of her 10,000 Francs on it. They are aghast, crying that because of her extravagant generosity Babette will be poor for the rest of her life.

But Babette simply replies: "An artist is never poor".

And in this way, the film serves as a metaphor the gift we receive in the Eucharist. In Holy Communion God (the greatest artist of all) showers us with the greatest and most extravagant gift and sacrifice, His son. When we partake in this celebration and eat the feast He gives us (Communion!), old hurts begin to melt away and new life begins within our hearts and our community.

WHAT IS LENT?

Lent is a preparation for the new life offered to us in Easter. In these 40 days, we prepare our hearts, purifying them through penance, acts of sacrifice, almsgiving, and prayer so that we may fully share in the joys of Easter.

DID YOU KNOW?

1. During Lent we are obligated to fast and abstain from meat:

ABSTINENCE:

Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to complete abstinence from meat on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent.

FASTING:

Catholics over 18, and up to the beginning of their sixtieth year, are bound to fast Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these days, only one full meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed.

2. This is a graced time to fulfill our yearly obligation to cleanse our heart through the sacrament of reconciliation and receive the Eucharist during the Easter season.

Molly's cope features a dazzling monstrance and is used for the exposition and benediction of the Holy Sacrament during adoration.

Molly initially made this project as her capstone project as an artisan at St. Joseph's Home for Artisans, St. Leonard's art ministry that houses and nurtures young Catholic artists while they give back to the community through their gifts.

Day 1 | October 8th, 2024 | Departure

Our pilgrimage begins with an overnight flight from Boston to Milan. Meals and refreshments are served on the plane.

Day 2 | October 9th, 2024 | *Arrival in Milan*Upon arrival in Milan, we'll transfer to Porto Maurizio, the birthplace of St. Leonard. Hotel Check-in, and afternoon at leisure before we gather for mass and our welcome dinner. Overnight in Porto Maurizio

Day 3 | October 10th, 2024 | Footsteps of St. LeonardAfter breakfast we start the day by visiting St. Leonard's native home, now an oratory for private worship. Well then walk the streets of Porto Maurizio where St. Leonard would preach. St. Leonard would preach in the streets to many thousands, the churches were too small to contain the multitudes who would flock to hear his sermons. After lunch, well visit the Cathedral of Imperia Porto Maurizio where we will celebrate Mass and pray over the body of St. Leonard. Overnight in Porto Maurizio

Day 4 | October 11th, 2024 | Tuscany & FlorenceAfter breakfast well depart for Assisi, in route we stop in Tuscany for lunch, a beautiful place to admire the countryside, relax and enjoy some local wine tasting. Next, we'll visit the Convento Dell'Incontro, a Franciscan Monastery atop the hills just outside of Florence. Convento Dell'Incontro was founded by St. Leonard in 1710 and where he would retire to from time to time after his missions. Here we will celebrate Mass and pray for the intersession of St. Leonard. Finally, well arrive in Assisi for Dinner. Overnight in Assisi

Day 5 | October 12th, 2024 | Assisi

Following breakfast, we will proceed to the basilica of St. Francis where we will celebrate Mass, pray over his tomb. Next, we will visit Chiesa Nuova, built in 1615 on the site of the birthplace of St. Francis. Then onto the Church of St. Clare to see the Saint's body and pray for her intercession. St. Clare was the foundress of the Order of Poor Clare's. We'll visit St. Mary Major, the Shrine of the Renunciation, where Blessed Carlo's body is interred. Finally, we visit San Damiano the site of St. Francis's conversion, where he obeyed the orders given to him by the Crucifix, which told him "Go forth Francis, and rebuild my crumbling house". *Overnight in Assisi*

Day 6 | October 13th, 2024 | Greccio

After breakfast we visit St. Mary of the Angels where St. Francis spent most of his life. Here we'll visit the Chapel Portiuncola and celebrate Mass near the rose bush and cave where St. Francis retired for prayer. Next, we'll depart Assisi and begin our journey to Rome, in route we will make a stop in Rivotorto where St. Francis of Assisi

started his life of austerity. We then continue onto the medieval town of Greccio. Greccio itself, set on a beautiful mountaintop, is famous for its cool summer climate and its mineral springs. However, it is even more renowned for its connections with St. Francis of Assisi and as the birthplace of the Christmas crèche. On Christmas Night 1223, St. Francis led shepherds to the top of a nearby hill where they gathered together in a stable sheltering an ox and a donkey. According to legend, the Baby Jesus miraculously appeared in the manger. On this spot the Franciscan convent of Greccio was built, and the Chapel of The Crib was erected in 1228, the year St. Francis was canonized. Finally, we board our bus and continue to Rome for dinner. Overnight in Rome

Day 7 | October 14th, 2024 | Rome Basilicas

After breakfast, we will visit the church of San Bonaventura al Palatino, here we will have to opportunity to pray before the relics of St. Leonard and celebrate Mass. San Bonaventura al Palatino is where St. Leonard studied and later taught as a professor. Next, before our entrance at Colosseum, we will visit the Church of St. Peter in Chains and then we will embark on a historic tour of Ancient Rome starting with a visit to the Colosseum, a grand amphitheater of the ancient world, St. Leonard set up the Stations of the Cross in over 500 different places, including the Colosseum. Passing by the Roman Forum, we will witness the ruins of ancient government buildings. After the Roman Forum we'll visit Collegio Romano, a school established by St. Ignatius of Loyola in 1551, just 11 years after he founded the Society of Jesus, where St. Leonard studied with the Jesuits before receiving his habit. Overnight in Rome

Day 8 | October 15th, 2024 | St. Leonard & Ancient Rome


Today, we will visit the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls, the Basilica of St. Mary Major, as well as the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran. It is here (the Basilica of St. John Lateran) that St. Francis persuaded Pope Innocent III to give permission to begin the Franciscan Order. We will celebrate mass at one of the basilicas. At the end of the visit, transfer back to your hotel in Rome and rest of the day at leisure. *Overnight in Rome*

Day 9 | October 16th, 2024 | Vatican City & Papal Audience
Following breakfast, we have an early departure for St. Peter's Square
to participate in the Papal Audience (subject to the Pope's schedule).
After lunch, we have a guided tour of the Vatican Museum, the
Sistine Chapel, and St. Peter's Basilica where we will celebrate mass in one of the Chapels. Overnight in Rome

Day 10 | October 17th, 2024 | Return home

With a renewed sense of pilgrimage, and an invigorated love of our Catholic faith, we transfer to the Rome Fiumicino Airport and board our return flight home.
